

## New Hampshire College Administration Expands

Mrs. H. A. B. Shapiro, President of New Hampshire College, announces the following changes and additions within the administration for the College year 1967 - 68:

Miss Rosa J. Alosa, a graduate of Mount St. Mary College who has had teaching experience both in New Hampshire and in Italy, has been appointed to the position of Registrar. Miss Alosa's office is responsible for scheduling and registration, transcripts, transfer grades, warnings, withdrawals, attendance, insurance forms, Veteran Administration forms, and Selective Service forms.

Alen H. Bersofsky, a graduate of Bernard Baruch School of Business and Public Administration of the City College of N. Y. has been appointed as the College's first full-time Director of Public Relations. In this position, Mr. Bersofsky will coordinate all administrative functions relating to public relations, including dissemination of news, supervision of publications, formulation of policy, and planning of external College events.

Dean William E. Beane, formerly Dean of Men and Director of Student Activities, has been promoted to Associate Dean of Students. In this capacity, he is responsible for all discipline, student activities, Orientation, food services, and placement of four-year students.

Mrs. Fay Bulcock, former Administrative Secretary, has been designated to the position of Assistant to the Director of Admissions and Executive Secretary to the College President.

From the office of Mr. George Larkin, Director of Counseling Services, comes word of a major revision of the college's advisor program.

Under the former system a student with a major in management many times had an advisor who was an accounting instructor. Also, there seemed to be little personal communication between many of the advisors and their advisees.

Mr. Larkin, after seeking pros and cons of this arrangement found that many students and instructors were dissatisfied. If, for example, an accounting student with a management advisor had a particular problem concerning an accounting course his advisor would immediately refer him to an accounting instructor, thus eliminating him as a valuable guide.

This year, however, upperclassmen will be given advisors who are instructors in their major fields. Freshmen and sophomores will be given advisors from the general education department because, it is felt, their selection of courses has not yet narrowed down to any specific major as yet.

Students will be required to meet with their advisors at least once a semester thus facilitating some communications between them with the hope of establishing a good advisor-advisee relationship.

Mr. Larkin states that the faculty advisor is an integral part of the student personnel program. Among the advantages which the new program offers are: 1) The student will be contacted by his advisor during the semester. Therefore, he must see him. 2) The advisor and advisee are encouraged to meet more often. 3) There is at least one person to sit down with to discuss and academic problems that may arise.


