Biden Visits SNHU, Hopes to Revive the "American Dream"

After visiting the American Legion Hall, Post 7, in Rochester earlier in the day, Senator Joe Biden, running mate of Barack Obama, visited Southern New Hampshire University's campus on Monday, October 13th. The event attracted community members and students alike, drawing approximately 900 guests.

After short speeches by both Dave Hendrie, a field organizer for the Obama campaign office of Manchester, and state Senator Betsy Devries, Biden was introduced to the audience as the "Future Vice President of the United States of America."

In his speech, Biden focused on key issues in the election, discussing everything from the economy to funding for education, tax breaks for the middle class, and healthcare.

"Americans are asking questions as simple as they are profound," said Biden when discussing financial concerns of American families. According to

Biden, both he and Obama are working to address these concerns by focusing on the economy and job creation.

"Our plan," Biden said, "is to create over two million new jobs averaging at about \$50,000 per year." Biden began discussing the impact that these plans would have on New Hampshire residents. Nine-thousand of these new jobs, he said, would be created in the Granite State.

Biden also addressed concerns dealing with mortgages and foreclosures within New Hampshire, stating, "1,400 New Hampshire residents have lost their houses within the last quarter alone." Many of these figures resonated with New Hampshire residents who are beginning to feel the financial pinch more and more.

Biden also talked at length about what he considers to be an "attack" campaign being run by Senator McCain. The crowd, filled with Obama supporters sporting shirts that read: McCan't began "booing" at the mention of the Democratic nominee's opponent.

Highlighting the differences between McCain and

Obama, Biden said, "McCain wants to attack Obama and Obama wants to attack America's economic problems. It's as simple as that." Biden

SNHU Penmen Get Covered

The Athletic Department at Southern New Hampshire University published a new athletic website at the beginning of the 2008-2009 school year. According to Greg Royce, Sports Information Director at SNHU, the new athletics website production began last winter. "The Athletic Department learned about the opportunity to get a grant through the Northeast-10 Conference to build a new athletic website with PrestoSports."

"We were approved to start building the new site in April, and really started working on it once the 2007-2008 academic year was over."

The process was tedious, which "took the entire summer to build, [due to] transferring information from the old site as well as adding a lot of new content" said Royce.

According to Royce, "the site launched the week of our

first [soccer] games, the last week of August." The site showcases new features such as an athletic overview, athletic complex hours, pages for intramurals and recreation, the Penmen Club, Men and Women's Varsity sports, as well as the Hall of Fame.

The most noticeable changes are the bios for every student-athlete and the live stats and video for home contests. "We offer live, real-time statistics for ten sports for home games and video for seven at the moment," stated Royce. "We find that a lot of parents and other family members who can't attend many games in person appreciate being able to follow their son or daughter's games as they happen."

White House Reviewing \$700 Billion Rescue Plan

After Congress passed an unprecedented \$700 billion plan to save financial firms from shutting down, the White House is now considering applying \$250 billion to investing in banks.

The current economic crisis in the United States and across the world has called for extreme and immediate action. Originally, the rescue plan emerged from the Treasury Department in the form of a three page bill. Although a radical version of the bill was initially rejected in the House, a more moderate proposal by the Senate was passed through both houses of Congress. Various kinds of favorable legislation to individual congressmen were attached to the bill to make sure it was passed with as little opposition as possible. When the bill left the Senate, it totaled over 450 pages. On October 3rd, President Bush signed the bill into law and began considering what action to take.

Government intervention at the expense of taxpayers was seen as a necessary step to secure investments and the financial market. The initial intent of the bill was to buy up the bad loans that financial firms had as a result of subprime lending. By doing this, the freeze on business and consumer loans would hopefully be alleviated.

However, the passing of this bill was only the first step to avert a nationwide and global crisis. Since the bill was passed in frenzy, very little restrictions were placed on the strategy to be utilized for the implementation of the \$700 billion. As such, the president decided to funnel \$250 billion of it into nine major banks, shoring up investments and loans in these banks. Inspiration for this plan stemmed from European practice and democratic support.

Furthermore, the bill may grant an additional \$100 billion to the Treasury Department as well as allow banks to

lend amongst each other. The latter would allow for businesses day-to-day operations to continue, after the Lehman Brothers firmed collapsed freezing any such loans.

Buying equity in banks goes against conservative ideologies which favor government deregulation of the financial sector. By the Bush administration effectively nationalizing banks, the severity of the situation could not be clearer. Officials are now willing to exhaust every option to save the economy from crumbling. Many have questioned why it took so long for officials to take a bipartisan approach in the face of economic collapse.

In response to the potential for government investment in banks, Wall Street soared on Monday, October 13, with the Dow Jones jumping over 11%. Although this day was encouraging, the nation's problems are far from over. One day of promise is not enough to solve the tough economic problems that the United States is currently facing.

also focused on major differences in the policies of both nominees. He openly criticized McCain's plans for the economy.

"McCain's plan is what I call an ultimate bridge to nowhere," said Biden.

Senator Biden then focused on the affordability of education in the United States. He expressed great concern about funding education and the impact that American youth will have on the future of this country. Biden related this concern with what he considers a great need for service volunteers. He urged young Americans to put their country first. Biden encouraged the audience to commit to service, through military, not-for-profit organizations as well as through other avenues.

He ended his discussion of education and related costs with a promise, "If you serve your country, we will get you to college." This promise was met with roaring applause from the audience.

Focusing on what he considered to be monumental obstacles that lay ahead, Biden likened presidential nominee Barack Obama to President Kennedy. Biden compared Kennedy's promise to get

Though it generated a great brouhaha for political pundits, the Vice Presidential debate on October 2nd between Senator Joe Biden and Governor Sarah Palin was not nearly as eventful as many had hoped.

Being the only VP debate for the upcoming election, there was a general consensus that it could drastically change the course of the next month. Whether Palin stumbled through the debate or Biden talked himself into a major political blunder, one Vice Presidential candidate was to emerge the victor definitively and distance the election for his or her ticket.

Unfortunately for those interested, victory was not so clearly defined in this case as neither candidate made any critical blunders. Palin adhered to the most important issues expressed by the McCain campaign, while using her down-to-earth charm to appeal to voters. Palin was successful in her first and only debate, because she adeptly avoided failure. A great deal of

Governor of New Mexico Comes to SNHU

On September 23rd, Governor Bill Richardson of New Mexico came to Southern New Hampshire University to support the democratic campaign, Barack Obama, and Securing America's Future Energy.

Richardson stated that the United States desperately needs infrastructure and more financial oversight in order to improve the U.S. economy. He noted that Obama is the first to want changes in the policy on energy due to the environmental threats on the planet. In order to combat this challenge, Obama and Joe Biden set a plan in place that is projected to create 5 million green collar jobs and have 25 percent of American electricity come from renewable energy sources by 2025.

Richardson moved on to the causes Obama is in support of such as more oversight and transparency, special interests on lobbyists, pulling out of war that is costing the U.S. \$20 billion a month and that is "not working," as well as the need for a GI bill of rights for veterans.

He went on to state the facts of Obama's plans on taxation. He stated that no family making less than \$250,000 will see their taxes increase and that taxes will be cut by \$500 for 95% of workers and by \$1,000 for working couples.

Both Obama and Richardson believe that the United States needs a pro-growth economy. "We want a surplus again like we had with Clinton and we can do that by thinking positively and redoubling efforts because we need to take back our country" Richardson stated.

Athletic Complex Gets Renovated

Assistant Athletic Director, Chad Mason, said, "it was one of the busier years for small renovations that had [dramatic changes]." Among those renovations was the replacement of the flooring that had been there since the Athletic Complex's inception in 1975. Mason said the new flooring, tile and no-slip rubber, "brightens up the building and is [easier] to maintain."

Future renovations are still in the works. As of right now, the next change will involve labeling outside of the athletic complex. People visiting the campus have a hard time finding the field house or the Penmen Room due to the lack of signs on the exterior of the building. Mason stated that hopefully next summer the Athletic Complex will be able to add some signage to the outside of the building.

Alcohol Regulations Amped Up at SNHU

Beginning this semester, Southern New Hampshire University implemented a new drinking policy in an effort to reduce underage drinking. This policy gives Public Safety officers a more direct way to monitor drinking on campus.

This new policy allows Public Safety officers to search personal possessions, including refrigerators. These searches can occur if a Public Safety officer suspects underage students of being in the possession of alcohol.

Some students are questioning whether their privacy is being compromised. "Students should be allowed to have privacy without having to worry about what they put in the refrigerator," stated SNHU junior, Sarah-Ann Lafleur.

If an underage student is found drinking in a residence that is considered "wet," meaning there is at least one 21 year old living in the residence, then action can be taken by Public Safety and resident assistants. Even though the area is approved to have alcoholic bev-

colloquialisms like 'you betcha', 'darn right' and 'doggone it' to connect with working class Americans. She commonly referenced her record on energy policies as well as her experience as a governor and mayor to allay some of the fears of her lack of experience.

At the same time, she was quick to distance herself and John McCain from the current presidential administration. A notable Palin sound clip came after Biden attempted to associate her ticket with the Bush administration when she said, "Say it ain't so, Joe, there you go pointing backwards again." All the while, Palin continued to refer to John McCain and herself as 'mavericks,' citing various voting records that were not popular with their parties.

Although she was generally successful in her debate style, Palin did make some errors. Commonly, she avoided the direct questions being asked of her to focus on topics that she was more familiar with. Also, she made a mistake in referring to General McKiernan as McClellan when she was talking about strategies in Afghanistan. A few times during the debate, she even openly admitted that she was not completely familiar with how politics worked in Washington, which is a funda-

mental flaw in a vice presidential candidate.

Biden effectively made his points throughout the debate. He fielded most questions directed towards him and made no egregious errors which his garrulous nature sometimes forces him into. Throughout the debate, he respectfully criticized Palin and McCain. He even challenged the concept of McCain being a maverick by stating, "So maverick he is not on the important, critical issues that affect people at [the] kitchen table."

The main criticism of Biden was that he did not challenge Palin enough. Though he was critical at times, Biden did not make any decisive points to distance himself in the way that his vast amount of experience over Palin

would indicate. In this way, Palin was seen as having a successful debate, and she exceeded expectations.

Pollsters and pundits found that, although Palin did relatively well, the debate went to Biden. However, the victory was not particularly decisive, and the Democratic ticket only gained a slight edge.

erages in it due to the legal age of at least one resident, underage drinking is not accepted or tolerated in the area, only responsible drinking by those of legal age. Action can be taken on both the underage drinker as well as the 21 year olds present. One course of action can be the loss of being considered "wet" where the underage drinking has occurred.

The responsibility placed on students of legal age for minors' actions is major, which some students do not agree with. "It is unfair that 21-year-olds are responsible for underage people drinking within the same apartment," stated SNHU junior, Alison Waring.

Art Gallery Opens for its Fall Season

The McInich Art Gallery opened its first exhibit this year with the show "Drawing the Line."

The exhibit featured works by various artists that created hand drawn pieces. It covered drawing from the 18th century to the late 20th century. The works are on borrow from the University of New Hampshire Art Gallery.

The gallery, which is directed by Deborah Disston, is in its seventh season of exhibits and presents five exhibits a year. Past exhibits of the McInich Gallery have included a controversial photography exhibit and student exhibits, Typographical one and two. It is supported by donations from friends of the university and patrons who visit on a daily basis.

The exhibition "Drawing the Line" shows the use of

many different mediums including charcoal, pastel, and ink. The intent of the show is to demonstrate the mastery of many of these types of mediums.

Some of the pieces in the gallery are from artists such as Annibale Carracci and Larry Rivers. When asked why this exhibit was chosen, Disston stated that drawing is the "foundation of the creative process" and that she wanted to showcase its roots.

The gallery is trying to showcase the history of drawing by bringing in pieces of architectural drawing from the 18th century and then working up until the present era. The idea was to create a timeline of influence by pointing out how the 18th century influences the 20th century.

Disston believes that the art of drawing serves as a jumping

Pop Politics: Warhol's Political Portraits Visit the Currier

The "Pop Politics" exhibit at the Currier Museum of Art explores a little-known side of Andy Warhol just in time for presidential elections.

"Pop Politics," which opened at the Currier on September 27, delves into the political portraiture created by Andy Warhol. The pieces being displayed range from a never-before exhibited Robert Kennedy portrait to some of Warhol's most infamous and iconic images.

According to Sharon Matt Atkins, curator of the exhibit and assistant curator at the Currier Museum of Art, the idea for "Pop Politics" came about after an acquisition of a portfolio of works entitled "Flash-November 22, 1963" done by Warhol in 1968. The piece served as a springboard into research that would lead Atkins to the main

theme of the exhibit: politics.

"In my research, I was surprised to find that never had there really been a Warhol exhibit that focused mainly on his political portraits," said Atkins.

The Currier is the first to compile these works, along with the preliminary sketches and original photographs, into a coherent exhibit that highlights the political influence and attitudes that Warhol possessed. Many of the pieces as well as the sketches and notes of Warhol's creative process were borrowed both from the Andy Warhol Museum in Pittsburg and from private owners.

Highlights of the exhibit include a miniature movie theater that plays four short politically-centered films of Warhol's. Also, the entire wall dedicated to the iconic repetitive portraits

of Mao, complete with the wallpaper backdrop that Warhol designed to be installed when the portraits were originally exhibited in Paris.

"Pop Politics" chronicles the politically artistic journey of Warhol, beginning with Jackie Kennedy series he created shortly after J.F.K.'s assassination and ending with Warhol's portraits of Mao and Vladimir Lennon. The layout of the gallery mimics this chronology.

The entire exhibit is both exquisitely displayed and brilliantly researched. Atkins has also written an essay on the political works of Warhol that is available at the exhibit in the Currier Museum of Art.

The exhibit, which is free to all SNHU students upon presentation of their school ID, will be at the Currier until January 4, 2009.

"Homework takes a little dive," stated Dana Gibson, senior, in response to how stress impacts her life negatively. As a way to destress, she listens to music and writes.

Certain foods are known to have calming and therapeutic effects on the body. Ever hear mom say "drink a glass of warm milk before bed?" A specific chemical in milk (and turkey) called tryptophan, is known to have a calming effect on the body. One food that is debated by experts over its stress relieving powers is chocolate.

Presidential Hopefuls Address America

While Senator Joe Biden spoke at Southern New Hampshire University on Monday, October 13th, both Barrack Obama and John McCain gave speeches in other parts of the country.

Senator John McCain spoke in Virginia Beach, Virginia alongside running mate Governor Sarah Palin. In his speech, McCain addressed topics such as the economy, drilling, and corruption in Washington.

McCain promised conservative spending if elected as well as change in Washington. "We cannot spend the next four years as we have spent much of the last eight," said McCain.

The senator also called for

the immediate drilling for oil and gas and criticized Senator Obama as having too little expe-

"The next president won't have the luxury of studying up on the issues before he acts. He will have to act immediately... to do that he will need experience, courage, judgment, and a bold plan of action to take this country in a new direction," said McCain.

In Toledo, Ohio, Barrack Obama addressed an audience on similar issues. Obama spoke of change as well as concern for the economy and the middle class.

"We need to pass an economic rescue plan for the middle class...and we need to do it right now," said Obama. Obama explained his plans for the economy centered on new job creation for Middle America and promised tax credits for small businesses hiring new employees within the United States.

"It is time to protect the jobs we have and to create the jobs of tomorrow," said Obama.

Although he agreed with McCain's statement that change is necessary in Washington, Obama asserted that he did not believe that McCain would provide that change. Both candidates are expected to be in the public more frequently as Election Day draws closer.

Parking Changes at SNHU

At Southern New Hampshire University, there are additional parking changes for the 2008-2009 academic year. These changes are scheduled to be complete in November 2008.

Currently, there is a large amount of construction on campus. One major project that will aid some of the parking issues on campus is the new parking lot being built on east side, behind the softball field. This lot, scheduled to be completed by the end of November, is going to contain 150 additional parking spaces for non-freshmen east side residents.

When this lot is complete, all non-freshmen east side residents will be issued an EE sticker. This sticker will only allow residents to park in lots behind Hampton and Windsor, around Lincoln and Conway, and in the new parking lot. These students will no longer be allowed to park on the west side of campus. The addition of the new parking lot is hoped to increase the number of available parking spots on the west side of campus.

There have been several complaints made by students living on west side about parking. Junior Melissa Falcucci stated that "SNHU parking is unorganized and illogically placed; too many freshman can have cars and a petition or lottery should be done before issuing parking passes."

Junior Lindsay Montiero said "I have an off-campus job which requires me to work late hours, and every time I come back on campus I have to park all the way over by Cranmore when I live in Whittier. If the freshmen lot was not expanded, I know I could get a closer spot, and I would feel more comfortable coming home after work."

These complaints are not only coming from residents here at SNHU, also from commuters. John F. Leary III, a junior, stated "I am usually late for class because I have to drive around and look for a spot, and then I end up parking in what is not a spot and receive a ticket."

The commuter sticker is used for staff, faculty, commuter

McCain Unable to Close **Ground in Debates**

The second presidential debate on October 7th did very little to stop the polls from growing in Senator Obama's favor, as Senator McCain was not able to deliver any lasting attacks.

Presented in a town-hall format, the debate was framed by the looming economic crisis and polls suggesting that McCain needed to attack Obama's background and record. The previously determined rules were relatively stringent and did not allow for the candidates to directly address one another. The main concern of the night was the current economic crisis which has enveloped the coun-

McCain was quick to attempt to establish his bipartisan voting record and tactics, while criticizing Obama's decidedly liberal record. He attempted to discredit Obama's tax proposals by saying, "Well, you know, nailing down Senator Obama's various tax proposals is like nailing Jell-O to the wall." As far as foreign policy was concerned, McCain seemed much more at ease, while still characterizing Obama as being grossly inexperienced. Attacks on Obama's character and background were sure to ensue.

No such decisive attacks

happened, however, as McCain began to become visibly frustrated, even referring to Obama as "that one" at one point during the debate. The frustrations mounted as McCain paced back and forth, unable to land a resounding blow on Obama to change the tide in his favor.

Obama focused on McCain's lack of separation from President Bush's policies once more, while connecting him with deregulation which was essentially what caused the economic crisis: "Senator McCain, as recently as March, bragged about the fact that he is a deregulator." Most notably for foreign policy, Obama used McCain's reference to Teddy Roosevelt against him, citing examples where McCain did not "speak softly."

This is not to say that Obama handily won the debate; he did not. Obama concerned himself with countering McCain's points enough to offset any negative effect that they would have. He remained calm in his overall demeanor and looked much more at ease throughout the debate than McCain.

After the debate, little had changed in the polls, which denoted an unsuccessful night for the McCain campaign. If he wants to make up any ground,



and the corn-based paper takeout containers that SNHU currently uses. The negative effects of the Styrofoam containers on the environment are well known. The disadvantages to the cornbased paper containers are a little less obvious.

Dr. Kalicki stated that the problem with these containers is threefold. "First off, they are a waste of money," Kalicki says, "and they are a waste of food product. Also, the biodegradable aspect would only work if we were composting them. SNHU does not have the capacity to do this."

In order to address these problems, SNHU has been researching eco-friendly and cost-effective alternatives, one of which being plastic reusable containers.

"The plastic in these con-

tainers is recycled," said Kalicki, "so there is no worry of using new plastics to create them." According to Kalicki the containers would work much like the reusable water bottles that were introduced earlier this semester.

"Students would sign a pledge and be given a reusable container [to use for their food]. When they are done, they would drop it off at the cafe and be given a new, clean one," stated

According to Kalicki, many of the details are still being discussed. From the color of the containers to the question of how to get them onto campus, much planning still remains. Despite these questions, Kalicki hopes to have the program up and running within the next six weeks.

The United States was expected to take a more ardent and threatening stance in the Georgian conflict; however, Russia is a great power and an ally in Unites States' plans of taking over one of its presently greatest threats, Iran.

The situation has since worsened as Russian forces alongside the rebel ones started moving in the Georgian territory, destroying military targets in the city of Gori as well as bombarding the capital city's, Tbilisi, airport. A week and a half after the conflict began a ceasefire was signed between the Georgian and Russian/ South Ossetian parties. However, Russian troops seemed reluctant to withdraw from the vicinity of the Georgian capital. They did so after three weeks, at the end of August, before Russia singlehandedly recognized the South Ossetia and Abhazia enclaves as independent states.

After withdrawing from the legitimate Georgian territory, the Russian army was to resume its position. This position had not been held since before the emergence of the conflict, August 7th, when the war was declared. Russian peacekeeping forces totaling 7,600 will be kept on the territory of Abkhazia and South Ossetia.

The war in Georgia has left traces on the political, military, social and economic environment.

From a political perspective Georgia and Russia terminated their diplomatic relationships for the first time since 1991(after the complete dissolution of the Russian block). The United States assisted Georgia with its rebuilding process by means of humanitarian aids after President George W. Bush signed a pledge that granted the country \$1 billion.

The Georgian army has suffered severe losses and is now asking for support regarding reequipping from the United States. Washington has not vet decided on a course of action in this aspect but the American Vice-President, Dick Cheney, stressed during his visit to Tbilisi on September 4th that the main focus at present is for Georgia to restore its economy. Russia on the other hand may present a

plan at the Geneva Convention on October 15th, which would desist the sale of weapons from Russia to

The Georgian economy suffered a serious downfall due to the war. Georgia was forced to take a minimum- interest- rate loan from the Asian Development Bank of \$40 million that is to be returned in 32 years in order to restore the grounds of its economy.

From a social standpoint, tensions are prone to reappear at any time among the three groups; Georgians, South Osetians, and Abkhazian, in the search for international independence recognition. South Ossetians are presently forwarding complaints against Georgia at the International Court of Justice and the European Court of Human Rights, which are endorsed by Russia. Russia also emphasizes its triumph in the war by means of an exhibition that brings together destroyed pieces of artillery and burnt Georgian flags symbolizing the greatness of the Russian army over the Georgian one.

The war brought about local and international political instability. Russia highly criticized the



WaMu Under Investigation

After being seized by the FDIC on Sept. 25, Washington Mutual is going through Chapter 11 bankruptcy proceedings, a takeover by JP Morgan Chase, and an investigation by the FBI.

According to the Settle Times during the proceedings of the bankruptcy it was stated that a half-dozen well-paid turnaround executives may be installed to oversee the Chapter 11 bankruptcy of Washington Mutual Inc., whose banking operations were taken over by federal regulators last month. WaMu is asking the bankruptcy judge's permission to designate William C. Kosturos to the lead the restructuring as the chief restructuring officer and hire six more members as advisors from his firm Alvarez & Marsal North America.

JP Morgan Chase jumped at the chance to purchase WaMu as it entered into bankruptcy after being seized by the FDIC. JP Morgan Chase view the purchase of WaMu as a great chance to expand their deposit base and presence in California, Florida and other locations where it does not have a meaningful branch network, according to Forbes.

JP Morgan Chase, just six months after acquiring Bear

Stearns, stepped in to buy WaMu for \$1.9 billion. JP Morgan Chase, after the purchase, will still have to write down over \$31 billion of mortgage assets and add about \$3.6 billion to it's lean loss revenues. Forbes reported that JP Morgan Chase's takeover of WaMu saddled the bank with billions in write-downs, compounding those it already took on from failing loans in its leveraged loan and mortgage-related portfolios, and sending its profits tumbling 84.4 percent.

It was announced October 15 that U.S. Attorney Jeffrey Sullivan's office is conducting an investigation of WaMu. The investigation will look into the events leading up to its takeover by the FDIC and sale to JP Morgan Chase. Attorney Jeffrey Sullivan stated to "The Seattle Times" "For more than 100 years, Washington Mutual was a highly regarded financial institution headquartered in Seattle." He also stated according to "The Seattle Times" that "Due to the intense public interest in the failure of Washington Mutual, I want to assure our community that federal law enforcement is examining activities at the bank to determine if any federal laws were violated.'

Fed Probes Companies Involved in Mortgage Crisis

Lehman Brother, American International Group, Fannie Mae, and Freddie Mac are being probed by Investigators of the FBI for possible fraud that could have triggered the collapse of the financial institutions and the government to intervene with a \$700 billion bailout plan.

Foxbusiness.com stated that the FBI has opened a wide-ranging probe of companies across the financial services industry, from mortgage lenders to investment banks that bundle home loans into securities sold to investors.

FBI Director Robert Mueller stated to ABC News a confirmation that the bureau is investigating 24 financial institutions, "large corporations, where the allegations would be that there were misstatement of assets." FBI spokesman Richard Kolko stated to ABC News that in addition to Mueller's figures that "the FBI currently has 26 pending corporate fraud investigations involving subprime lenders. As

we have seen, this number can fluctuate over time; however, we do not discuss which companies may or may not be the subject of an investigation."

Mueller previously had stated to Foxbusiness.com that the FBI's hunt for culprits in the nation's subprime mortgage crisis focused on accounting fraud, insider trading, and failure to disclose the value of mortgage-related securities and other investments. FBI Director Robert Mueller was stated by FoxBusiness.com stating without naming companies that the FBI also was looking at whether any of the companies have misrepresented their assets.

ABC News reported that the bureaus investigation have increased from 14 major financial firms to 26 in less than a year. Following the collapse of the Mortgage industry in 2007 the FBI setup a task force to examine mortgage based securities and how brokers dealt with mortgages from setup to sale.



for it to remain independent and politically stable.



grace in their performance. The trapeze performance seems to go beyond the laws of gravity and give the impression of flying. The unicycle duo brings balance and cohesion onto the stage, warming the audience up for the double high wire performance, where a single wire inexplicably provides the base for a jump rope moment and a balancing act involving two bicycles and a chair.


I would certainly applaud the ability of the director to not only put on a show that would keep you glued to the chair, but also to carefully distract you from the interruptions that are necessary for putting all the acrobatic equipment into place. These intermezzos are helped along by the clowns that bring us back to the circus basics. There is a king and his servants as well as a pickpocket, policemen and a mad dog. The audience is involved at all times, directly by means of bringing people from the audience onstage, or indirectly by means of everybody's laughter and applauses.

The half an hour intermission provides a good occasion to take a breath, but also makes your excitement soar as you are looking forward to be amazed and exhilarated in the second half.

The second half debuts with the skeleton dance, which provides in fact the background for the entrance of the wheel of death performers. The performance is a mix of craziness, flawless technique, teamwork and adrenaline rush. There are some moments when the jump rope seemed to play tricks on the performers, but in the end mind won over matter. It is by far the most memorable adrenaline filled performance of the night.

Dexterity and focus are put to the test when it comes to juggling, while the balancing on chairs is a mix among strength, balance, and precision, as well as flexibility. Last but certainly not least the teeterboard/ planche sautoir, offers everyone the chance to cross their fingers and hold their breath. The performers are yet again doing the unimaginable, twists and turn in the air such as quintuple twisting summersaults that can reach up to 10 meters and then landing perfectly on the stilt.

Time seems to fly and the two hours and forty minutes seem like a dream. You are dragged from reality to a world of fantasy where your breath is taken away, your hands sweat from excitement and you are connected to





Ne-Yo Shines Brighter With "Year of the Gentlemen"






Eastern Conference:

"We want to be one of the final four teams playing in March; we want to win the NE-10 Championship," stated Ken Hutchins, head coach of SNHU hockey. The players agree with Hutchins goal of winning the NE-10 and hope this season will be the one. The team was closest three years

With young forwards like Alexander Semin and Nicklas Backstrom, proven defense in Mike Green, and veteran leadership in Sergei Fedorov and Chris Clark, the Caps have the skill to back up Ovechkin. Ottawa Senators (7th seed in 2007-2008 Playoffs): The Sens look to have another successful season and avoid the downfall they experienced at the end of last season. The main problem the Senators have is all their goal scoring comes from one line. The line of Jason Spezza (34 goals), Dany Heatley (41 goals) and Daniel Alfredson (40 goals) was the one and only successful line for the team. Losing Corey Stillman to free agency will hurt the limited scoring outside the top line. Gerber is a talented goaltender but at this point in his career, he is seen as a top back up rather than a starter.





Injuries have led to a unique year in the NFL, where the usual powerhouses lack their typical dominance. We continue to break down the action as the season goes along, with analysis for all 32 teams. *standings and statistics through Week 6 (Oct. 14)

NFC East

Giants – 4-1*- The Giants are just one more example of a miraculous championship win propelling a team to the elite level. A new sense of confidence has turned the Giants into the #1 team in the NFL through Week 5, and a return to the Super Bowl certainly looks attainable. Eli Manning and the power run game led by Brandon Jacobs have the G-Men first in the league in total offense and the defense leads the division despite the missing pieces and a terrible upset to Cleveland. Next three games: SF, @PIT, DAL

Cowboys – 4-2* - The 'Boys have lacked the same muscle of a season ago, as losses to their NFC foes Redskins and Cardinals. The defense has been weak, allowing an average of over 23 points per game and the loss of at least four games from Adam Jones won't help much. Their potent offense may be stalled by Tony Romo's broken finger which will keep him out for four weeks, but the Marion Barber/Felix Jones tandem should keep them in every game. Expect less success this regular season but a playoff appearance is practically guaranteed. Next three games: @STL, TB, @NYG

NFC South




Women's Volleyball




