As announced during Club Day, 3OH!3 will be this year's major concert at SNHU, having tallied the majority of the votes in an online survey. The concert will be Sunday, March 20 at 8 p.m.

3OH!3 (pronounced threeoh-three) is a band made up of two members: Sean Foreman and Nathaniel Motte. They named the band after their home area code, 303, in Boulder, Colorado and came together in 2004.

Their popularity in the last few years has sky rocketed. 3OH!3 had the fifth most hits that reached the billboard charts in 2010. "Starstrukk" and "Don't Trust Me" are two of their most

popular songs. They gained lots of recognition with a single "My First Kiss," which featured the fairly new and popular artist

Ke\$ha. They have also teamed up with Katy Perry and Lil' Jon.

Mary Kayajanian, president of CAPE, seemed pretty

Representative Giffords' Chances Good **Despite Head Wound**

House of Representatives member Gabrielle Giffords, wounded almost fatally in the January 8th Tucson shooting, was moved out of intensive care and into a rehab facility on Wednesday, January 26.

Jared Lee Loughner, the alleged shooter, in addition to firing a bullet through Giffords' brain, shot 18 other people, six of them mortally. Among the dead were U.S. Federal Judge John Roll, nine-year-old Christina-Taylor Green, and Congressional aide Gabriel Zimmerman, who had been engaged to be married. Things initially looked bleak for Giffords as well; when brought from the political event

she had been hosting to the University of Arizona medical center, Giffords was not able to talk and was only able to respond to some simple commands.

Giffords, however, survived brain surgery and has appar-

ently been steadily regaining motor control. MSNBC reports that she is able to raise both of her legs on command, as well as dangle them over the edge of the bed, and is opening her eyes in response to visitors more

frequently. Shortly before being transferred to the rehab facility, a stent was removed from Giffords' skull which had been draining excess fluid around the brain, and her status has been boosted from "serious" to "good." She remains on a breathing tube, and her doctors plan to appraise her ability to speak once she is taken off of it.

Giffords' recovery expected to take at least several months and may be as long as a year. Her doctors, though, are for the moment very optimistic about the chances of that recovery. Dr. Dong Kim, one of Giffords' neurosurgeons, has said that "Gabby's" condition has been improving with "lightning speed."

Loughner has been indicted for the attempted murder of Giffords and two of her aides, though no other charges have yet been filed against him. In the immediate aftermath of the shooting, some commentators searched for some sort of political agenda to blame for his attempted murder of Blue Dog Democrat Giffords, with many theorizing that Loughner was an extremist Tea Party acolyte. The evidence suggests that this is not true, however. A high school friend of Loughner said that "he disliked the news... didn't listen to political radio... didn't take sides" and wasn't on the Left or the Right.

This assertion is backed up by the statements found in Loughner's own YouTube account, which was full of unfocused political musings that are hard, if not impossible, to join into any coherent philosophy. One of the dominant themes seems to be a belief that the United States government is brainwashing and mind controlling its citizens by controlling English grammar. He mentions in his About Me that he greatly enjoys "conscience dreaming," and lists among his favorite books "Mein Kampf," "The Communist Manifesto," and "Alice in Wonderland." Some have speculated that Loughner may have been a paranoid schizophrenic. Another friend of Loughner likened the alleged gunman's attitude to that of the Joker in the movie "The Dark Knight": "he just wants to watch the world burn."

Loughner's grievance with Giffords appears to have originated at a political event in 2007 when Loughner was allowed to personally address a question to Giffords: "What is government if words have no meaning?" Giffords did not answer this question to his satisfaction, and he seems to have held a grudge against her since that incident.

Gabrielle Giffords' road to recovery will be long and hard, but it seems that she, at least, will escape the fate Loughner had planned out for her. But for six others and their families, the damage wrought by Loughner's rampage cannot be repaired.

Health Care Bill Repealed in House

Last fall, Republicans promised their constituents to "repeal and replace" the Health Care Bill, which they are now going into the second phase of. The Republicans pushed legislation to repeal the nation's year-old Health Care Bill through the House of Representatives. On Wednesday night, the vote was largely upon party lines, finishing 245-189. The Republicans went along with the vote, disregarding the opposition in the Senate and a veto threat from President Obama.

Now in the upcoming months, according to GOP officials and WMUR, congressional committees will propose new changes to the legislation, hoping to call for elimination of the now requirement of individuals to purchase coverage. In addition to these changes, "Republicans also intend to try to reverse

many of the changes Democrats made to Medicare Advantage, the private alternative to the traditional government-run health care program for seniors."

Just like the bill itself, this new repealed bill will require Senate approval--even though they were in opposition of it in the first place--and the signature of the president who threatened to veto it.

Many first-term Republican lawmakers could not deny the significant excitement of the Republicans who now have a chance to speak and vote on the house floor against the law they tried for months to repeal. Rep. Jeff Duncan said that this piece of legislation produced by President Obama and Democrats was a "job-killing, socialistic" approach to health care "[and was] misguided, and in need of repeal."

Rep. Steve Southerland of Florida said, "the law imposes a crushing tax burden on businesses, and predicts 1.6 million jobs will be lost by 2014 due to this mandate to require many businesses to provide coverage for employees."

Democrats did try to challenge this, even stating "politically popular elements of the bill that would be wiped out if repeal took effect," WMUR reported. There was, however, a Republican, Jim Moran, who accused some Republicans of being hypocrites because they repealed the law yet went and bought health care coverage for their families through a government-organized program.

This issue is now being brought to the Supreme Court because more than half the states have filed suits against the bill, and one judge ruled that it was unconstitutional to require people to purchase insurance.

In the coming months, Republicans will be sharing their concerns and try to sway people to repeal the bill.

Obama's State of the Union Address

On Tuesday, January 25, President Barack Obama gave his State of the Union Address. He opened by pointing out to the members of Congress and those watching it on television that there was an empty chair where he acknowledged that Gabrielle Gifford would be sitting if she hadn't been in the shooting that killed six people and left her very badly wounded in Tucson, Arizona. President Obama then asked for everyone to start by giving her a moment of prayer in her honor. A shock of the night was when the President decided that, due to the events that occurred in the shooting, Democrats and Republicans are going to sit together and not in separate sections during the speech. I believe that this was due entirely to the shooting, but to show that solidarity with less confrontation in America's poli-

The effort to try and not increase government spending will be hard to accomplish, but according to President Obama, he called for sweeping bipartisan investments in science, education and infrastructure without increasing government spending. In order to help reach this goal, Obama asked for the houses to "cool" the tensions between them so they can work together

in order to hopefully reach this goal. Many of the Republicans and Democrats laughed knowing that is a long shot when the President stated that America is indeed facing a crossroads where the demand for cooperative effort on this is "bigger than party and bigger than politics," reported NBC News.

During this speech, President Obama stated that he would like to propose a freeze on "annual domestic spending for the next five years." While he stated that this funding "like Medicare, Medicaid and Social Security, whose funding is determined by law" would be frozen, according to Alex Johnson of NBC news, he did not say how the government would be able to invest in the sectors of education, biomedical research, information technology and clean energy if the spending is indeed going to be frozen.

Many topics were discussed or mentioned by President Obama during his speech where he touched upon setting structural goals, including simplification of the tax code, doubling of U.S. exports by 2014 and reorganization and consolidation of overlapping federal programs

In the coming months, we can expect to hear a proposal from President Obama on how he and Congress plan to solve certain problems like investment in innovation.

China's President Makes a Visit to United States

The White House spent most of the last couple weeks getting ready for the arrival of China's President Hu Jintao, a 67-year old hydro-electric engineer who has represented China since 2002. President Obama held a state dinner for Hu because during his last visit, five years ago, he was denied a dinner at the White house. According to WMUR, this state dinner should hopefully help relations between these two leaders of the world's largest economies.

During the speech that Hu gave, he stated that, "the people of both China and the United States want to see further progress in [their] relations, and people around the globe want to see greater prosperity in the world."

Since Hu's last visit, China has become the world's second largest economy, and its auto market is now the biggest. Even the rank of internet users exceeds the entire population of the United States. During this same time, "the U.S. has shed five million jobs, suffered a grave financial crisis and seen its unemployment rate double. It's been a tale of two divergent economies," WMUR reported.

During Hu's visit, he made one stop to Chicago to appear at another dinner held in his honor by Mayor Richard Daley. His long efforts to build ties with the world's second largest economy did pay off. During the dinner, Daley stated, "Our long range goal is to make Chicago the most China-friendly city in the U.S."

Many credit Daley for his efforts in visiting China four times since 2004, showing that Chicago is "a global transportation hub with large manufacturing and industrial sectors friendly to Chinese business."

Upon the knowledge that President Obama would be holding a state dinner in honor of Hu, one that George W. Bush denied Hu in 2006, Yuan Peng, director of the Institute of American Studies, said, "The U.S. needs China to help deal with all the challenges it faces. The financial crisis and Great Recession shifted the economic balance between the two nations. While the United States struggled during this time with slow job creation and high unemployment, China barely faced even a

However, according to WMUR, "The U.S. economy is still more than twice the size of China's. But the gap is narrowing. The U.S. economy rose about 16 percent from 2005 to 2010. China's more than doubled."

China reported that its economy grew by 10.3% in 2010 alone; the United States grew less than three percent in 2010.

Hopefully while President Hu is visiting Washington, he will discuss with President Obama hope for our future and the future of China to make our relationships grow stronger.

Fallen Firefighter

Sunday was a very sad day for the Sandown Fire Department when a longtime paramedic and firefighter, Harold Frey, passed away just before noon on January 16, 2011. Frey, along with the Sandown Fire Department, was engaged in a cold ice and water rescue training program in the Exeter River when he had an unfortunate heart attack.

According to WMUR, Frey had gone into the water for the training as part of his requirements for the Fire Department. As he was exiting the freezing water around noon, after being in there for a half hour, Frey began to show signs that he could not breathe. As paramedics neared the scene, they attempted to revive him, but unfortunately, none were successful.

Frey was taken to a local hospital where he was pronounced dead. The cause of death was discovered as a heart attack triggered by the frigid waters. Police are still investigating the case to make sure every possible lead is ruled out, but the cold ice water

could probably give anyone a heart attack.

At the age of 46, Frey had only been with the Sandown Fire Department for a few short months before his death during his training, as reported by MSNBC.

"He was employed as a paramedic by Care Plus and was a volunteer for the Epping Fire Department before joining the Sandown Department two months ago," WMUR reported. As a former Marine, Frey was beloved by all, including his two daughters.

When the police chief and the firefighters who had to witness the horrible event were asked to say a few words, nothing came out. WMUR reported that the police chief said that it was just too painful to talk about.

WMUR discussed that funeral services and arrangements had been scheduled. On Thursday, January 20, a service was planned to remember the dedicated fire fighter. On Friday, January 21, hundreds of family, friends, firefighters, and other personnel attended Frey's funeral located at the Veteran's Cemetery in Boscawen.

New Hope for Hepatitis C Cure

This summer could change many people's lives that have to suffer with the liver-attacking disease Hepatitis C. For years, scientists have been trying to find a completely effective cure for the disease, but so far they have only been able to discover a two-drug treatment that cures about 40 percent of those using it, as well as having very gruesome side effects.

The people who are most at risk of obtaining the disease are the baby boomers "who've [possibly] harbored [it] since their younger, perhaps wilder, years," WMUR reported. The reason that the baby boomer generation may be soon facing the disease now is because it can take two to three decades for it to do its damage.

But the good news is soon to come; WMUR reported that major studies have shown that adding another drug, "either Vertex Pharmaceuticals' telaprevir or Merck & Co.'s boceprevir," will actually boost the cure rate to 75 percent. This new drug will also allow patients using it to cut their treatment time in half where they only need to use it for six months. There will, however, still be the side effects and maybe even more, but the patients only have to suffer for six months and not longer.

"About 3.2 million Americans, and 170 million people worldwide, have chronic hepatitis C," WMUR reported. In the United States, the rate is dropping in new infections but has been named one of the leading causes of liver transplants and kills nearly 12,000 people a year. According to WMUR, this number is expected to triple in the next 20 years. With this new cure, we could control that number.

Hepatitis C is a blood-borne virus and is stigmatized as a risk to those who do illegal drugs. But blood transfusions before 1992 could have started the disease when testing of the blood

supply began. When these new drugs enter, they will block "an enzyme named protease that's key for the virus to reproduce. But they must be taken together with standard medications - ribavirin pills plus injections of interferon-alpha - that are thought to boost the immune system," WMUR reported.

In a recent medical meeting, 67 to 75 percent of the patients that used either Boceprevir or Telaprevir had what doctors called a cure. Doctors determine that a treatment is a cure when patients have no sign of the virus six months after the last dose taken. The side effects of the drugs are flu-like symptoms and others from the existing treatment. If you use Telaprevir, the main side effect is a severe rash, and the side effect for boceprevir is anemia.

The hope is that the Food and Drug Administration will hopefully approve the drugs in the summer and change the lives of many people who have to suffer with Hepatitis C.



It is around this time of year that movie enthusiasts all over the country begin counting the hours as the 83 annual Academy Awards loom closer and closer. With the memory of the Golden Globe awards still fresh, there is typically an influx of moviegoers scrambling to see the collection of high brow films unknown to them prior to their nomination. 2010 gave birth to several marvels (and twice as many flops) that should be cherished for years to come. Briefly, I would like to go over some of the best films for this year before I give my predictions for the 5/6 major Oscar categories. "The Social Network"

The origin of the largest social network today is filled with as much anecdotal friendship, betraval, uncertainty, and overall greatness as any other masterpiece. The varying motivations and thought provoking traits each character possesses, and its overall affect on the single common idea (Facebook), makes for some very interesting conflict to be built up and resolved in two hours. David Fincher's masterful choreography of the entire film lends to "The Social Network" a magnificent, exuberant, and empowering outlook into one of the biggest cultural phenomena of our generation. The marvelous pacing of this film also allows the viewer to grasp a very good outlook of the different stressors facing the fledgling company as its total users climbed from 600, to 3,000, to 75,000, to 1,000,000 and so on. Aaron Sorkin's sharp dialogue illuminates Mark Zuckerberg's inherent genius and societal awareness, while portraying his obvious Asperger's syndrome. A major boon to this movie's direction is that it does not pander and sympathize with its main character when it is unwarranted. At many times, "The Social Network" portrays its founder in a completely objective and gritty manner; while it may make the real Mark Zuckerberg flinch, it is all the more authentic and excellent because of it.

"Black Swan"

The overall atmosphere of Black Swan is very reminiscent of several of director Darren Aronofsky's earlier films, such as "Requiem for a Dream" and "Pi." While the spiraling lives of its main characters are the direct result of drug abuse in "Requiem for a Dream," in "Black Swan," the ensuing madness is due to Nina Sayers (Natalie Portman)

perfectionist nature towards her Duke of York was at the same ballet. For anyone who is familiar time moving and nail-biting. with the plot of Swan Lake, the piece being performed by Nina's ballet company, they will notice that its plot and that of Black Swan intentionally mirror each other. Nina Sayers constantly experiences delusions throughout the film which are shocking and disturbing. These visions combined with the increasingly chaotic series of events and Natalie Portman's sublime and haunting performance make the film gritty, suspenseful, and powerful. The phenomenal acting on the main character's behalf was also reinforced by the rest supporting cast. The rival ballerina in the film was meant to be both sinister and innocent, contrasting Nina's paranoid perception with reality and Mila Kunis does this perfectly. Her snub from the Best Supporting Actress category particularly surprised me. Overall, this film was a spectacular character portrait with a unique stylization and ambience that will leave audiences breathless after watching it.



"The King's Speech"

Based on the life of King George VI during the beginning of the Second World War, "The King's Speech" is a masterful contemporary film that is both eccentric and serious. The immaculate expectations of royalty threatened by the emotional and verbal shortcomings of a single member proved to be an excellent source of conflict, portraying the tumultuous relationship between Albert and his father/brother. Colin Firth's performance as the insecure, stammering and conflicted This movie's atmosphere graciously switches from a memorable light-hearted entourage of character quirks and intelligent comedy to a somber outlook on royalty and England as a whole just before it is about to plunge into its second and far more fearsome war with Germany. The awkward and yet tender relationship between Prince Albert and his speech therapist is very touching. Leading with a total of 12 Oscar nominations, three of which for the acting of each of its most prominent characters, this surprise film is a welcome start to what should hopefully be another great decade of filmmaking.

"Inception"

In a different vein, the sheer amount of suspense and technical content that this movie is able to put forth without appearing rushed is impressive. "Inception" is ultimately popcorn entertainment, but it possesses a high level of quality and intelligence that all popcorn entertainment should strive to meet.

rise through the boxing ranks provide the narrative arc, the film is focused squarely on the players riding along for the journey – Mickey, Dicky, Alice, and Charlene. This is yet another movie like "Yojimbo" that can be filed in the I-Freaking-Love-Japan folder. For better or worse, Japanese film is almost always a reliable source of story and imagery so far out that I can't help but love it. For example, let's look at the insanity in the animated movie "Fist of the North Star" (Please note that, in the interest of simplicity, I will be using the voice actors and character names used in the English localization).

The story takes place in an alternate future where the Cold War escalated to world-destroying levels. Only a few survivors are able to barely make a living. Among them is martial arts master Ken (John Vickery) and his beloved Julia (Melodee Spevack), who are attempting to revitalize the world. Jealous of their love, Ken's former friend Shin (Michael McConnohie) beats Ken to the edge of death and takes Julia as his queen in his new world order. Barely alive and out for vengeance, Ken must use

his mastery of his combat style called Fist of the North Star – an art that focuses on key nerves and power points with (often explosively) lethal results – to find Julia and set the world right again.

Given the nature of Ken's fighting style, the levels of blood in this movie are laughably ridiculous. The villains tend to act less like people and more like 10 gallon bags of gore under pressure. This bloody nature, combined with the Bruce Lee/ Mad Max aesthetic of most of the main characters, is why many have given this movie the tonguein-cheek title of "The manliest anime ever made." The plot may be hard to follow at times, but those in need of a complex story to complement their B-Grade cheesy movies will appreciate the many twists in the story.

This is what I call a "Gate-way Cult Classic." If you can appreciate a nice combination of cheesy action/kung-fu moments and complicated plots, "Fist of the North Star" is a great starting point for up and coming B-movie geeks.

Women's Hoop Team Rolls Through **January**

After some early season struggles led to a 3-7 start, the Southern New Hampshire University women's basketball team breezed through the month of January with a 7-2 record. The surge puts their current record at 10-9 overall and 8-7 in Northeast-10 conference play, placing them eighth in the 16-team league and just two games back of the top four teams.

Six of the nine games in January were decided by 10 points or less, and the Penmen won three times by a mere three-point margin. The Penmen, who went

4-1 on the road and 3-1 at home throughout the month, suffered a loss on January 15 in an 84-78 overtime battle at Le Moyne and also fell to Assumption this past Saturday. But other than those two setbacks, the Penmen opened up the new calendar year with four straight wins and also put together a mild three-game win streak later in the month.

"We are excited about our success, but our motto is to stav in the moment and take one game at a time," said sixth-year head coach Karen Pinkos. "The NE-10 is too good for us to overlook any opponent regardless of their record. But the champion-

Half-century Dry Spell Ends for Auburn

When you think about a car crash, the biggest changes happen in such a quick span of time. They are unpredictable, dangerous, and adrenaline-spiking. The same can be said about this past NCAA football season.

There is no point in predicting what could happen each season because it typically goes awry. There comes a point in every season where one game serves as an excellent example that college football is not a cookie-cutter spectacle. For instance, the South Carolina Gamecocks ran over the roll-tide champions and their 19-game winning streak with a 35-21 victory. Although South Carolina was a tough contender in the regular season, their disappointing losses and major upset in the SEC championship exemplified their vulnerability to NCAA's true opponent this year: Auburn. Once again, the SEC proved to be the dominant conference in this year's BCS championship.

But was Auburn foreseen as the team to beat?

At the beginning of the season, the Tigers faced schools that many would not typically consider to be football powerhouses. Auburn further progressed in the season with major conference wins against South Carolina, Arkansas, LSU, and Alabama. Rising alongside the Tigers was the Pac-10 stronghold in Oregon. Over the years, Oregon has steadily risen as a

Addressing the Patriots' **Greatest Needs**

Most Patriots fans were pleasantly surprised by their team's regular season success, as the Patriots took what appeared to be a 10-win team to a 14-2 record in a relatively tough divi-However, expectations soared for the Patriots as they entered the playoffs the NFL favorite to win the Super Bowl. Unfortunately, such hopes ended rather abruptly in a divisional round loss to the rival Jets, destroying the hype surrounding the Patriots and forcing them to consider a longer offseason than expected.

Where can the Patriots hope to improve? Well, the game with the Jets brought to light some rather troubling trends that were downplayed throughout the generally successful regular season. To make a greater playoff push than they have the past two years, the Patriots will have to address some needs via free agency (if and when the Collective Bargaining Agreement is renewed) and the draft.

Though many of the sacks

of Tom Brady were coverage sacks during the Jets game, there are obviously still some issues with the Patriots offensive line. Logan Mankins and Matt Light are both free agents, Stephen Neal might retire, and Nick Kaczur was placed on IR this season, placing his future with the Patriots in question. Clearly, the line is in need of a major overhaul. As far as early draft picks are concerned, Anthony Castonzo, Gabe Carimi, Nate Solder, Stefen Wisniewski, and Mike Pouncey would all be viable players to fill holes across the line. Of course, much of this depends upon who they re-sign during free agency and whether or not the Patriots think Sebastian Vollmer can make the transition over to LT.

After losing Ty Warren for the season to a hip injury, the Patriots defensive line had its share of questions marks and depth concerns. Vince Wilfork was the anchor of the defensive line this season, playing NT and DE at times according to the matchups presented. Gerard Warren, Myron Pryor, Mike Wright and Brandon Dea-

derick filled in well enough for the Patriots, but most were hurt towards the end of the season, and the Patriots need a serious talent infusion at the 3-4 DE position. Although Ron Brace played well at times, he needs to stay healthy next season to remain with the team. Potential draft picks in the first two rounds that the Patriots could be looking at to fill the 3-4 DE void could be Cameron Jordan, J.J. Watt, Muhammad Wilkerson, Christian Ballard, and Cameron Heyward.

Perhaps the most obvious problem with the Patriots that fans have been harping about for several years now is a lack of a pass rush, which came back to haunt them against the Jets. Jermaine Cunningham was solid at setting the edge at the OLB position, often lining up in a threepoint stance as he transitioned to the position. Rob Ninkovich, Tully Banta-Cain, Eric Moore, and Dane Fletcher all made contributions as well, but none of them are true studs. Tamba Hali and Lamarr Woodley are both free-agent options for the

Patriots, but they may be reticent to spend money on such a player after the Adalius Thomas debacle. Ryan Kerrigan, Aldon Smith, and Justin Houston could all come in through the draft and solidify the OLB position, while giving the Patriots some semblance of a pass rush.

The Patriots also have depth issues at the RB position, potentially losing Kevin Faulk, Fred Taylor and Sammy Morris to free-agency (with Benjarvus Green-Ellis being a restricted free agent). Additionally, the Patriots receivers, though they are generally quick and can run

routes well, lack the size and explosiveness needed to keep a defense honest; as a result, the Jets mixed coverages throughout the game without having to worry about the top of the defense being taken off. Finally, although the Patriots appear to have a stud at the CB position for years to come (Devin McCourty) and they will be getting Leigh Bodden back, they could still use a steady nickel back since Kyle Arrington and Darius Butler do not seem to be the answer there.

However, the team does have some hope for the future, as

many young players stepped up and played very well this season. Rookies Devin McCourty, Rob Gronkowski, Aaron Hernandez, Jermaine Cunningham, Brandon Spikes, and Zoltan Mesko all made significant contributions to the team throughout the season. Finally, any team with Tom Brady as its QB and Bill Belichick as its head coach will always have a good chance at success; nonetheless, the window of opportunity is quickly closing, and the chance of an NFL lockout next season is certainly becoming a much greater possibility with every passing day.

Much of SNHU's success is due in large part to the team's pair of post presences in grad student Julia Houghtaling and sophomore Sloane Sorrell, who are the only two players to start all 19 games this season. Sorrell is scoring at a 10.4 clip per game and grabbing 6.4 rebounds per contest this season while Houghtaling, who missed all of last season due to injury, became the 14th player in program history to reach 1,000 career points in a January 25 victory at New Haven. She is close to averaging a double-double and currently leads the team in scoring (13.8 ppg) and rebounding (9.3 rpg).

"We have really come together as a team and have started playing well with each other," said Houghtaling, who averaged 15.4 points and 8.8 rebounds per contest during January. "We have had some big wins this past month and those wins have given us the confidence to know that we can play with anyone."

"She is truly a team leader and is the hardest worker on this team," said Pinkos of Houghtaling. "She is older and more mature and sitting out last year helped her become a better and smarter player."

Sophomore Michelle DeRoma, a transfer from American International College, is third on the team in scoring (9.7 ppg) and leads the team with 37 three-pointers made. Junior Christine Duffy is playing 36 minutes a game while handing out 4.4 assists per contest. Pinkos cites DeRoma's improvements as a shooter and Duffy's high-energy play as two key elements to the Penmen's recent success.

Perhaps the most exciting win of the month came on January 5 against Adelphi, when DeRoma knocked down a three-pointer at the buzzer to propel the Penmen to a 73-70 victory. The Penmen's next contest is set for 1:30 p.m. on Saturday, February 5 against Franklin Pierce at the SNHU Fieldhouse. Packers, Steelers Headed to the Big Dance

Sunday, January 23 treated football fans to both the AFC and NFC Championship games, showcasing the talents of perhaps the two best squads in their respective conferences. The NFC North champion Chicago Bears hosted the sixth seeded Green Bay Packers while the New York Jets traveled to Pittsburgh to take on the Steelers.

Despite several late Chicago comeback attempts, various quarterback changes by the Bears and a resilient Packers' secondary ultimately sealed the Bears fate. The Packers left Soldier Field with a 21-14 victory, punching their ticket to another Super Bowl appearance, their first since the 1998 season and their fifth appearance in franchise history.

The Packers went ahead early after a seven-play, 84-yard drive culminated with an Aaron Rodgers' rushing touchdown. The story of the first half, however, was certainly the struggling Bears offense, which was unable to put any points on the board in the first 30 minutes. A second Green Bay score, this time a four-yard rush from rookie running back James Starks, put the Pack up 14-0 at halftime.

Following a halftime regroup, Bears quarterback Jay Cutler left the game with a knee injury early in the third. After second-string journeyman Todd Collins began his appearance 0-4 through the air, third year quarterback Caleb Hanie went under center. Hanie's first drive ended with a 1-yard Chester Taylor rushing touchdown to make it a one-score game. However, on a later Bears possession, Green Bay's 337-pound nose tackle, B.J. Raji, picked off Hanie and took it 18 yards for the touchdown and a 21-7 Packer lead.

Hanie hooked up with Earl Bennett for a touchdown to once again make it a one possession game, but another Hanie interception down the stretch ended Chicago's hopes at victory.

In the AFC championship, the Steelers scored on the game's opening drive when Rashard Mendenhall punched it in from a mere one yard out. With the Jets offense struggling early on, Pittsburgh put up another 10 points on a Ben Roethlisberger rushing score and a field goal.

With just under 2 minutes left in the first half, Steelers cornerback Ike Taylor was able to strip Jets quarterback Mark Sanchez as he dropped back for a pass. Pittsburgh's William Gay snatched up the loose ball and returned in 19 yards for yet another Steelers touchdown. The Jets managed a late first-half scoring drive, but still headed to the locker room down 24-3.

The second half saw Sanchez and the Jets offense shine against the highly respected Steelers defense. The Jets stingy defense prevented Pittsburgh from scoring any points in the second half, while Sanchez was able to throw two touchdowns in the final 30 minutes of play. The first came in the form of a 45-yard strike to Santonio Holmes to give New York some shred of momentum, putting the score at 24-10.

Following a Steelers goal line stand, the Jets defense brought down Roethlisberger in his own end zone after a botched snap for a safety and subsequent ball possession. Sanchez then drove down the field to throw an eventual four-yard touchdown pass to Jericho Cotchery to cut the deficit to five.

But the Steelers were able to complete several first downs, forcing the Jets to use their timeouts as the game clock expired. The victory sends the Steelers to the Super Bowl for a NFL-record eighth time. It will be their third appearance in the past six years.



Newton leaves behind an outstanding record at Auburn, becoming the first SEC player to throw for 2,000 yards and rush for 1,000 yards in a single season. Currently, the Washington Redskins, among many other organizations, are paying much attention to the 21-year-old from College Park, Georgia. But the country can only speculate as to where he will end up as a professional.

As for next season, could Auburn defend their title or shatter without Newton? Will the SEC make a run towards its eighth appearance in the championship game? Clearly, it is all unpredictable.

Hospitality and Tourism was the major for Kimberly Monk as she graduated from Florida International University with an undergraduate degree. The reason that Monk decided to pursue hospitality and tourism was due to the fact that in her hometown, Ocho Rios Jamaica, she struggled with the fact that it was overrun by visitors who had certain rights and liberties as paying customers that were denied to the locals of her hometown. "This resulted in unequal economic, social and cultural relationships between the tourists and locals. I wanted to make a difference; to change how tourists viewed the destinations they visited and to change the locals' perceptions of the visitors."

Soon thereafter, Monk decided to attend SNHU, and she received her master's degree in business administration. The decision to teach here was an easy one for Monk not only because she "worked in the hospitality industry in a variety of training positions," giving her the natural progression to teach at the university level, but also because she "was impressed with the
