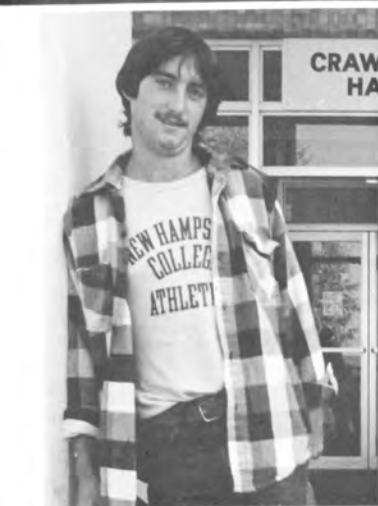

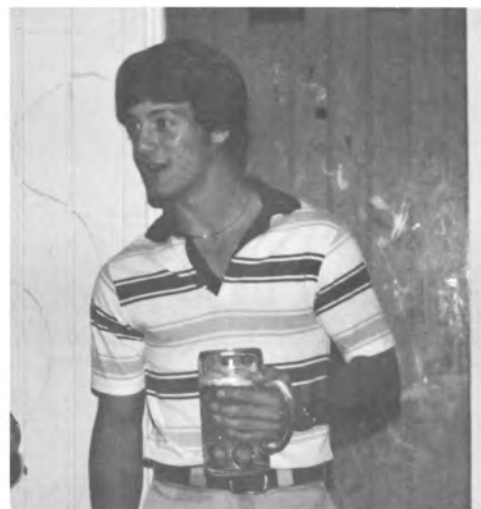

Of the \$50,000 needed to construct the pub, the SGA contributed \$40,000 and obtained the additional \$10,000 in the form of an interest free loan from the college. Through the sale of memberships (\$5 for students, \$7.50 for others), additional funds were made available for the start-up costs, estimated to be approximately \$5,000.

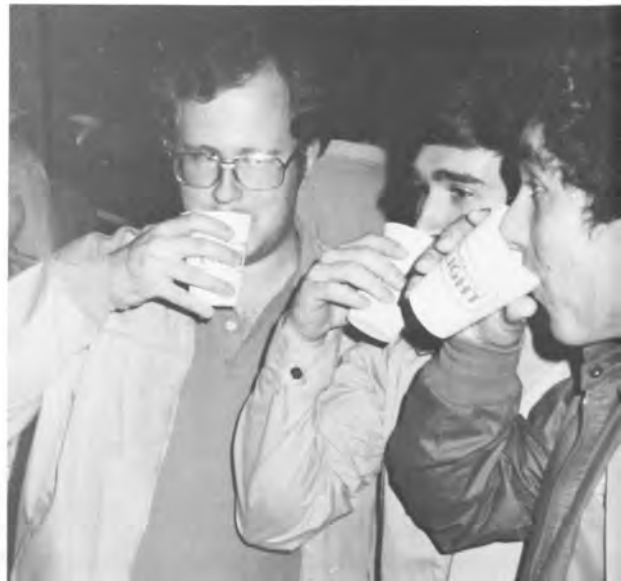

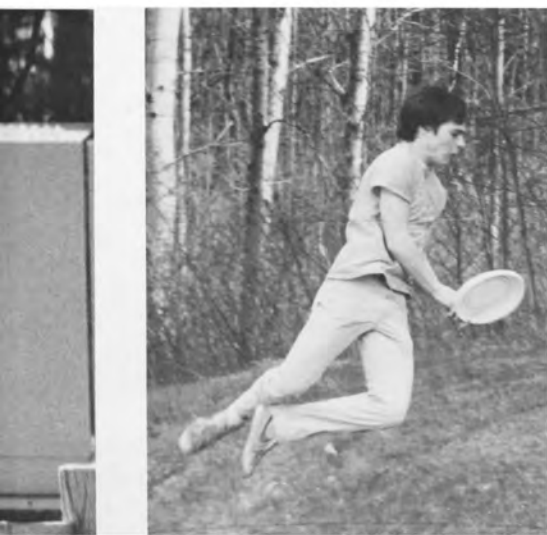
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Monte Carlo Night
