An open letter to the administration:

The members of the staff of the Collegiate Revolution who participated in the printing of the Collegiate Revulsion are deeply regretful if we have offended you, the members of the administration, in any way.

The original idea of a gag issue was to approach the students and you with funny and amusing articles about campus inadequacies but not personally abusive literature.

We hereby apologize for the manner and poor taste which we utilized in compiling certain portions of the paper, and futhermore, we apologize for any personal abuse which has resulted.

However, we firmly believe that the basic material contained in that issue is of burning interest to us all. We are intensely disturbed with many of the problems which exist at New Hampshire College. Among them are: the need for a campus, the high faculty turnover, the failure to achieve regional accreditation, the excessively high book prices, the improvement of record keeping, and the lack of communication. We believe that these currently pressing problems facing the college have not been dealt with satisfactorily.

We feel competely justified, therefore, because of the urgency of the matters facing us, that we should arouse you to such an extent that you would take the proper steps in resolving these deficiencies.

Again let me reiterate that though we may have taken improper steps and used poor taste we were compelled to write these articles. We are frustrated, bitter and bewildered and we feel that something must be done now.

Our purpose here is not to reduce the image of CAC but to build it up as we have advertently done in the past.
