New Hampshire State Political Fair

Tables horseshoed the gymnasium in the athletic complex at SNHU on Thursday October 12, providing a "political buffet" to students, faculty and the Manchester community.

Gubernatorial candidates Jim Coburn and Richard Kahn were featured speakers at the event along with Mayor Guinta of Manchester.

Committees and organizations from all over the state in attendance ranged from "Just \$6," an organization in favor of public funding of federal elections — campaign volunteers for congressional representative Charlie Bass, the ONE campaign to the New Hampshire Higher Education Assistance Foundation (NHHEAF) and the New Hampshire Center for Constitutional Studies, Inc.

Candidates touched upon the importance for higher education and its funding. "The

vision I have for New Hampshire is when our students graduate from high school, they're ready for the next step," Coburn said.

"It's incumbent upon each and every one of us to demand honesty," Guinta said. "Politics in this state is the number one sport."

As the first in the nation primary, it is imperative for

New Hampshire citizens to get out there and vote. This state has a competitive advantage over others.

Okendo Lewis Gayle, 23, SGA President came into the planning task with an understanding of the challenge of taking on anything political. The overall event turnout was slim in attendance but according to Gayle, that is no excuse to give up.

"It was extremely well organized and well presented," Prince Soko said. Soko, 21, was the chair of the New Hampshire State Political Fair committee. Soko expressed interest in seeking ways to include political studies in our academic curriculum at SNHU.

Gayle and Soko left these words to the SNHU community – "If not here, where? If not now, when? If not I, who?"

"It's about civic responsibility," Gayle said. "It needs to be prioritized in our institution."

The New Hampshire State Political Fair was organized in a short while, proposing the idea in July and forming a committee that very same month.

Manchester Sees Crime Increase; SNHU Stays Safe

Serious crimes have been on the rise in Manchester in the past few months. Shootings, stabbings, prostitution and widespread drug distribution are making headlines in the local media. Although Southern New Hampshire University is located in a safe pocket on the Manchester/Hooksett border, it's important for the school community to be aware of the increased instances of crime just minutes from campus.

In an interview with Union Leader staff writer, Gary Rayno, deputy police chief Glenn Reid acknowledged the increase of crime in the queen city, but was unable to explain the increase.

"I don't have an answer as to why," Reid said, "simply we're a city- the largest city- and there are similar events in other cities in other states," he said.


The Manchester Police Department has initiated increased patrol around some of the hot spots, known for crime in the area. A Southern New Hampshire University student recalled seeing increased patrol behind Elm Street after a stabbing occurred in late September.


"When I first started working at Margarita's on Elm Street, I heard horror stories of people being mugged and stabbed in the parking garage behind the restaurant," junior Samantha Labbie said. "I didn't realize that Manchester was a dangerous city until I worked downtown," she said.

Since the stabbing, Labbie has arranged for her friends to pick her up after work, instead of parking on the city streets.

"I'm uncomfortable walking on the downtown streets alone late at night. I'd rather be cautious and have my friends pick me up. It's a personal choice that makes me feel safer," Labbie continued.

Although Manchester's crime has increased, director of Public Safety, James Winn, says that using common sense will significantly increase your chances of staying safe in the downtown area.

"Parking in well-lit locations, carrying a cell phone and being aware of your surroundings are important when your downtown," Winn said. "There are certain hot spots in Manchester that you should just avoid altogether. Otherwise, using your common sense when deciding where you're going will help to keep you safe," he continued.

Another Southern New Hampshire student who is a waitress at Margarita's says that she usually feels pretty safe in Manchester, but she uses her common sense when she leaves work late at night.

"I'm from a small town, so

working in Manchester does scare meattimes, but overall, it's really not a bad place to work," said junior Courtney Tosches.

"When I leave at night, I usually wait until a coworker is ready to leave so we can walk to our cars together. I park as close to the restaurant as possible and I'm aware of the activity that's going on around me," Tosches said.

Both Labbie and Tosches say that they feel safest when they return to campus.

"It's like SNHU is in its own little world," Labbie said. "There are minor things that happen on campus, but overall, I feel comfortable living here," she said.

Winn says he does not predict that our campus community will see an increase in crime.

"We have the proper checks and balances in place at this school to make it a safe place to live," Winn said.

"We have a small population so it makes it easier to identify someone who doesn't belong here. We have the

public safety staff that can respond to any incident in minutes, along with surveillance cameras and security measures that all work to ensure the safety of this campus," he said.

Although the security measures are in place on campus, Winn emphasizes that it's important for students to play an active role in keeping the campus safe.

"We have ID card access on the east side. You swipe your card to get into your building, your floor, your suite and then a key to open your room door. All the security measures are there to protect the student. If someone sticks a towel in the door, then the security system is defeated," Winn said.

"Follow the security measures that are in place and be a good citizen." Winn said. "We are a safe campus, but we can always do better."

10/6/06 2:55AM Public Safety responded to a trash can fire on East Side Drive. Hooksett Police were driving by at the same time and stopped to put out the fire. Public Safety reviewed camera footage and two males could be seen lighting it at 2:53AM. No one was found on campus matching their description.

9/30/06 1:36AM Public Safety saw a student drinking a Bud Light can at the entrance to Winnisquam. His information was taken down and the beer was poured out. Ten minutes later, they again saw the student drinking a Bud Light outside. The second was also dumped and the student

was walked inside, Public Safety noticing another beer in his rear pocket and confiscating it.

9/30/06 12:15AM The RD of the West Side

apartments called for assistance with an unregistered guest. Two Public Safety officers arrived and asked for an ID from the student who told them he didn't have one. The subject was very uncooperative and would give them information. He was escorted to the main entrance where he requested to walk but was told he could not because they didn't know his age and he smelled of alcohol. Hooksett Police were called while the individual was told to wait. He became very volatile at this point and pushed a Public Safety officer over an embankment while the officer held onto his shirt. Two more officers managed to pull the subject away and subdue him. The police arrived and placed the individual in handcuffs. Manchester Police were then called because the incident occurred on the Manchester side of the line. The individual was taken into custody after a search turned up an ID and knife.

Stock Market Hits a New All-Time High

We hear people referring to it all the time with things like, "the market's doing well this year," or "the market was down today," but what does "the market," actually mean?

"The market," refers to the Dow Jones Industrial Average, a market index that tracks the stock prices for 30 large, well-known, and heavily invested companies. Corporations such as Microsoft, Wal-Mart, and McDonald's are Dow components. The Dow Jones Industrial Average has been used for over 100 years and many long-term investors own at least one Dow stock.

On Oct. 3, the Dow closed the trading day at 11,727, a new all-time high. The previous high was 11,722 set back on Jan.14, 2000. From 2000 to 2002 the market was down and the Dow slid to a low of 7,286 in Oct. 2002. Since 2003, the market has been up, and the Dow finally reached levels not seen in nearly seven years. The 2000 to 2002 period was known as a bear market, in which stocks generally move downward. Since 2003, we have been in a bull market, in which stocks are generally rising higher.

Other well-known market indexes besides the Dow are the NASDAQ, and the S&P The NASDAQ tracks

technology companies, some of which are lesser known and are small companies. That index closed at 2,315 on Oct. 10. It is well off its all time high, however, from March 2000 when it traded just above 5,000.

The S&P 500 is similar to the Dow only it tracks the stock prices for 500 companies instead of just 30. Therefore, the S&P is broader and a more accurate representation of the stock market. On Oct. 10, the S&P closed at 1,353, its highest in over five and a half years. The S&P 500 all-time high is 1,526 and was set in March 2000.

The Dow has climbed even more since Oct. 3. As of Oct. 10, the Dow was sitting at 11,867, a gain of about 10% since the beginning of 2006. Part of the reason for the rise in the stock market is the nearly \$20 drop in the price of crude oil since July. This also led to lower gasoline prices. When oil and gas prices drop, it costs companies less to do business. It also leads to more consumer spending because people can better afford to gas up the car and go on shopping trips.

Many analysts expect the rally in stocks to continue for the rest of 2006, and into 2007. The Dow could move above 12,000, and the S&P could reach a new all-time high. The solid gains should bring new investors into the stock market and retain old ones.

The World is Open - Study Abroad

SNHU has opened its doors yet again to a world of opportunity to its student body, this timeraising academic standards and giving students the chance to study around the world.

Dr. Jorge Garcia, Associate Vice President of International Affairs, joined the SNHU community in January 2006. Since then SNHU has affiliated with USAC, the University Studies Abroad Consortium.

In previous years, London was the only opportunity for students to study abroad here at SNHU. The University Studies Abroad Consortium provides students with 37 programs in 25 different countries. "We are opening the world to SNHU students," Garcia said.

programs USAC has all over the world includ-

ing Australia, Chile, China, Costa Rica, France, Germany, Ghana, India, Ireland, Italy, Mexico, New Zealand, Spain, and The United Kingdom.

Students can study abroad in a country of their choice for up to two semesters, whether it is in the fall, spring or even summer. The courses you study abroad are applied to your major with all credits transferable.

There are study abroad information sessions currently taking place twice a week in the Corcoran room located in the Student Center on Tuesdays at 3:30 p.m. and Wednesdays at 12:30 p.m. Applications for students who wish to study abroad during the spring semester of 2007 will be accepted up to and on the date of October 31.

What does this cost, you might ask? "All of your financial aid travels with you,"

Garcia said. The cost to study abroad is roughly the same cost to study here at SNHU. In most cases, the only money you will have to save is for airfare and personal expenses.

"Iamtryingtoidentifyafund for travel scholarships," Garcia said. Garcia met with Financial Aid and discussed allowing one item in the budget for cultural travel. "We want you to see the world before coming home."

Studying abroad allow students to network with their profession. "That benefit you will not have by staying home," Garcia said.

The university held its Study Abroad Fair on September 27 of this year. Garcia said it was very successful. Approximately 110 students crowded the pub and expressed interest in a specific time and country they wished to study.

SNHU has accepted sending 100 students per year for a semester or more.

If out of the 37 programs, student wishes to study abroad in a country not offered with USAC, Dr. Garcia is willing and able to discuss further options with that student. 'If you have special needs on particular academic grounds or recommendation by a faculty advisor, I can send you to another country," he said.

If you cannot think of a reason why you would want to study abroad, think of these three purposes Dr. Garcia mentioned - "to continue your studies, to study culture and to see the world."

"The world is open," Garcia

said. The world of opportunity is open to all students at SNHU with a 2.75 GPA or higher. Study abroad is also available to SNHU continuing education and international students.

If there is one thing SNHU can assure its students, it is quality education. USAC will guarantee academic quality and safety for all study abroad students. Dr. Garcia has contact with each and every USAC director and making students' travels safe is his top priority.

Apre-departure orientation will be held Saturday, November 18 in the Walker Auditorium from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. (lunch included) for students studying abroad this coming spring.

This is a stereotype, much like the stereotype of the "frat boy", but times have changed and organizations are returning to the values upon which they were founded. Hazing was common among Greeks in decades past; however, modern thinking has changed how pledges are brought into a fraternity or sorority.

and forbidden hazing among its chapters with severe penalties attached. For instance, the general headquarters of my fraternity, Phi Delta Theta, started anti-hazing and alcohol initiatives in 1997. Also state laws have been created that make hazing a crime. In New Hampshire, a person that engages in hazing can be charged with a misdemeanor, punishable with a fine up to \$2,000 and/or one year in jail. Southern New Hampshire University and the Inter-Greek Council strictly prohibit this kind of conduct during new member education, requiring approval of education programs and taking swift action if a hazing incident allegedly occurs. To mark this anti-hazing stance, Inter-Greek Council will be sponsoring a Greeks Against Hazing Awareness Day on October 24. Look for Greeks wearing orange shirts and stop to ask

and how Greek life has ben-

The Spirit of 1683

Three hundred twenty three years ago, the tide of Islamic expansion into Europe was turned. On September 11, 1683, King Jan III Sobieski arrived with an army of 70,000 Poles. Austrians, and Germans to rout the 140,000-man Turkish army besieging the Austrian capital, Vienna. This was the first time Scrosese and Nicholson worked together on a project and the results were exceptional. Nicholson can thrive under any direction, but with the talent of Scorsese, the performance is superb. Scorsese and DiCaprio have worked together before in both Gangs of New York and The Aviator.




