## Fifteen Individuals Singled Out for Contributions to Freedom

On February 15, President Obama presented fifteen individuals the highest civilian award that the United States can bestow: the Presidential Medal of Freedom. The tradition of awarding the medals was started by John F. Kennedy in 1963, who intended that they be awarded by the President to individuals who have "made an especially meritorious contribution" to American national interests or culture, or have advanced the cause of world peace.

One of the most prominent figures to win the award this time around was former President George H. W. Bush.

When presenting the award, President Obama said of Bush Sr. that "His life is a testament that public service is a noble call-

ing," and commended him as a gentleman. Obama also lauded him for expelling Saddam Hussein from Kuwait and playing a role in nuclear disarmament and ending the Cold War.

Other prominent political figures presented with the award included German Chancellor Angela Merkel, who was unable to attend the ceremony but whom Obama cited as being "an inspiration" to people worldwide. Representative John Lewis (D-Ga), an African-American with a past as a civil rights leader, said that receiving the award meant "everything" to him. As he put it, "To receive [the Medal of Freedom] from President Barack Obama during African-American history month, by the first African-American president

## Apple Is at It Again

As people are preparing for one of the biggest subscription services from Apple Inc., other companies are preparing for the biggest change in their services to date. Apple Inc. is launching a new subscription service for magazines, videos, music and newspapers, which could put a sizable dent in Netflix and Hulu. This application will allow Apple to keep 30 percent of customer payments to a publisher that is already present in its App Store, including Rhapsody, Netflix and The New York Times.

The publishers of the application can set the price and the length of the subscriptions. They may also advertise and allow for these subscriptions to be bought on their websites but must apply the same subscription terms to those buying in the App Store.

For example, if a customer wants to sign up for a Netflix account, they have two options. They can go to the Netflix website and sign up there where Netflix keeps the full amount of the fee, or the customer can sign up for a Netflix account through their iPhone or iPad where it will

cost Netflix 30 percent of fees in order for the customer to do

Up until this point, the publishers (Netflix, The New York Times etc.) have been able to supply an application through Apple Inc. without a fee. "This is Apple flexing its muscles and trying to leverage not just the strength of the iPad and application environment, but also iTunes payment ecosystem," said Oppenheimer analyst Yair Reiner. "Over time this risks angering content developers and application developers and pushing them a bit to find other solutions."

However, it is not yet clear when publishers will have to actually comply with these rules because they are already publishers under the App Store. As you can see, this can be very dangerous for those subscribers who pride themselves on their company such as Netflix, Rhapsody and The New York Times. More people today are using their iPhone and iPad to watch movies, read the newspaper and listen to music; every time this happens, the publishers now have to give 30 percent of their fees to Apple Inc.

is so moving".

Also on the civil rights front, Medals were awarded to Sylvia Mendez, a Hispanic civil rights activist who spends a great deal of time speaking at schools encouraging students to complete their education, and also to Maya Angelou. Angelou is a prominent writer and was heavily involved in Martin Luther King Jr.'s Southern Christian Leadership Conference.

Angelou was in good company in terms of Medal of Freedom honorees singled out for artistic achievements. Renowned cellist Yo-Yo Ma, considered the world's greatest living cellist (and acknowledged as a prodigy since the age of five), was among those recognized, as was American painter Jasper Johns.

But certainly one of the most striking stories out of any of the honorees' belongs to Tom Little, the only Medal of Freedom recipient of 2010 to receive the award posthumously. According to the White House website, Little was an optometrist who last year took part in a humanitarian aid mission bringing vision care to the remote Nuristan province of Afghanistan. For their efforts, Little and nine other team members were massacred by al-Qaeda

on August 6, 2010. President Obama presented the Medal of Freedom award to Little's widow, Elizabeth, saying that Tom Little was "a humanitarian in the truest sense of the word."

Hall of Famer Stan "The Man" Musial, who played 22 seasons as First Baseman for the St. Louis Cardinals, was also lauded, as was basketball legend Bill Russell, who was instrumental in winning 11 Championships for the Boston Celtics over the course of his 13 year career. Bill Russell was the first athlete to earn \$100,000 per year, and, exhibiting uncommon class, Russell requested a pay cut when he thought he was not living up to expectations.

Another of the most deserving honorees was likely Gerda Weissmann Klein, a Holocaust survivor who has written multiple books about her experiences. Other honorees were National Resources Defense Council founder John H. Adams; investor, industrialist and philanthropist Warren Buffet; John Sweeney, past President of the AFL-CIO; and Jean Kennedy Smith, who founded a non-profit organization called VSA, which fosters the artistic abilities of children, youths, and disabled adults, rounding off President Obama's list of the best this nation (and others) have to offer.

## FDA Has New Worries

A Wisconsin medical products firm has allegedly been called out on its sterilization practices after a two year-old boy had died from contracting a rare infection from contaminated alcohol wipes manufactured by this firm. On February 15, the company recalled a substantial amount of these pads because of this death, and many people are now stepping forward and saying that they may have sickened also.

MSNBC discovered government documents that show that the FDA knew about the infected products being produced from a company called Triad Group of Hartland since 2009. Among the documents discovered was one from official inspectors that reported "procedures designed to prevent microbiological contamination of drug products purporting to be sterile are not followed." There is, however, no evidence that the FDA sent its typical warning letters to the company to force it to comply.

Sandra and Shanoop Kothari are the parents of the two yearold boy who died on Dec. 1, 2010. In the last week alone, 50 people have contacted lawyers on behalf of this family who are now suing the Triad Group for gross negligence. Not only are people suing, but there have been many people reporting to the doctors because of infectious skin diseases. Even though none of these new infections have been confirmed yet, people are calling in to Kothari's lawyer, Jim M. Purdue Jr., stating superficial infections, serious complications and even another death.

Since the recall of the product, 100 reports have been filed to the FDA claiming to have the bacteria Bacillus Cereus, the infection supposedly caused by the wipes.

One of the biggest cases facing the FDA and Triad Group right now is from a Tennessee man who has filed a \$30 million lawsuit claiming he "developed an infection from Bacillus cereus from the wipes and had to undergo open-heart surgery as a result," MSNBC reported.

"That was the most scared I've been in my life. They told me about the tainted pads and you just kind of put two and two together," said Donovan Joseph Postich, the man who filed the lawsuit. He is now permanently disabled after having the surgery.

During visits the FDA made

to the company, the FDA discovered "worn and broken manufacturing equipment, misidentified batches of hemorrhoid cream, and instances where if a single batch of hemorrhoid ointment or glycerin suppositories failed quality standards, others weren't tested for the same problem and were released for distribution." They also stated that in one case, "inspectors noted that a batch of lubricating jelly failed viscosity tests on Jan. 28, 2010, but was released anyway with the specific consent of Triad's president, David Haertle. A week later, the decision to release the jelly per Haertle's authority was revised and cases of the jelly were scrapped, but some already had been distributed, according to the report." No action has been taken to recover those products distributed.

Lastly, Triad failed to report, evaluate and investigate a complaint they received from a hospital about high rates of abnormal pap smear results tied to the sterile lubricating jelly for medical exams. Along with this hospital, six more complaints were made in 2010 to the company which did nothing to investigate it.



## New Zealand's "Darkest Day"

There seems to be a trend of earthquakes hitting our world today from Haiti to Indonesia and now to New Zealand. A 6.3 magnitude earthquake struck the southern part of New Zealand in the city of Christchurch killing many people, trapping hundreds and collapsing many buildings.

Devastation has erupted over New Zealand, and the Prime Minister John Key stated that at least 65 people have died. He expects the death toll to unfortunately rise. The city is wrecked, according to residents. Streets are cracked, buildings are collapsed, people are stuck in the rubble and laying in the streets, and—to top it off—main water lines are breaking and causing extensive flooding.

Mayor Bob Parker was "thrown quite a bit" across a room and, after he got his footing, he immediately went to rescue people. Reports say that nearly 125 people have been

rescued, but the mayor expects that more than 100 still need to be rescued from collapsed buildings and homes. This earthquake left the city with 33 aftershocks, collapsing even more buildings and causing more destruction.

Within the past five months, this is the second earthquake to

hit New Zealand, citing it as the deadliest disaster in 80 years (in 1931 an earthquake killed 256 people). According to Mayor Key, "We may well be witnessing New Zealand's darkest day...The death toll I have at the moment is 65 and that may rise. It's hard to describe. What was a vibrant

city a few hours ago has been brought to its knees."

In the city, about eight or nine buildings fully collapsed and the city is struggling to free those who are trapped under it.

The earthquake didn't only cause ground damage, but also damage to the Tasman Glacier


in Aoraki Mt. Cook National Park. Reports state that 30 million tons of ice fell from the glacier and sent an 11 foot wave crashing into boats on Terminal Lake.

As the search continues for those that may still be trapped, officials and rescuers have decided to take their minds and efforts off of the deceased people—who are basically lining the streets—and to those who are still possibly alive under the rubble. Where people are known to be trapped in buildings, rescuers were pulling 20 and 30 people out all throughout the night from each building.

There were people who were drastically hurt by the quake and then there were those who came out without even a scratch. One man, Nathaniel Boehm, was on his lunch break around 1:00 p.m. when the earthquake hit and saw buildings fall and bury people in the streets. "It was horrific," he said

Born in Florence, Italy in 1445, Botticelli is one of the Early Renaissance's influential painters. As a child, Botticelli was trained to become a goldsmith; however, he developed a passion for artistry. By the year of 1470, Botticelli created his own workshop in which he produced some of the Renaissance's capturing pieces of work. Botticelli is most known for two masterpieces: "The Birth of Venus" and "Primavera." "The Birth of Venus" depicts Venus, the goddess of the sea, emerging on a large clam shell from the water, as if the ocean had given birth to her. Zephyr, the Greek God of the west wind, is shown blowing wind to guide Venus towards shore. On shore, a nymph, a female deity or spirit, is shown holding out a robe to cover the body of Venus. In Botticelli's "Primavera," six females, two males, and a putto (baby flying, also known as an angel), are depicted within an orange grove. # "F.I.L.T.H. The Storm" Anthony G. Smith Contributing Writer


In all the lifeless rooms of the world a broadcast is heard. A static filled warning on both radios and television.

## Jones, Jackson Spar in "The Sunset Limited"

Directed by and starring Tommy Lee Jones and adapted from a Cormac McCarthy play, "The Sunset Limited" premiered on HBO in February to generally positive reviews. Before the play begins, White (Jones) hurls himself in front of a train, the Sunset Limited, and is saved by Black (Samuel L. Jackson). The play opens in Black's apartment, and the two characters wage war over the fate of White in Biblical and Nihilistic terms.

"The Sunset Limited" is certainly not for those who are inclined to action in a story. Quite succinctly, the 90 minute film pits White and Black against one another in a theological/philosophical debate in the confines of Black's apartment. This may seem like a tiresome way to spend an hour and a half, but the dialogue, characters and setting are compelling enough to pull off the play's illusion.

Within "The Sunset Limited," dialogue plays an especially pivotal role, which can only be accomplished if both actors are on top of their game; fortunately, this is the case with both Jones and Jackson. White is a college professor who has become so disenchanted with the human condition that he longs for death, and the viewer can see the physical change

in him from being uneasy, to weary, to full of confidence in his beliefs. Black, on the other hand, lives in the slums of New York as an ex-convict who has since discovered God, and the vehemence with which Jackson relays White's life experiences is quite moving. At times, the dialogue can be a bit much, but such is the nature of any prolonged theological debate regarding two disparate views of the afterlife. By the end of the play, one character has seemingly won, leaving the other visibly shaken.

Surprisingly, the set, limited to one room, does not give the viewer a sense of claustrophobia. Both Jones and Jackson explore the set well enough as to give the small, squalid apartment a degree of spaciousness and character that didn't seem possible. Moreover, the cinematography is excellent, making the viewer see both the apartment and the actors in many different lights. Small effects that seem to be coming from the world around the apartment are added here and there to give the set an even greater degree of depth: sirens sounding, a trumpet playing, and even a fight breaking out.

Although the dialogue may be a bit overwritten at times, the film was still very well done and quite thought provoking. Both Jones and Jackson are excellent in their respective roles,

and the cinematography allows the viewer to inhabit the space (small though it is). In writing the play, McCarthy seems to have been channeling his inner Samuel Beckett, though with more extensive dialogue (not necessarily for the better) and the familiar, dark themes that he has become famous for. All in all, I would certainly recommend "The Sunset Limited" to fans of McCarthy or those who are altogether tired of the pervasive silliness that has plagued Samuel L. Jackson's career.

## 2011 MLB Preview

After an exciting playoff race last October and a tumultuous offseason, I take a look at where all 30 teams will finish in 2011. Which teams will make the leap? Which of last year's contenders take a step back? I've ranked each team by division, with an asterisk indicating the Wild Card winner in each league.

#### AL East

- 1. Red Sox The free agent addition of Carl Crawford (seven years, \$142 million) was as much a surprise as anything, and Adrian Gonzalez and the team are waiting to work out an extension for another few weeks to avoid a luxury tax hit. Despite all of last year's injuries, the back ends of the rotation and the bullpen are what truly plagued them in 2010, so Boston will need Josh Beckett and Jonathan Papelbon to return to form.
- 2. Yankees\* While the Sox made all the offseason headways, New York lost out on free agent Cliff Lee and had Andy Pettitte choose retirement over a return. The final two rotation slots are currently up for grabs, but expect A-Rod, Mark Teixeira, and Derek Jeter, who hit a combined .265 in 2010, to bounce back in a big way. The fact that CC Sabathia can opt out of his contract at the end of the upcoming year looms for New York.
- 3. Rays The additions of Manny Ramirez and Johnny Damon created a publicity stir, but ultimately Tampa lost two of its top three offensive weapons, its two top set-up men, and its closer. Top prospect Jeremy Hellickson is set to fill the void of Matt Garza, but the Rays will finish a distant third after winning the East two of the last three years.

- 4. Blue Jays Jose Bautista has quickly become the face of the franchise, having signed a five-year, \$64 million contract last month. Despite a fourth place finish, they still finished 86-76 last year, just three games behind the Sox.
- 5. Orioles Baltimore could get out of the basement this season, having added Mark Reynolds, Vladimir Guerrero and Derrek Lee to a lineup that already features Adam Jones, Brian Roberts and Nick Markakis. Their rotation is young but will hope for continued success from 24-year-old lefty Brian Matusz.

#### AL Central

1. Twins - Former MVP Justin Morneau missed the final three months of last season and Minnesota still took the division. They brought back Carl Pavano (two years, \$16.5 million) but may try their luck dealing fellow starter Francisco Liriano. The bullpen gets Joe Nathan back

healthy, with Matt Capps moving to a setup role.

- 2. Tigers Despite Miguel Cabrera's latest alcohol addiction concerns, the Tigers still have one of the best players in baseball if he can recover. Behind Justin Verlander and Max Scherzer, Rick Porcello's comeback could help stabilize the rotation and Joel Zumaya has looked dominant in the bullpen.
- 3. White Sox Chicago has a serious shot at contending, especially after the addition of Adam Dunn, but Jake Peavy needs to prove he can stay healthy and be one of the top arms in the game once again. Manager Ozzie Guillen also needs to decide upon roles in the bullpen for Matt Thornton and Chris Sale.
- 4. Royals Kansas City probably could have gotten more for Zack Greinke, but they have the top-rated farm system in all of baseball which should boast some successful debuts for the Royals this season.

5. Indians Grady Sizemore was en route to becoming a star, but injuries and dwindling statistics have done him in the past three seasons. Expect him to be a trade candidate in June or July.

#### AL West

- 1. Rangers The defending AL champs currently have a number of moving pieces, as CJ Wilson becomes their top starter, last year's closer Neftali Perez may move to the rotation, and Michael Young has now been squeezed out of all four infield positions. But the Rangers' offensive talent is their best asset in a division that is up for grabs.
- 2. Athletics Trevor Cahill, Brett Anderson, Gio Gonzalez and Dallas Braden head a rotation that could be one of the best starting scores in the AL. Oakland also added Brian Fuentes and Grant Balfour to Brad Ziegler, Craig Breslow and Andrew Bailey in the bullpen.

- The additions of Josh Willingham, David DeJesus and Hideki Matsui will also help what was an anemic offense.
- 3. Angels The Halos front Jered Weaver and Dan Haren atop their rotation and get a healthy Kendry Morales back in the middle of the lineup. However, they caught criticism for losing out on free agents Carl Crawford and Adrian Beltre and may have taken on even more criticism for acquiring Blue Jays' castoff Vernon Wells and his enormous contract.
- 4. Mariners Cy Young winner Felix Hernandez has little from the rest of the roster. Second base prospect Dustin Ackley seems to have a bright future, but don't expect him to break camp with the team so Seattle can keep him from reaching Super-Two arbitration status at such a young age.

#### NL East

- 1. Phillies In the most surprising move of the offseason, the Phillies swooped in to regain Cliff Lee's services, steering him away from the Rangers and Yankees in the process. Although the lineup is now much older, Lee joins Roy Halladay, Roy Oswalt and Cole Hamels in what could be a historic starting rotation.
- 2. Braves\* After Atlanta took home the wild card without him, Chipper Jones opted not to retire. They added second baseman Dan Uggla and will hope All-Star Jason Heyward, who turns 22 in August, will bring his talent to another level. Tommy Hanson has ace potential, and Tim Hudson's resurgence (17-9, 2.83 last season) provides added depth to the rotation alongside Derek Lowe and Jair Jurrjens.

- 3. Marlins They will need young outfielders Mike Stanton and Logan Morrison to perform well in what will be the first full campaign for each youngster. They also have one of the best pitchers in the NL in Josh Johnson and one of the best players in all of baseball in Hanley Ramirez. A successful season will help the team create a buzz with its new stadium opening in 2012.
- 4. Mets Mets ownership, currently faced with a lawsuit to repay victims of the Madoff Ponzi scheme, is looking to sell about 25 percent of the team in order to fund a potential settlement. As if that wasn't enough of a financial burden, the team has zero payroll flexibility due to a couple of bad contracts. Jason Bay missed the majority of last season with a concussion and ace Johan Santana won't return from surgery until June or July.
- 5. Nationals After a stellar rookie campaign, Stephen

Strasburg's devastating Tommy John surgery could sideline him for the entire 2011 campaign, although fellow No. 1 pick Bryce Harper could appear in the majors at some point. Washington knew it was vastly overpaying for outfielder Jayson Werth (seven years, \$126 million), but it sends the message that they plan on competing two or three years from now.

#### NL Central

- 1. Reds The reigning division champs also have the reigning MVP in Joey Votto, who has solidified himself as one of the game's finest. They also have six possible starters for five spots in Edinson Volquez, Jonny Cueto, Bronson Arroyo, Mike Leake, Travis Wood, and Homer Bailey. It won't hurt their chances at taking the division again if outfielder Jay Bruce and flamethrower Aroldis Chapman take another leap forward.
- 2. Milwaukee Many expect the Cards to challenge for the division title, but the key

additions of Zack Greinke and Shaun Marcum alongside Yovani Gallardo in the starting rotation have propelled the Brewers into for real status. They need to get off to a good start or be faced with the decision to trade Prince Fielder, who is entering a contract year.

- 3. Cubs The addition of Matt Garza could bring out the best in Carlos Zambrano, and they could make it a fourteam race under new manager Mike Quade. They also could be a suitor next winter for Albert Pujols' services.
- 4. Cardinals Starter Chris Carpenter will turn 36 in April and rotation mate Adam Wainwright will miss the year after Tommy John surgery. And while many believe Pujols's refusal to negotiate an extension will avoid a distraction, it also could turn out to be the elephant in the room.
- 5. Astros They will look to an infusion of young players in 2011, and trading Roy Oswalt helped replenish the farm

system. Starter Wandy Rodriguez went 8-2 with a 2.03 in his final 18 starts last year.

6. Pirates – The Bucs have already set the major league record of 17 consecutive losing seasons, and there is no question that 2011 will only extend that mark. Andrew McCutchen (94 runs, 33 stolen bases) and Pedro Alvarez (16 HRs in 95 games) are their two most exciting players to keep an eye on.

#### NL West

- 1. Rockies The team gave large extensions to Troy Tulowitzki (seven years, \$134 million) and Carlos Gonzalez (seven years, \$80 million) and still have its entire starting rotation intact, including ace Ubaldo Jimenez.
- 2. Giants They won the World Series because of their starting pitching, but the strain of additional postseason innings may affect the young San Francisco rotation. Pablo Sandoval shed nearly 40 pounds, but the lineup lacks a premier hitter.
- 3. Dodgers A number of their young players (Matt

Kemp, Andre Ethier, and James Loney) are now arbitration-eligible which raises team payroll for owner Frank McCourt, who was forced to give away nearly half of his assets in a nasty divorce. The team's tight financial predicament could mean Los Angeles will not be able to add players at the deadline.

- 4. Padres Had it not been for their 10-game losing streak in late August/early September, San Diego would have won the division last year despite the fourth-lowest payroll in baseball. Adrian Gonzalez is now gone and the team will likely deal closer Heath Bell for two or three prospects, although the bullpen is lights out.
- 5. Diamondbacks Team management eliminated nearly 400 strikeouts from the lineup with the subtractions of Mark Reynolds and Adam LaRoche, but they are still a ways away from competing. Long-time former Padres GM Kevin Towers is now in control, and he will not hesitate to make changes as he sees fit.

## Bayne Wins Big in Daytona

Twenty-year-old Trevor Bayne proved miracles can still happen after he earned his first career NASCAR Sprint Cup victory in only his second career start by winning the 2011 Daytona 500.

Bayne became the youngest winner in history and the first rookie to win the event. The win also brought an end to a 10-year winless drought for one of NASCAR's oldest teams.

"I keep thinking I'm dreaming," Bayne said. "Our first 500 - are you kidding me? To win our first one in our second-ever Cup race, I mean this is just incredible. Wow, this is unbelievable."

Bayne, who had a strong car for much of the race, inherited the lead with only a handful of laps remaining when David Ragan was black-flagged by NASCAR for changing his position on a restart. Bayne held off a hard charging Carl Edwards to the finish for the victory.

Bayne's unexpected win received great recognition from competitors.

"You know, as a competitor, in a way it really doesn't matter who beats you," said Edwards. "But as a person, as a friend of Trevor's, it's amazing to watch him have that success. I've only known him for a short time, but he's what seems to be truly a good guy. I think a lot of people in the sport see that. Hopefully, a lot of the fans see that. So that's good for the sport."

For Bayne, it was only three years ago when he was trying to earn a name for himself competing throughout New England in the NASCAR East series. It was there that he had earned his only prior NASCAR victory at Thompson, Connecticut.

"That's crazy how fast it has all happened," Bayne said. "It's been a flash, going straight from the East to Nationwide Series to here. It was a perfect stepping stone order. It's an awesome way to go."

Many pre-race favorites found themselves watching the

finish on television. Kevin Harvick's day ended early with a blown engine resulting in a 42 place finish. Five-time defending champion Jimmie Johnson finished a dismal 27 after being involved in an early wreck. Pole winner Dale Earnhardt Jr., whose father lost his life at the

same track ten years earlier, finished 24 after being involved in a wreck in the closing laps.

Because of NASCAR's new championship point standings, Bayne is ineligible to compete for the championship due to his prior commitments in the NASCAR Nationwide series, the lower tier series.

The SNHU-Vitas program offers students basic tax services in which the program has certified tax preparers, and all the returns are electronically

Students like this because it gives them time to focus on their other classes and finals.

The training is on Tuesdays at 2:00 p.m. and lasts about an hour. On Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, students work at the desk and, throughout the course of the semester, are required to complete 20 tax returns, including those in which they have practiced. The students bring their own laptops because they are directly linked to the IRS page. The big assignment for each student is that they write a reflection paper.

This course is a great idea for students and is also a good resume builder. You can say that you have done volunteer work and that you are IRS certified. Also, as Shea pointed out, they have a very awesome party.
