**BENJAMIN C. BRADLEE** is vice president of The Washington Post, a director of The Washington Post Company and former executive editor of the paper for the last 23 years after having served as managing editor since 1965. In 1948 Mr. Bradlee was a reporter for The Post covering the federal courts. In 1951 he left to join the State Department as press attache at the United States Embassy in Paris. In 1953 he joined Newsweek magazine's Paris bureau and spent four years as European correspondent. He returned to Washington in 1957 first as Newsweek's political correspondent, later as Washington bureau chief before returning to The Post. Mr. Bradlee is the author of *That Special Grace*, a tribute to President Kennedy, and *Conversations with Kennedy*. He is currently working on two books: his memoirs and a book about the newspaper business.

**THOMAS WINSHIP** is president of the Center for Foreign Journalists and former editor of The Boston Globe currently serving on its Board of Directors. Mr Winship began his career in Washington D.C. working for The Washington Post where he covered politics and city

affairs for ten years. He served as secretary to former United States Senator Leverett Saltonstall, then became Washington correspondent for The Boston Globe. In 1958 Mr. Winship returned to Boston as metropolitan editor, assistant managing editor, then managing editor of The Globe. In 1965 he became editor, a position he held until 1985. Mr. Winship serves on the Board of Governors for Columbia University Seminars on Media and Society. He is chairman of the American Committee of the International Press Institute and president of the Editorial Review Board of United Press International.

**DAVID NYHAN** is a nationally syndicated columnist and associate editor for The Boston Globe. In 21 years at The Globe, he has been state house bureau chief, labor reporter, congressional correspondent and White House correspondent in the Washington bureau, assistant managing editor in charge of news, and directed the paper's political coverage. Prior to joining the Globe he worked for the Associated Press and the Evening News in Salem, Mass.
