
New Hampshire National Guard Military Academy is currently enrolling Class XVIII for its Officer Candidate School. New Hampshire Military Academy is for students of colleges which do not offer ROTC and have until 30 April to apply for admission.

More than two hundred and twenty-five men have received commissions as 2d Lieutenants since the Department of Army accredited the program in March 1957. The Small College Program is designed for college sophomores and it is open to both out-of-state and resident college students. The students sign up in March or April of their sophomore year and receive nine weeks of pre-combat training at one of the United States Training Installations during their summer vacations. It is designed so that the student can become an officer without any interruptions in his college career.

While participating in a once-a-month weekend meetings during his junior year as part of the Pre-OCS program, the Small College Student then enters the regular three-phase OCS program in which the New Hampshire National Guard Candidates are enrolled. Once enrolled in the three-phase program the students will draw Sergeants pay and if they withdraw they are released without prejudice to their original unit.
