One of the leading causes of death in the United States is cancer. It can strike at any moment and can come in many forms. While some have won in their battle against the disease, many have unfortunately been lost to its curse. That is why not only should we rejoice in the wins over cancer, but we should never forget those who have lost their lives to it. This is the goal of Relay For Life.

Since 1985, this event has been held annually nationwide and has raised over \$5 billion to go towards cancer research. Southern New Hampshire University (SNHU) is hosting its own run this year and is asking anybody and everybody to come and participate to help fight cancer.

The event is being con-

ducted at SNHU on Apr. 8, beginning at 6 p.m. and going until 3 a.m. on Apr. 9. Activities will be held on the green space on campus, with the rain-out locale being the second floor of the dining center.

Throughout the night

there will be activities organized and sponsored by participating SNHU clubs, offices, and organizations. These festivities include everything from arts and crafts to a dunk tank.

At different points

throughout the run, there will be small ceremonies held to help remind people why they run and to remember those who may have been taken by the disease.

At the time of this publication, there are already 22 groups signed up for the event. Collectively, these teams have raised a collective \$9,000 towards cancer research. Donations are always welcome with all proceeds going towards the American Cancer Society.



Psychotherapist, author, and journalist Dr. Gary Greenberg is set to speak at Southern New Hampshire University (SNHU) on Apr. 7 at 5:30 p.m. SNHU's own Psychology Student Association (PSA) will be welcoming Dr. Greenberg to give a Psych Talk on psychotherapy and the placebo effect at the Mara Auditorium in Webster Hall.

Dr. Greenberg is the author of four books and is a contributing writer and editor for "Mother Jones" and "Harper's," respectively. His writings circulate around mental illnesses, psychological theories, and his own theories based on societal views and treatments of mental illnesses. Dr. Greenberg's most recent work is "The Book of Woe: The DSM and the Un-

making of Psychiatry."

His book "Manufacturing Depression: The Secret History of a Modern Disease" touches upon the topic of the placebo effect as a treatment for major depression. This Psych Talk will delve further into theories about the placebo effect and the power of psychotherapy to treat mental illnesses like depression.

PSA President and senior Elizabeth Worth said "PSA is thrilled to have Dr. Gary Greenberg come this year since he is very wellknown in the field. Brooke Gilmore, director of the Deborah L. Coffin Women's Center, began the celebration with a luncheon. President LeBlanc addressed the guest speaker, Professor Emeritus Eleanor Dunfey-Frieburger.

Dunfey-Frieburger began her speech by speaking about her childhood and how she was the only girl in a family of many boys. She spoke about her experiences with gender inequality as a way to encourage the audience members, seated at tables, to discuss their own stories. After her speech, the attendees ate lunch and spoke about their experiences with successful women at their tables.

After the luncheon, a tabling was set up in the Student's Center. Some clubs participated in the tabling, including the International Student Association (ISA) with a table about important women from some of their home countries, Outreach

with a donation table, Student Activists for Gender Equality (SAGE) with a pledging for parity banner and live music by Richard Oliver and Melanie Friese, and History Club with a trivia game about different successful women in history.

The Diversity Initiative's

Office had a table with a photo campaign in which people could get their picture taken with a professional camera holding a sign with a woman (or two) that inspires them. Photos were posted on the Facebook page.

While the tabling was happening, there was a pre-

sentation and community service event in the Hospitality Building. With the donations, attendees were able to make donation baskets to benefit the refugee groups in Manchester.

Rachael Straehle and Youssaira Akennad gave a presentation on their alternative break trip to volunteer and help in Kenya. They spoke about their experiences and the access that girls in Kenya have to education.

The final, and the most emotional part of the day was a panel of international students speaking about their limited and discouraged access to education in their home countries and their journeys to the United States. Three of the students were from Afghanistan and the fourth was from Saudi Arabia

The panelists agreed that girls are discouraged to continue their education, and they rarely obtain master's degrees. When trying to get higher education, women are sometimes threatened and injured to force them to stop.

The students were joined by SNHU Board of Trustee and wife to the former ambassador to Saudi Arabia, Janet Breslin-Smith, and Anne Barry, Executive Director of the World Affairs Council, who facilitated the panel.

After the panel, the audience saw the documentary "He Named Me Malala" about Malala Yousafzai, a girl who was shot in the head by the Taliban in Afghanistan for standing up for her right to receive an education.

STAYING AHEAD OF THE TRAVEL GAME

Traveling can be tricky, but tips from someone who has travelled to five countries in less than three months may prove beneficial. That's where I come in. I would like to let you know some of the things I learned while traveling and studying abroad.

First off, double and triple check the deal you are getting for tickets and hostel/or hotels (and if you are not getting a deal, look harder). We found that it takes some time to find the cheapest plane tickets.

There are many websites such as opodo.com and kayak.com which are helpful and usually have cheap tickets. Those two are my favorites, but there are dozens out there.

Something to be aware of when buying plane tickets is the fact that the more times you look at certain tickets on certain websites, the higher the prices will be. For example, if you want to buy your tickets on Sunday and keep checking on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday to make sure they are still there, it is likely that by the time you get to Sunday, the tickets will be

more expensive. When that happened to me, it seemed that the more traffic going to specific tickets made the tickets more expensive.

Another tip I have is to book plane tickets before hostel or hotel tickets. My friend and I made the mistake of booking our hostel for certain dates and then realizing we had to get plane tickets to get us there for the night before. We landed in Ireland with no place to stay and resorted to calling hostels that night to see if they had room. It worked out, but I do not recommend it.


I used the website hostelworld.com when booking hostels. It is easy to use and does not require payment (besides a deposit) until you arrive at the hostel (tip: Be sure to check the ratings of the hostels. I recommend looking for ratings with an 8.0 out of 10 or higher in most categories).

Lastly, this is not something I always stuck to but when traveling in Europe, or anywhere really, I suggest traveling to places that are not large tourist areas. I had wonderful trips that included Dublin and London which are rather large tourist destinations but sometimes it was nice to travel somewhere that was not bustling with tourists. Other trips, however, such as Dover, United Kingdom, and Cardiff, Wales (which are less touristy) were incredible. Some of those trips I will remember forever.

Traveling is amazing and there are so many different possible destinations. While they can be incredible, I think it is important to remember that you are not home and you are not in familiar areas. It is crucial to stay vigilant and stay smart. Planes may land late at night or pub crawls may leave you out past dark which can be dangerous. Whenever I travelled, I had never been to the area or city before, so I always traveled with a friend and made sure to make smart decisions.

PENMEN SOFTBALL RUNS OUT OF THE BOX AHEAD OF COMPETITION

The Southern New Hampshire University (SNHU) Softball team is off to a red hot 11-5 start so far this season. In those 16 games, the Lady Penmen have a combined Batting Average (BA) of .305, they've hit 12 home runs, and have scored a team total of 82 runs.

Senior Katie Caruso leads the team in hits with 25, BA with .446, home runs with three, and Runs Batted In (RBIs) with 12. Behind her is senior Mo Hannon who's batting .358 with 19 hits, two home runs, and 10 RBIs. Some more notable stats come from senior Lindsey Bolduc who's BA to this point in .305 with 18 hits, nine doubles, three home runs, and nine RBIs. Sophomore Sarah Lavallee has contributed three home runs and 11 RBIs.

The softball squad has tallied five wins and no losses in their last five games. They beat New Haven on Mar. 19, three to zero. Hannon went two for three at the plate with an RBI and the other earned run came off a Katie Horiuchi base hit. Junior Nicole Gubellini was lights out on the mound pitching seven innings, allowing only three hits and striking out two batters.

On Mar. 24, the team played a double header against Post. Their first game was a hit parade. The team notched a total of 16 hits in the game and 17 runs. Bolduc, Lavallee, and Erin Garczynski all hit one over the fence, but the real run producer was Caruso. She had two home runs and brought home six runs. Gubellini pitched five and on third innings with four strikeouts. The final score was 17-11.

The second game was also a win for the softball team where they outscored Post seven to one. Runs were driven in by Garczynski, Lavallee, Gubellini, Jessica Torsiello, and Mo Hannon who had a home run in the game. Lavalle was also stellar on the mound pitching seven innings, allowing five hits and one run, while striking out five batters.

Two more wins came in the Penmen doubleheader home openers against Merrimack on Mar 26. The first game resulted in a three to two win. Hannon, Horiuchi, and junior Erin Morrissey drove in runs for Lavallee who pitched another strong game. She went seven more innings and struck out eight batters.

Game number two resulted in another win. Hannon once again homered and knocked in three runs. Lavallee also hit a home run and she also had three RBIs. Caruso, Torsiello, and Horiuchi also brought runs home. Gubellini pitched the first four innings in which she gave up five runs, but struck out four batters. The last three innings were pitched by Lavalle who gave up only four hits, surrendered zero runs, and struck out five batters. The final score of this contest was 12-5 in favor of the Penmen.

Next up for the Penmen is a double header at home against Franklin Pierce on Wed, Mar. 30, at 3 p.m. and 5 p.m.




more of a reason to respect him with his accolades and as an un-

10 CLOVERFIELD LANE IS A DISCONCERTING THRILL RIDE

"10 Cloverfield Lane," released on Mar. 11, is the first film by director Dan Trachtenberg, and was produced by JJ Abrams. It stars Mary Elizabeth Winstead (Scott Pilgrim vs. the World), John Goodman (yo u know who he is), and John Gallagher Jr. (known primarily for stage acting) as our only characters.

Taking place almost en-

tirely underground in a fallout shelter, "10 Cloverfield Lane" is an incredibly cramped and uncomfortable film, but it was definitely the intent of the director and cinematographer to get those feelings across.

Almost anything I can say about the film would be spoilers, as everything that happens is pretty much essential to the plot, which is a good thing.

Instead of a summary, I'll just sing praises. The film is very well put together. Every

scene matters, and almost every element introduced is connected in some way that makes them more important down the line.

John Goodman gives an excellent, if not a little over the top, performance as a creepy and demanding conspiracy theorist, Mary Elizabeth Winstead gives one of the most realistic performances of a woman in her position that I've probably ever seen in a film, and John Gallagher Jr. plays a loveable

guy who acts as support for Winstead and as comic relief in this very serious and very tense

Running at an hour and 45 minutes, and only about 15 of those minutes being spent above ground, the cast and crew have little space to work with to present a compelling story. They absolutely succeeded. I was wrapped up in nearly every moment and was waiting to see what would happen next.

From start to finish (and

the opening scene before the title card is one of the most intense scenes in the film) I was captivated. The only time the film might lose some audience members is in the last ten minutes. Again, no spoilers, but the end is the only connection to the first "Cloverfield" that the movie has.

"10 Cloverfield Lane" is not a sequel nor is it a prequel. If anything, it runs parallel to the first film but in an entirely different part of the country. Narratively, visually, and thematically, the movies share very little in common. Don't go in expecting to see another "Cloverfield," because that's not what it is. Treat those two extra words like they mean something, because they do.

I thoroughly enjoyed "10 Cloverfield Lane" and now would really like to see another film from the "Cloverfield" universe because of it. It might be too creepy and unsettling for some viewers, and the ending might ruin it for a few as well, but for this reviewer. "10 Cloverfield Lane" gets an 8.5/10 and is well worth watching.

Last issue I covered Haywyre's "Two Fold Pt. 1" album and why he makes me feel like a worthless human being. This time it's the "Pt. 2" and a little more of why I'm a worthless human being.

With every track seemingly focused on being danceworthy—except for "Transient," an emotional piano track dedicated to his grandfather who passed away during production— it's easy to think that Haywyre might've lost some of his originality and uniqueness.

In "Pt. 1," minor social philosophy was explored, and we were meant to feel as if we were crossing through different cultures throughout the album. In "Pt. 2," we're meant to dance and get lost in the pulsations of the music.

But if you listen to the vocals, which are heavily distorted and sometimes hard to understand, Haywyre is ex-



ploring philosophy again. For example, there's a 47 second interlude after "I Am You" called "Restraint." With an airy backing track of static and a light piano tune, a deep pitch shifted voice (presumably Haywyre's) speaks about how "every concept, every notion has a counterpart... yet, every idea's opposite is just the absence of the idea

itself." It might sound a little like babble, but the voice and the instrumental make it all sound interesting.

The album concludes with "Endlessly," a song seemingly about the butterfly effect and how every idea is infinite. Maybe. I honestly have no idea. But it's one of the best tracks on the album, and there's a live performance of it

on Haywyre's YouTube channel that's worth watching.

"Two Fold Pt. 2" is an excellent and very different follow-up to "Pt. 1." Consisting of nine tracks and running for about twenty-nine minutes, it's a short listen. But it's not one I'd pass up. You can stream it on Spotify or purchase it from Monstercat or iTunes for \$8.


POKKEN TOURNAMENT CHANGES HOW POKEMON TRAINERS BATTLE

Pokémon battles have been brought to a whole new level with Bandai Namco and The Pokémon Company's release of "Pokkén Tournament," a fighting game based off of the Bandai Namco's game franchise "Tekken."

"Pokkén Tournament" is a spinoff title where players travel to the new region of Ferrum to compete in the Ferrum League. Upon arrival, players select their partner Pokémon out of 14 available Pokémon, customize their character, and then are brought through a tutorial by the in-game character Nia. After that, the world is open for exploration.

There are six locations players can visit in game: "My Town" where you can customize your player; "Online Battle" where you can battle other players online; "Local Battle" where you can play with a friend using a second controller; "Practice" where you can practice your moves;



"Single Battle" where you can battle CPUs; and the "Ferrum League" where you can progress through the games story.

In the Ferrum League, players start off as a Rank D trainer and have to battle through League Matches to level up their rank until they can enter the tournament at Rank 8 or lower. If gamers successfully beat the tournament, they can go on to fight the Promotion Test Leader. If

players beat them as well, they can rank up to Rank C, Rank B, and so on.

There are several Leagues starting off with Green League. If players complete all of the leagues, they will become the league champions.

Battling in "Pokkén Tournament" is good for a first time fighting game; however, things could be improved. When player's Pokémon are knocked down, there is no way to safely recover and get up. The best players can do is try to guard before the opponent can land a hit. Because of this, players can spam certain moves that stagger opponents, making it so they get stuck in an infinite loop of damage with barely any way to escape.

Each player can choose a Support Team to help them throughout the battle. Each support team comes with two support Pokémon. Players can choose one per round, and once their support gauge is full, they can call them in in order to perform a move to either knock back a foe, stun them, lower their attack or defense, along with many more varying effects.

"Synergy" is a new term utilized throughout this game. Players collect synergy throughout a battle, and when their Synergy Gauge is full, they can either mega evolve their Pokémon or have them get an increase in power depending on whether they have a mega form or not. When in Synergy Mode, a player's Pokémon will have increased stats, new move sets, and they are allowed a Burst Attack where, if it hits, a cut scene starts where they perform their ultimate move.

Overall, "Pokkén Tournament" is a decent fighting style game that is sure to be a lot of fun for long time fans of the franchise. It puts a different perspective on Pokémon battles and really immerses gamers into the battle.

FIREWATCH: AN EMOTIONAL ADVENTURE

The first-person, narrativedriven exploration genre has become one of gaming's go-to mediums for effective storytelling, thanks to successes like 2013's "Gone Home." This trend continues in "Firewatch," developed by Campo Santo. Through masterful art direction and a believable world where the player connects with real human emotion and reaction, "Firewatch" is one of the most emotional and thought-provoking games to hit the market in years.

"Firewatch" opens by presenting the main character, Henry, who is introduced in a miniature text adventure that quickly turns his world from laughter and love to sadness and frustration. Henry decides to spend the summer of 1989 as a fire

lookout in a Wyoming national park, armed with a walkie-talkie (and little else) through which he communicates with his boss and fellow fire lookout, Delilah.

"Firewatch" is told in chapters that span the summer's 90 days, starting with a pair of nogood teenage girls causing trouble for Henry. Things quickly change when the girls go missing and Henry and Delilah realize they may not be alone in these woods

There's not much to do in "Firewatch" aside from exploring the forest; those expecting a confrontation between Henry and vicious park goers or wildlife will be disappointed.

This exploration, though, is what gives "Firewatch" its immersive charm. Diving deeper and deeper into the forest and its mysteries propels the plot forward and introduces new areas that quickly become staples on the map that you'll return to time and time again with a new perspective each time as events unfold. Getting lost in the woods is a common frustration with just the map in hand, but extra tools like the compass and climbing gear, the game's only "power-ups," help ease the pain.

The forest truly comes to life through amazing art direction. Beautifully sculpted environments and dynamic lighting help each location shine. Day and night create different moods with the colors they paint the environment, at times eliciting feelings of peace and tranquility while at other times representing isolation and fear.

Outstanding performances

by "Firewatch's" voice actors further immerse the player in the world, with real, emotional, and frequently humorous dialogue between Henry and Delilah. I spoke with Delilah on my walkie-talkie whenever I could, which added an extra bit of interactivity to an already gripping story.

I reached "Firewatch's" ending after five or six hours. Opinions on the ending will differ, as a consistently thrilling story comes to an undeniably anticlimactic conclusion.

At first, I didn't understand how the ending could make such few waves, but, over time, I've come to appreciate the ending for being grounded in reality and not giving in to what gamers and viewers of any story have come to expect from an ending, all while still delivering a poignant message that I'm still thinking about weeks after finishing the game.

"Firewatch" becomes less of a traditional game narrative and more of a view into human nature and real human emotion which made me appreciate it and think about it more than many other games I've played in recent years.





That is a constant struggle to keep alive.


No way out Fear constricts my life And keeps me in a box With no light or hope.
