Dr. Gertrude C. Shapiro, Chairman of the Graduation Committee, announces that a signed contract has just been received from the American Program Bureau. The contract confirms the speaker for New Hampshire College's forty-first commencement. JULIAN BOND, a founder of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, and first Black ever to be nominated for the U. S. Vice Presidency (1968), will make the commencement address at New Hampshire College on Saturday, May 26, 1973. He has served for the last several years as a member of the Georgia legislature.

A-V Education Director Dick Ball reports that the Manchester Central High School Band will provide music for the forty-first commencement ceremonies at NHC. This is the superb band that was acclaimed for its music at President Edward M. Shapiro's Installation in May 1972. May 26 is shaping up as a very special day for NHC's graduates.
