DOUBTS OVER THE WARREN REPORT

The third anniversary of Presient Kennedy's assassination is narked by increasing controvery over the findings of the Waren Report. Many of these critics re highly educated and thereore their statements should not e taken lightly. Their own findings, some of which have been published, show a need for a new investigation to clear up many of the unanswered questions raised by the Commission.

The main topic of debate is whether President Kennedy and Governor Connally were wounded by the same bullet. The Warren Report concludes that one bullet caused all the damage, but the critics, along with Governor Connally, disagree. Governor Connally states that he is certain, beyond doubt, that he heard the first bullet that killed Kennedy Other points which are in doubt are

*The single bullet, which the Commission said went through President Kennedy and Connally, was so clean and undamaged it seemed impossible that it could have gone through two bodies.

*The weight of the bullet fragments found in Connally's wrist when added with the same bullet weighed more than what the bullet should have weighed.

*58 out of 90 witnesses said they believed that the first shot came from the front of the President.

I feel that there should be a new investigation analyzing the assassination; that this new Commission should be given as much time as needed to investigate and not be put under pressure as the Warren Commission was. U.S. citizens deserve more than supposed concluded ideas as to what happened and the reasons for it.

The Educational System In America

Things To Do. Places To Go. People To Meet

A new method of teaching in American higher education utilizes the technique called the "Cept". A cept is defined as "the smallest convenient unit of knowledge." In other words, the cept is more than a fact but less than a philosophy. Students are taught to retain cepts. For example, in an economics course it is obvious that the student would note that; "Calvinism caused capitalism." In a religion course, "capitalism caused calvinism."

However, merely memorizing a huge number of cepts is not sufficient. The student must learn to manipulate his knowledge into examination papers in such a manner that the professor can, if he wishes, leafthrough the exam and underline all of the cepts, add them up and post the score. Many times a student will answer examination questions with original thoughts, and the cept conscious professor will consider that the student is trying to cover up his lack of effort and his failure to learn his cepts.

Of course the cept system of education is not widely used because of its relative newness. However, it does point to a series of serious flaws in our educational system.

True learning is the process of learning to let one's inner creative expressions and ideas find a release through his outer capacities of expression.

Socrates, one of the world's greatest teachers, summed up his philosophy of education in three words: "man, know thy-self." No one can know himself until he releases his own thoughts and ideas. If man's capacities are plugged up from trying to cram in cepts, kilocepts, multicepts, and concepts, man will become what Socrates termed a, "wise fool."

THE DROP-OUT PROBLEM IN AMERICA

Part I

Dr. James B. Conant is considered by the editors of *Changing Times* to be the best authority on American schools. In an interview he expressed the following opinions on the drop-out situation.

Dr. Conant believes that the high drop-out rate results from the lack of emphasis placed on vocational training in our high schools. He believes that thorough training should be given not only to the college-bound student but also to the student who lacks the ability or desire to attend college.

Another step in the direction of solving this baffling problem, he adds, may be preschool instruction in the fundamentals of reading-better known as the "head start program."

In Dr. Conant's opinion, counselors, along with principals and teachers, also play an extremely important role in cutting down the percentage of drop-outs.

He points out the drop-out situation as being one of the most serious problems facing education today.

Robert L. Heilbroner, in an article entitled "No Room at the Bottom" in Saturday Review, states that 25 per cent of all Negro boys and 30 per cent of all Negro girls, ages 16-17, are unemployed drop-outs. This added to a smaller percentage of whites, produces rates exceeding the worst during the depression years.

During 1965 alone, nearly a million youngsters dropped out of high school. At the same time, more and more factories and businesses were requiring that job applicants have high school diplomas. Even the Army is closing its doors to the drop-out due

to its experiences with the uneducated soldier.

Programs such as Job Corps, Neighborhood Youth Corps, Manpower Training Programs, and youth centers are working to create jobs and training for these people, but they have a long way yet to go.

Part II

I agree with these two men that the drop-out situation is a very serious problem.

I also agree with Dr. Conant in that vocational training is important. Far too many high schools have a college course and a business course, and then, for the students who can't make the grade in the academic subjects. they offer "shop" and "home economics" which too often amount to nothing. Due to a weakness in math or reading, which can often be traced back to an inadequate teacher in the lower grades, a student receives for an education the art of pounding nails or hemming skirts. student is regarded as stupid because his talents fall in the manual field rather than the academic field. I believe that the vocational courses should be difficult enough to challenge the minds of these students and thorough enough so that, upon graduation, they can feel that they have developed a skill by which they can earn a living. This would give them an incentive to stay in school.

I realize, too, the important role the teacher plays in keeping the potential drop-outs in school. I once heard a teacher, whom I know quite well, telling a student that he hadn't the mentality of a fly. There were also a few derogatory remarks about his looks. I later asked that teacher if he realized how much that could hurt a sensitive person. His answer was that the student hadn't

the brains to be sensitive. This boy dropped the teacher's course and eventually dropped out of school. Teachers with this attitude toward the less intellectual student, and there are many, are not worthy of working with young people. Is it any wonder that many students drop out before graduating from high school.

A good counselor can also do a lot to cut down the drop-out rate in a school. Often the guidance office is the only place in which a student can discuss and openly examine his personal and academic problems. A dedicated counselor can make almost any student see the great advantage to staying in high school at all cost.

Many high school girls who drop out do so because of pregnancy. It is my belief that this unfortunate situation arises through biological and moral ignorance. I think that sex education, conducted very cautiously by fully qualified guidance personnel could greatly help to eradicate this problem.

Whatever the answer or combination of answers to the dropout problem may be, we must do something about it quickly. As the number of drop-outs is increasing, the number of positions available to them is decreasing. Therefore, many of them must join the ranks of the unemployed. This merges one serious problem with another. There is simply no room for the uneducated person in the space-age.
