

# SNHU Welcomes Senator John McCain, MTV, MySpace

On Monday, December 3, 2007 MTV and MySpace. com organized a presidential dialogue with Republican candidate Senator John McCain on the campus of Southern New Hampshire University.

McCain was greeted by 35 students and campaign members as he came onto campus. "It's really hard to get students interested in politics at the University, so I was really excited that they picked SNHU to host the event. It enabled students to hear McCain's stance on important issues, directly from him," said Julie Kraus, the Students for McCain co-chair at SNHU, who organized the gathering.

Students for McCain is a volunteer program present at many colleges in New Hampshire. Students have the opportunity to learn more about Senator John him through different events such as meetings, conventions, and the activities fair on campus.

McCain was the first Republican to participate in the Presidential Dialogues. He was asked questions from a live studio audience of 250 SNHU students while accepting questions via mtv.com, myspace.com, instant message, and real online polling as well.

"We offer this dialogue to all candidates polling over 5%," Gideon Yago, a host for the MTV Presidential Dialogue stated. He also mentioned that he is more affected by the personal nature of the questions posed by students, as opposed to meeting presidential candidates. His first political rally was at SNHU during the 2000 election.

The Dialogue began with the issue of global warming and climate change. The senator is one of the few Republicans

McCain and inform others about addressing global warming in talk. My first priority is to keep his campaign, and he states he believes climate change is real.

> "I've seen it in the South Pole. I've seen it in Norway. I've seen it on the Arctic Circle. I have seen the effects of it in the Brazilian Rainforest. I have seen it," McCain assures.

McCain elaborated on his ideas for green technology and specifically nuclear power, which would significantly reduce greenhouse emissions. He discussed the melting of ice caps and its effects on island nations, "these are the beginnings, not the end of climate change."

McCain addressed the importance of persuasion at this point in his campaign and stated that he was running because he was the best candidate. "I can assure you that there are a number of issues that you will not agree with me on, but I will always give you straight you and your children safe."

When asked about the decisions that the Senator would make regarding other Middle Eastern countries besides Iraq, he stated that "it depends if they impose an immediate threat to the United States of America and our interests. We are dependent on that part of the world for a lot of reasons. I would carefully consider whether military action was called for."

Students from SNHU further tested McCain with questions involving education and home schooling. McCain responded by saying that all Americans should be given choices when deciding upon their education. Another student asked about the costs of college education, and his plan to reduce that. McCain stressed his belief that all people of America should be able to afford a secondary education.

Other issues such as the economy, Darfour Genocide, bi-partisanship, religion, the War in Iraq, draft reinstatement, and healthcare were addressed in response to the questions posed by students as well. McCain shared some of his stories from his time spent as a prisoner of war as he addressed his disagreement with the use of torture.

McCain ended the Presidential Dialogue with more support than he began with, as the interactive polls showed. He expressed his gratitude to the students and informed them that they were the most important people in affecting this election. "I want people to serve this country, and I am going to call on them. I am going to call on young people too, because that is the future of our country."

# **New England Auto Show**

The Chrysler Imperial, Jeep Trailhawk, and Dodge Challenger were just three of the new cars exposed at the 2008 New England Auto Show held at the Boston Convention and Exhibition Center. In association with more than 40 automakers, the New England Auto Show, which was held from December 3rd to the 7th, certainly took everyone by surprise by flaunting several new concept cars, inviting driving celebrities to speak, and providing an overall customer friendly set up that really made it enjoyable for all ages.

It goes without saying that that next few years are going to be far from bland in concerns to new cars and their technologies. Manufacturers are stressing alternate fuels and news ways to travel and this auto show really hit home with that idea. The new Ford Interceptor concept made its appearance in this year's Auto Show. With a 6speed manual transmission and a clearly smooth looking style, its 5.0L V-8 engine runs on E-85 Ethanol. Not lacking in power, it still puts out a solid 400hp. People are aware of carmaker's motives with going green; but, as some expressed, they are questioning why some of the new concepts have engines that rival some sports cars.

Some of the new cars revealed were not that new however. The return of the Dodge Challenger in the 1st quarter of 2009 has true Dodge fans gazing in admiration. Discontinued in 1974, the Dodge Challenger is making its long awaited return as a 2009 muscle car. With an MSRP of around \$37,995 this Challenger SRT has an optional 3.5, 5.7, or 6.1L hemi engine with either a 5 or 6 speed automatic transmissions (manual optional).

Audi, BMW, Lotus, and Aston Martin were just four of the car makers present at the event. Of course they were able to show off their new S8s, DB9s and M3s, but that's not what got the fans wound up. Alexan-

der Roy, the President of Team Polizei and current record holder for the U.S. Express, a coast to coast rally, was at the event on a book signing tour for The Driver, his first book. He shook hands, took pictures, and let me inside his infamous 2000 BMW E39 M5 in which he broke the record. Traveling from New York City to Las Angeles in a mere 31 hours and 4 minutes with an average speed of 91mph, sometimes hitting 160mph, Alex Roy used over \$100,000 of equipment to complete his time trial. From GPS units, radar detectors, and thermal cameras for midnight driving, his BMW is worth over \$140,000. With his gas mileage averaging 16mpg, he was still able to beat the previous record by over an hour. Other cars might have been more suitable for the coast to coast excursion, but nothing could beat the economy vs. power equation that



the M5 clearly solved. In fact, because of Alex Roy's crosscountry trek with his notorious M5, the resale value of the model has gone up significantly. For more information on Alexander Roy and Team Polizei, please

Without a doubt, the event was a success. Those who went were pleased and none were disappointed. From statistics reported by the Boston Convention Center, the average age of the attendees was 36 with 69% of those being male. # Cricket Arrives on SNHU Campus

Cricket is a very popular sport in many countries of the world. The most important cricket tournament called the Word Cricket Cup took place in the early part of this year in the West Indies, a set of islands that are not far from the United States. Sixteen major cricket playing countries participated in this cup, namely India, Pakistan,

Bangladesh, Sri Lanka, England, Scotland, New Zealand, Australia, South Africa, Bermuda, Zimbabwe, Kenya, Holland, Ireland, Canada and the West Indies. People in many of these countries are very passionate about cricket.

Cricket is somewhat similar to baseball and softball. Instead of four bases in baseball, there are two bases in cricket. A bowler (pitcher) balls (pitches) from one base to the batsman (batter) at the other base. The bowler aims

for the wickets (strike zone), which is a set of three poles stuck in the ground. When the batsman hits the ball, the players run between wickets (bases) to score runs. A player gets out, if the ball hits the wickets, his hit is caught by a fielder or he does not make to the next base when running between the bases.

Cricket formally came to SNHU, when President Paul LeBlanc threw the first ball (pitch) to Vice-President Scott Kalicki on the newly constructed cricket pitch on the SNHU campus in the afternoon of Wednesday November 14. Students then split into two teams and played a limited overs cricket match on the new pitch, which is located in the practice field behind the softball field.

The event was part of the International Week celebrations and was organized by the cricket coach Dr. Dhakar with the assistance of faculty, students and the athletic staff. It turned out to be a perfect day for cricket as the weather cooperated for a change.

# Is Your Safety Worth \$.07?

Ever since the tragedy at Virginia Tech earlier this year, it has become even more imperative that schools set up systems in which they can protect students from future catastrophes. Southern New Hampshire University has established a program that will bring relief to those worrying about potential tribulations. With the SNHU campus being geographically larger than most and a student body smaller than some high schools, the Student Affairs office thought it important that students as well as faculty spread out among such a large area be informed to the full extent. After researching over half a dozen possible companies, they finally found the right one that would not only be economically smart but has other colleges who also use their service, backing them up.

What this system will do is allow six specific administrative staff members on campus or off to send out alerts to those people who have subscribed to the service. These alerts will range from school cancellations to other emergency circumstances which everyone hopes will never happen. Starting early this week students and faculty will have the opportunity to sign up with two mobile device numbers as well as two email addresses. This will allow students to cover all bases, and if a student wanted to, place their parents' cell phone number in one of those spots so they could be informed as well. Student Affairs would like to make

it known however that there are only a few people who have the ability to send out these alerts and that the system will not be abused. Only important messages will be sent, and there is no cost to anyone who wants to sign up. Standard text messaging fees apply however, so for someone who does not have a text plan, they may have to pay a few extra dimes. So far, Resident Assistants are the only ones who are required to subscribe to the service as they are university employees.

The company chosen, e2campus, runs a simple system that is used by over 300 other college campuses including Boston University and Plymouth State, who have the same system as Southern New Hampshire University. For those who are concerned about releasing their phone number and email, there are no worries, this company promises that the information is private and will not be given out to anyone. One unique aspect



of this system is that default lists are able to be made for a group of people. So suppose Jim Winn, director of Public Safety, had to contact his officers for any reason, he could do so in a matter of seconds. This will certainly cut down the time it takes to manually call each officer.

Students and faculty are certainly encouraged to sign up but as of right now, only a small number are required to have it. Student Affairs hopes that 60-70% of the on-campus student population will sign up. Signing up will place your information on the list for two years, in which at any time, you are able to cancel your service.

Remember, look for this system to begin early this week and if you have any other questions or comments, feel free to contact the Student Affairs Office.

# "Accepting Disabilities Today, Celebrating Differences Tomorrow."

On Thursday November 29, 2007 there was an event titled "Accepting Disabilities Today, Celebrating Differences Tomorrow" in Walker Auditorium. The event consisted of seven different panelists all of whom attend or have attended SNHU. Each of the panelists had some sort of learning, psychological, or mental disability. Each panelist described their association with SNHU, the disability they live with, the way the disability affects their life and their experiences.

The majority of the panelists were current SNHU students. A few were sophomores, a few seniors, and one was alumni. Each student has continuously taken advantage of the accommodations for students with disabilities here at SNHU, which have assisted them in succeeding in the classroom with their disability. Some

of the disabilities discussed throughout the panel were Muscular Dystrophy, Dyslexia, ADD, ADHD, reading comprehension problems, writing comprehension problems, Bipolar Disorder, Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder, traumatic brain injury, communication difficulties, anxiety disorders, memory loss, spelling trouble, and Nonverbal Learning Disorder. Each person is different in the way that disabilities affect their lifestyle and activities and also in the form of medication or assistance that helps them cope with it.

Many of the panelists have dealt with their disability from the time they were young children. However, one panelist suffered an accident which altered her lifestyle leaving her with a disability and another woman did not know she had

# Students Get Involved in Service: the 75 Acts of Service

In honor of the 75th Anniversary of our university, the Center for Service and Citizenship began their campaign for the 75 Acts of Service at the end of October. Less than two months later approximately 30 acts have been completed.

The Center for Service and Citizenship (CSC) is an office on campus that helps students get involved in community service. This year they have highlighted acts submitted by all students and support those various activities. The goal is to carryout more than 75 acts.

The CSC, also referred to as Serve, is dedicated to creating service on campus. "We are trying to develop a campus and a community here that serves," says Sarah Jacobs, the Director of the CSC. "We want to foster a culture of service on campus."

The office began two and a half years ago under a student initiative. Jacobs is the only fac-

ulty member employed by the office, while all other employees in the office are students. Students research, organize, and run different activities for other students to participate in.

Crystal Jean, the Graduate Assistant for the CSC, emphasizes that everyone on campus is involved in the acts of service. "We have received volunteer activities from RA's, student groups, individual students, faculty, and staff."

This is the first year the office has encouraged outside suggestions that have influenced the activities performed. The office is willing to support any

student who has an idea for service. The launch of the 75 Acts of Service is meant to encourage student participation. "The whole idea is to get the school involved, even those students who may not have thought about service before" Jean says.

The CSC promotes programs such as Alternative Breaks. Students have the opportunity to go to the Dominican Republic in January to assist in orphanages, Virginia to become involved in Environmental clean-up, and Africa to bridge South Africa's technology divide.

Jacobs estimates that approximately 30 acts have been

completed so far, ranging from Friends of Forgotten Children, Relay for Life, Team New Hampshire, Fitness Challenge, Families in Transition, Marchof-Dimes and the New Hampshire Food Bank.

The office, in partnership with professors on campus, has developed a new program that began this fall known as Service Learning. Service Learning is an opportunity for students to gain three credits from classroom work, and an additional one credit for completion of community service hours.

# Subprime Mortgage Defaults Hurt Citigroup; CEO Resigns

Citigroup expects to add \$11 billion in write-downs for subprime mortgages during the fourth quarter to third-quarter write-downs totaling about \$6.8 billion, which led to the resignation of Chief Executive Officer Charles Prince on November 4, was stated to Reuters.

Citi's residential mortgage lending business had been exposed directly to the impact of rising delinquencies and foreclosures among subprime borrowers. Citigroup stated to Reuters if the sub-prime situation continues to worsen future write-downs may be larger than currently predicted. Citigroup still has an exposure of \$55 billion to U.S. subprime mortgages. Citigroup stated to Market Watch that it will retain its dividend payouts, despite the large write-downs. According to Reuters, falling values of the CDO securities backed by risky subprime mortgage bonds are at the heart of losses disclosed by the world's largest financial institutions in recent weeks.

According to Market Watch, former Treasury Secretary Robert Rubin will become chairman while Citi's European head Win Bischoff will be interim chief executive. CNBC reported that

Citigroup is considering Chief Executive John Mack of Morgan Stanley, CEO John Thain of the NYSE Euronext, CEO Larry Fink of BlackRock Inc, Chairman Robert Willumstad of AIG, and Chairman Josef Ackermann of Deutsche Bank as possible replacements for their CEO. Citigroup is considering some of the same replacements for CEO as Merrill Lynch is currently considering. Merrill Lynch's CEO was the first to resign after disastrous losses due to overexposure to subprime risks.

Prince became CEO of Citigroup in 2003 after the bank struggled with regulatory problems. The Citigroup board felt his background in law was suitable to help clear up the legal problems within the company. The Board of Directors stated that Charles Prince will stay on as an advisor while Citigroup conducts a search for a new CEO. Prince is the second Wall Street CEO to surrender to the subprime-mortgage disaster's fallout. Merrill Lynch's Stan O'Neil was the first.

# Retailers Adjust 2007 Earnings Estimates

A number of retailers have been adjusting their full year earnings per share estimates as we complete the forth quarter of 2007, and the holiday shopping rush of November and December.

Department store retailer JC Penney, which operates over 1,000 stores in 49 states, announced November 15 that it anticipates fiscal 2007 earnings to fall between \$4.63 and \$4.78 per share according to MSN Money and Reuters. JC Penney had previously estimated their 2007 earnings to be \$5.50.

Another department store

Walt Disney

retailer, Kohl's, which operates over 800 stores in 45 states, announced that fiscal 2007 earnings will come in between \$3.52 and \$3.58 per share. This differs from the company's earlier estimates of between \$3.77 and \$3.87 for 2007, according to MSN Money and Reuters.

JC Penney shares ended November at \$44.12, about 40 percent lower than a year ago. Kohl's shares ended November at \$49.28, about 30 percent lower than a year ago.

While Kohl's and JC Penney have been lowering estimates, apparel retailers such as J Crew and The Gap have been guiding estimates higher.

Apparel retailer J Crew announced recently that fiscal 2007 earnings per share will come in between \$1.50 and \$1.52. This is an increase from the \$1.42 to \$1.46 that the company had previously estimated.

Retailer Gap Incorporated, which operates over 3,000 stores across the world, recently raised 2007 full year earnings per share guidance to between \$0.92 and \$0.98, an increase from its earlier estimates of \$0.90 to \$0.95.

Shares of Gap Inc. finished November at \$20.40, about 9 percent higher than a year ago. J Crew shares finished November at \$48.05, about 22 percent higher than a year ago.

The good thing about having Mr. Market as a partner is that he doesn't mind whether you accept his offer or not ... he will inevitably be back tomorrow with a new price."

Graham went on to explain that it is the investor's job to not to be swayed by Mr. Market but to take advantage of his pocketbook. Every investor can learn from the story of Mr. Market.

As we move through these turbulent times I will leave you with a quote from another great investor, John Maynard Keynes; "The market can stay irrational longer than you can stay solvent".

# **Culinary Competition**

The Culinary Competition Team meets regularly to practice skill sets for upcoming competitions. The students that represent this team are Vylett Cross, Brandon Thomas, Michelle King, and David Santos. There are many skills required to be a competitive chef. These included knife cuts, chicken prep, fish prep, and pastry work.

The judges decide which knife cuts the competitors will have to perform. They have to many cuts, possibly as many as 10. The cuts may consist of Julienne, Large Dice, Medium Dice, and Small Dice, Paysanne, Brunoise, Mince, Chiffonade, Rondelles, and Tourne. It takes time and practice to become proficient at these cuts.

"So the way this competition works...there is two parts... the first part is the skills section, chicken butchery, fish fabrication, knife cuts and pastry skills. The judges randomly select one student to do each section, so everyone must be prepared for all sections. They have 80 minutes to complete this entire section", explained Chef Matt Louis, Team Advisor.

Competitors have to break down chicken into 2 breasts, 2 thighs, 2 legs, and 2 wings. The dish that the competitor chooses to prepare will decide weather the competitor will have to de-bone or skin the chicken. Preparing the fish can be tricky especially when you receive a white fish. First you must scale and debone the fish. Then, depending on what kind of dish you are making, you must skin the fish.

Chef Louis went on to explain, "The second portion is the cooking phase. They will be cooking a four course menu, four portions of each course: Fish appetizer, salad, entree, and dessert. They have 75 minutes to


# Therefore I Am, Returns With the Great "Escape"

Did you ever notice you can give a kid anything, I am talking a dirty tissue, and they can occupy themselves for hours? I wish anything could entertain me for that long. The simple



# David Beckham, More Than a Soccer

The biggest announcement of the 2007 season in Major League Soccer was the arrival of international icon, David Beckham. Although injury plagued for much of the season, he still managed to draw attention to the MLS that nobody could have predicted. The Beckham effect was seen in league attendance (3,000,000+ tickets for 2007, a new record), TV ratings (ESPN up 25% from 2006), and merchandise sales (Up 300% league wide, LA Galaxy up 700%). The Beckham jersey was the number one selling item at Sports Author-

Beckham was able to come to America because of the MLS's new designated player rule, also known as the Beckham rule. Each MLS team has a salary cap of \$2.1 million, but the designated player rule allows each MLS team to spend as much as they want on one player, and it will only count \$400,000 toward their salary cap. That is why the LA Galaxy is able to shell out over \$10 million a year for Beckham. Other examples of this throughout the league are Mexican legend Cuauhtémoc Blanco (Chicago Fire), former English Premier Striker Juan Pablo Angel (New York Red Bulls), and former World Cup winner Denilson (FC Dallas).

The Beckham effect has recently been seen in Australia and New Zealand, drawing crowds of 31,000 plus and 80,000 plus for friendly matches. Beckham's team, the LA Galaxy, loss 5-3 to Sydney F.C. and won 4-1 against Wellington (New Zealand) in their short two game tour. Beckham scored in both games including one of his classic free kicks in front of 80,000 plus against Sydney F.C.

# **Tragic Deaths:**

The sporting world tragically lost two young sons this month, Washington Redskins safety Sean Taylor and Major League Baseball pitcher Joe Kennedy.

Taylor died on Tuesday, November 27 at the young age of 24. He became the fourth NFL player killed this year (all 24 years of age), and the second by gunfire. Taylor was shot in the femoral artery of his leg in an invasion of his Miami home. He underwent seven hours of surgery and showed progress, but passed the next morning due to bleeding. His girlfriend Jackie and their 18-month old daughter were hiding under the sheets during the shooting. Four suspects have been arrested in the investigation.

Just four days prior to the death of Sean Taylor, 28 year-old pitcher Joe Kennedy died suddenly while visiting family in Florida. No cause of death has been determined yet, but doctors believe Kennedy suffered from an enlarged heart. Kennedy pitched last season for the Toronto Blue Jays, and spent time with Oakland, Tampa Bay, Colorado, and Arizona. He got the crowd going wild, and it
