In Manchester



The Draft

The Vietnam war has precipatated much controversy concerning the merits of the present Selective Service System. It is quite a topic of conversation among college men now. So if all you eligibles will bear with me, we'll take a look at the Selective Service Ssytem, explore the inequities and inequalities of the system, and finally we'll look at the proposals being put forth by The National Advisory Commission on Selective Service.

Here are some reasons why the draft is being criticized:

For one, college students with reasonably high scholastic standings are deferred until they graduate.

This brings up another criticism: Because college students are deferred, some say, many more males from lower socio-economic levels are scooped up for service.

College men are happy to be deferred, but they want to know what will happen after graduation and entrance into a profession.

Also criticized are the 4,000 local draft boards that operate autonomously.

While it is true that college

students are deferred, they still have the same fate to look forward to as do his supposed less fortunate fellows. In many cases he may be worse off, for if he is an officer, he has to lead his men into the battle.

The fact that many who are unable for one reason or another to get an education does not mean that they are discriminated against. In fact this may be a blessing to these boys. It may be their only formal education and for many more it may be a means of going to school after getting out of the service.

I think the college man has something to complain about when he says that he is all ready to enter his chosen profession, and boom-he is drafted. He should know definitely beforehand what is in store for him.

Since there are no uniform rules dictating criteria on which to draft, local boards are free to do whatever they wish in this direction.


The most recent proposals, according to informed sources in a U.S. News & World Report article, list these recommendations made by the National Advisory Commission on Selective Service:

1) Drafting youngest men first instead of the oldest as is the case now. 2) A system of random selection to select the individuals

ordered for service from a pool.

3) Establishment of uniform national standards for classifying all draft age men. 4) Allocating monthly draft calls on a national basis, not the present state-bystate basis. 5) College deferments are to be continued but there will be a no deferment basis sometime in the future.

These proposals are neither exciting nor pacifying, but at least they may clarify matters somewhat. Our status is as much 1-A now as it will be upon graduation. However, for our brothers who are not yet of age, the proposals may enable them to plan their futures with a little more precision.
