
CLINTON RALLIES AT SNHU AFTER NH PRIMARY

change is what this nation needs in order to be successful.



Clinton was disappointed about losing the New Hampshire Primary but she will forever have a place in her heart for the state. "I still love New Hampshire, and I always will."

In the weeks since polls closed in New Hampshire they began opening across the country. The Nevada Caucus for Democrats on Feb 20 saw Hilary Clinton winning with 52.7% with Bernie Sanders just behind in close second place with 47.2%.

The South Carolina Primary for Republicans, also on Feb. 20, saw Donald Trump winning with 32.5% of the votes and Marco Rubio and Ted Cruz following with 22.5% and 22.3% of the votes respectively.

Next on the political calendar is the South Carolina Primary on Feb. 27 for the Democratic candidates.

PROTECTING YOURSELF FROM CREDIT AND DEBIT THEFT

There have been several large cases of credit and debit card theft in New Hampshire during the past year. The cases have spread throughout the state including Londonderry, Hudson, and Dover. Many of the thieves are stealing account information, making counterfeit cards and then buying gift cards. There are a few ways the information is being stolen and some tips to protect yourself as best as possible.

Many thieves use radio frequency identification (RFID) chip enabled cards to steal account information. RFID cards can remotely scan information through wallets or

purses. The information that is collected is enough to make a working counterfeit card. Your information can be stolen while shopping at a store or simply walking past the person on the street. One way to prevent this from happening is to store credit or debit cards in RFID shields, wallets, or purses. Another option is to ask your bank for a card that is not RFID-enabled.

Thieves are also collecting card information through skimming devices. These devices are most often found on gasoline pumps. They look like regular card scanners, but have instead been equipped to steal account and personal identification number (PIN) information. These devices can be difficult to detect, so

police officers recommend looking at the keyholes on the pump. If it looks like it may have been tampered with in any way, notify the clerk immediately. It is recommended to go inside and pay at the register, but if that is not an option, use a credit card at the pump. If you must use a debit card, choose the credit option to avoid entering your PIN.

You can also prevent account information from being stolen by carrying only the cards you need, cutting up old cards, keeping your PIN and account number secret and shredding receipts. Also, be careful about who you write checks to because there is information on them that can help people hack into your bank account.

Many card companies are now switching over to chip cards, also known as smart or EMV cards, which use a unique process to determine whether the card is authentic. These chip cards are embedded with a microchip as well as the traditional magnetic stripe. These cards encrypt information to help increase data security when used at chip-enabled terminals.

If you lose your card, make sure to report it immediately. Once your card is reported lost or stolen, federal law states that you cannot be held liable for charges that occur after that time. With a debit card, each provider has certain regulations as to how much you are liable for, regarding unauthorized charges

prior to filing a report. Typically, with a credit card you are not responsible for any charges if you can prove it was not you that made them. This is one reason why the convenience of online banking is so helpful. You can access your checking account at any time to look for unauthorized charges.

Check your bank statements frequently to ensure your receipts match all transactions listed. If you notice anything suspicious, alert your credit card company or bank immediately to limit your liability. If you think your information might have been compromised, but no charges have been made yet, still request a new card for precautionary measures.

HOW TO USE THE LEARNING CENTER

Going into the Learning Center for the first time can be intimidating for students. They know when walk-in tutoring is and they walk into the library room 205 and then... this is when students often feel awkward.

For all walk-in tutoring sessions, tutors have nametags and signs that indicate who they are and the subject that they tutor. Tutors sit next to their signs most of the time, so they are easy to locate. A student should mention the type of tutoring they would like when they walk into the room, and a tutor from that discipline will be able to help. Once students sit down with a

tutor, they must fill out their email, Student ID Number, grade level, course and instructor and session goal. It is always good practice to come prepared with the assignment details. Writing walk-in tutoring is limited to 30 minutes per student per session, but math and business tutors work with students throughout the shift as they practice sample problems.

Typically, after visiting walk-in tutoring three times, students can request a one-to-one tutor by filling out the Request for Academic Assistance form. Students can find this form in the Learning Center office or ask Jill Judd, the Administrative Office Manager. If a student requests tutoring in a discipline The

Learning Center does not offer walk-in tutoring for, such as History or Justice Studies, a student can fill out the form without coming to walk-ins.

The Learning Center also offers a mentoring program for which students fill out the same Request for Academic Assistance form, but instead select 'mentor.' Different than a tutor, a mentor specifically focuses on overall academic achievement skills such as time management, studying for tests, taking notes, and motivation.

International students who are interested in conversational English are encouraged to go to the Learning Center office and find the binder on the table in the middle of the room. In the binder, students can sign up for sessions for that week. During these sessions, international students have the opportunity to converse with a domestic student tutor about a variety of topics.

The Learning Center attempts to make it as easy as possible for students to get the academic assistance that they want. At any time, go to the second floor of the library and find a team dedicated to the success and achievement of every student that walks through their doors.

COMMUTERS NOT NOTIFIED OF PARKING RESTRICTIONS

Commuter students and faculty came to campus on the morning of Wednesday, Feb. 17 and found some of the parking lot behind the Shapiro Library blocked off for the Career and Internship Fair participants. A vehicle from public safety sat in the lot to save the spaces, and barriers were set up. There was no prior notification from Public Safety that these parking spaces would be closed. This was not the first time there were parking restrictions without any notification. Public Safety Director Jim Winn said that Public Safety "took 100 out of 465 spaces in the lot. If there is not going to be an impact,

we do not notify people of the closed spaces. If we were closing a whole lot, we would notify people." Winn explained that Public Safety conducts surveys every day for the first three weeks of each semester to determine the flow of traffic in the parking lots. Surveys are conducted at the beginning of class times to see how popular the spaces in the lots are. This allows them to judge how many spots they can give to guests for special events without having to displace commuters. Winn continued, "We don't want to displace people. I wouldn't authorize closing the spaces if anyone would be displaced based on the surveys." Senior Paul Peters, who got to campus before 9 a.m., said, "I wasn't frustrated

today. I was like, whatever."

Another student who preferred to remain anonymous said, "I couldn't find anywhere to park. I ended up parking behind the swimming pool on the side just so I could get to class as soon as possible. I was 6 minutes late to class because of this. If I had been notified, I would've come earlier and probably would've been okay." This student arrived to campus after 9 a.m. to get to his 9:30 a.m. class. After notifying Winn that some commuter students and faculty were displaced on Feb. 17 even with only 100 spaces taken, Winn said that he may "consider making a notification in the future. Not for just 25 spots, but maybe for more than that."

POET LACEY ROOP SLAMS SNHU

Lacey Roop took the stage on the night of Friday, Feb. 19 in the Last Chapter Pub with her slam poetry. CAPE put on the event and it was co-sponsored by the Deborah L. Coffin Women's Center, Student Activists for Gender Equality, and the Office of Diversity Initiatives. Roop read some of her poems that centered on themes of gender, sexuality, and the power of women. One particular poem she presented, "A Lesson from Third Graders," explained how her parents discussed ways

Though Roop claimed to not be a funny person, she was caught slipping witty lines in between her poems during her hour-long performance. Music also continued to run behind some of the poems as an additive to the power of her words.

Her time on stage was certainly a performance and not

just a recital of words. Roop made it possible to get excited about words as shown by the cheering of those in the audience. Sophomore Ericka Broderick said, "I've never seen a slam poet before and that is the best way to describe Lacey. Her poems truly slammed my perspective on society and left a mark unlike any other."

The president of SEA, Hannah Pierce continued this annual event because students have enjoyed the chocolate tour for the past few years. The tour began with a greeting from the Taza Chocolate Factory clerk who then showed students around the store and introduced different types of Taza chocolate with sample pieces. Since chocolate is especially popular around Valentine's Day, the Taza employees had the store decorated for the holiday.

"I enjoyed the trip to the Taza

Chocolate Factory," Vin Nut-halapati, a member of SEA said. "I signed up for this event on the SNHU Tickets site because I love chocolate and I like making new friends and I love networking with people."

The tour of the factory, located inside the store, lasted for approximately one hour. The building carried a strong scent of cacao bean.

There are huge, modern machines and assembly lines equipped in different working zones. The clerk told students about the product process, how the brand started and answered questions about their chocolate.

Taza founder Alex Whitmore studied Spanish in Mexico and was inspired by the local hot

chocolate there. He loved the unique texture and intense taste of it and decided to make his career in manufacturing this chocolate into a product. The name company name, "Taza," means "cup" in Spanish.

Taza purchases the organic cacao beans from selected farm suppliers and completes the remaining process including the grinding, roasting, shaping, design, packaging, promoting and selling within the factory.

They use hand-carved Mexican traditional stone mills named Molinos to grind the cacao which preserves the natural flavor of the beans. Along with bringing the environmental friendly product to stores, Taza is a family-owned business.

PROTECTION FROM IDENTITY THEFT

Identity theft is a serious problem in the United States. According to the Bureau of Justice Statistics, there were 17.6 million reports of stolen identities in 2014 with an average of \$3,500 in losses. In an effort to protect your identity, always be careful about what information you share. Information that should be protected include your name, social security number (SSN), date of birth, phone number, and address.

Be sure to shred documents and receipts. These pieces of paper contain personal information on them. Any document that has personal information on it such as bank receipts, register receipts, bills, medical records, etc. should be shredded. It is best to use a cross-cut shredder, as that will distort the information.

Be careful about who you give your SSN number to. Only give someone your SSN if you absolutely have to. Try asking if there are any other forms of identification you can give instead. Do not walk around with your SSN card or have it written down anywhere unless you have to. It is best to keep your SSN card locked in a hidden fire and waterproof safe.

Another way that thieves can get personal information is by hacking onto devices and accounts. It is very important to have a password protected lock

screen on your phone, tablet, and computer. It is also crucial to have anti-spam/virus software installed. This will help protect you from hackers and keep you at less risk from unsafe websites. Having a proper password for all accounts is important as well. For example, no one should leave their my.snhu.edu account password as their birthday because it is easily hackable. Also don't have your password be "password" or "123456." Those are some of the most popular passwords, which makes your account easier to attack. Keep your passwords long with varying numbers, letters and special characters. Try to have a different password for each account and change them every couple of months to increase security.

Be careful when downloading apps on your phone. Before downloading an app, read what permissions are

required for the app to run. Many apps require a lot of extra unnecessary permissions. If you are unsure about an app, read through the ratings and comments to see if anyone has had problems with it.

Lastly, protect yourself from phishing scams. Phishing scams are emails and phone calls that claim to be a part of a trustworthy organization, but are actually just trying to get information out of you in order to steal your identity or request money from you. According to Auburn University, these emails can look so convincing that 80,000 people fall for them every day. You can always call the company the email is claiming to be prior to entering in any information, to ensure it is legit.

Always be careful about who you give your information to. If you think your identity might have been stolen, call your local police station.

It is a must see for any film fan and an absolute necessity for a Tarantino fan. If you haven't already seen it, get ready to watch our favorite film that 2015 had to offer.



Mario is back and Luigi's seeing double as the fifth installment in Alpha Dream's "Mario and Luigi" series of Role-Playing Games, "Mario and Luigi Paper Jam" has big shoes to fill. Those shoes become bigger when the crossover game incorporates elements from the popular "Paper Mario" series as well. Fans of both series will be drawn to the unique visual style and upbeat comical writing. They may be slightly confused and even somewhat disappointed by the lackluster storyline.

"Paper Jam" begins with Luigi tipping over a book that unleashes the denizens of Paper Mario's own Mushroom Kingdom into the real world. Two Princess Peach's, two Marios, and you guessed it, two Bowsers are there. Now a trio of heroes with their Star Sprite guide must pursue and defeat this Koopa

alliance.

To be blunt, you don't play a Mario game for its story. That's simply a fact, but one would play this game for its vibrant worlds, and yes, it's stellar combat. This simple and easy to grasp RPG system gets shaken up with even more quick time reflexive action. Using the A button to control Mario, the B button to control Luigi, and the Y button to control Paper Mario, there are numerous dynamic combinations.

The game avoids feeling too fast thanks to its turn based restrictions. You never lose the elements that make it a Mario game, but the RPG traits are woven in, in a way that feels authentic, effective, and most of all consistent.

As I previously mentioned, this game gains quite a bit from its beautiful environments. While it rehashes a lot of the themes of previous Mario games, each area has a good combination of paper and cardboard environment pieces as well as

rounded pieces to match the style of the game's main setting.

This is complemented by the comfortable overworld controls. Worried that controlling the jumps for three characters might feel clunky or weird? The X button serves as a simultaneous jump for the brothers, even adding a bit of a flutter.

Arguably, this game's greatest trait is its humorous writing. From the Paper Toads that crowd the world to Bowser and his baddie crew, you're never short of a few laughs.

There are even scenes where a real and paper princess bond over the tedious nature of Bowser's kidnapping tactics. When you see Bowser Jr. and Paper Bowser Jr. start hanging out, your heart will melt. It may be the cutest thing ever. The only character who allows their dialogue to fall flat is Starlow, but that may be my own personal bias.

While elements of the

"Mario and Luigi" series are lost in "Paper Jam," new elements take their place, and make for a very powerful experience. More characters, more personalities, more

For many years, a recreational gem of trees has been waiting, untouched, to be used by the Southern New Hampshire University (SNHU) community. "Currently, there have been several drafts of a startup and strategic plan, but nothing has been finalized. By letting students see what is at stake, it would be great to raise more awareness on this issue and help provide a little nudge to Administration to officially certify this project!"

In addition to benefiting the SNHU community, the arboretum could be used by the greater Manchester community

The amount of snow that central New York gets equals many days of cancelled classes,




and getting to stay in with your hot chocolate and blankets or romping around in the snow. Why would anyone complain about this?

Some of the changes they


will be making include paid sick leave, to ensure that when employees are sick they will stay home, changes to their food preparation techniques, and additional DNA testing on food products before it is

Southern New Hampshire University's (SNHU) Men's Ice Hockey just concluded their regular season with a 1-0 win against Stonehill College on Feb. 13. The Penmen went 8-13-4 overall with a home record of 4-6-3.

When asked about how the team's season went, Head Coach Kenneth Hutchins said, "It's been a challenge,

but we've improved the last 3 weeks with our overall system fundamentals and mental and physical conditioning which helped us to finally find our team chemistry and identity."

Heading into the post-season, sophomore forward Kyle Valliere leads the team with 12 goals, followed by senior forward Jim Gabrione with eight. Tied for third are freshman forward Artem Efimov-Barakov and junior

forward Jay Sylvania, who both have six apiece. In assists, Gabrione leads with 15, Sylvania has 12, and sophomore defenseman Sean McTiernan has eight. Leading in points are Gabrione with 23, Sylvania with 18, and Valliere has 16.

Sophomore goalie Ryan Slatky leads with 18 games played and over 1,000 minutes played in those 18 games. Slatky has a goals against average of 3.40 and a .915 save percentage. Senior

goalie David Letarte comes in second on the team with 344 minutes played, and goals against average of 4.18 and an .882 save percentage.

The season will continue, however, as the Penmen head into the Northeast-10 Championship Semi-Finals as underdogs.

"If we play with poise, confidence and competitive greatness for a full 60 or more minutes, we can beat any NE-10 team in the play-

offs," Hutchins said. "We are in the playoffs now and we do not care about anything else except getting ready for Saturday and hope as many students and staff can make the quick drive over to Saint Anselm's and give us a home crowd advantage like two years ago."
