MUBARAK AWAD is the Founder of the Palestinian Center for the Study of Nonviolence in Israel. He believes that nonviolence can sustain a drive for Palestinian statehood and peaceful coexistence with Israel. Born in Jerusalem, Awad came to the United States in 1969 and was exposed to the principles of nonviolence as expounded by Mohandas Gandi and Martin Luther King, Jr. In 1985, he returned to Israel and founded the Center which encouraged economic boycotts, civil disobedience, tax resistance and nonviolent demonstrations. Consequently, he was declared a non-citizen and deported by the Israeli government. Nonetheless, he believes that mutual peace and internal security between Israel and Palestine are possible. Yosef Olmert is a Lecturer in the Department of Middle Eastern and African Studies, Tel Aviv University. This school year he is a Visiting Professor at Cornell University. He is a renowned Israeli television and newspaper commentator. Born in Tel Aviv, educated at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, he served in the Israel Defense Force for three years. Olmert is a close observer and keen analyst of the role and function of the neighboring Arab states. He has written extensively on the possible role of these states in the construction of peace and security in the Middle East. Olmert travels, writes and lectures extensively on the difficulties between Israel and the Palestinians fighting for an independent state.

MARCIA GILLESPIE is one of the most experienced and capable magazine publishers in the country today. Presently, she is the Executive Editor of Ms Magazine. In the early seventies, she established Essence Magazine as the leading publication for Black women as its Editor-in-Chief. While at Essence, she became recognized as one of the nation's strongest spokespersons for the rights and concerns of Black women. A native of New York state, she received her college training at Lake Forest College in Illinois. After graduation, she went to work for **Time-Life Books** and **Life Magazine.** She helped prepare Life Magazine's highly acclaimed "Illustrated History of Black America". Gillespie assumed her present responsibility last year and Ms Magazine has moved quickly and aggressively to the forefront of women-oriented periodicals. She is a member of the Black Professional Women's Network and has been recently recognized by Time Magazine as one of the "Fifty Faces for America's Future". She collaborated with Lena Horne on her autobiography and was the recipient of the Mary McLeod Bethune Award from the National Council of Negro Women.
