KAARLO TUOMI AT NHC

On Thursday, February 21 at 8 p.m., NHC will present Mr. Kaarlo Tuomi - the only Soviet American ex-secret Double Agent appearing in public in the U. S. and Canada. Mr. Tuomi's lecture topic is "Diary of a Secret Agent of the Two World Super Powers."

A full-fledged native born U. S. citizen, Mr. Tuomi has lived in the Soviet Union for 25 years and is a graduate of the teachers' college in Kirov, Russia. Recruited into the KGB (Soviet Secret Service) in the late 40's, Kaarle was sent to the United States in 1958 to act as a spy. In March of 1959, the FBI contacted him, and after many conversations, Kaarle decided in fawor of the United States and became a double agent for the FBI.

His life story in condensed form appeared in the April 1970 issue of Reader's Digest under "The Schooling of a Soviet Spy" and the May issue under "The Spy Who Changed His Mind." His story is also featured in John Barron's "K.G.B.," recently released.

BLUEGRASS AT NHC

On Saturday, February 23, NHC will present Don Reno, Bill Harrell and the Tennessee Cutups. The concert begins at 8 p.m. in the gym. The Cutups are the first and only bauegrass group ever to perform at the United Nations and a Presidential Inaugural. They have also played at most of the major bluegrass festivals as well as appearing on the Grand Ole Opry.

Don Reno was voted by the readers of Bluegrass Unlimited magazine "The 1971 Banjo Player of the Year." Don, a guitarist as well as a banjo player, was the original co-recorder of "Dueling Banjos." Bill Harrell, the rhythm guitar player and lead singer, has been Don's partner since 1966. The group also includes Ed Ferris on bass and Buck Ryan, three-time National Fiddle Champion.

Appearing with the Cutups is the comedy team of Edmonds and Curley. This up and coming act has appeared with Johnny Carson, Dick Cavett, Mike Douglas and other television shows as well as in night clubs throughout the U.S. Currently touring college campuses in the Northeast, Edmonds and Curley will soon bring their comic genius to NHC.

New Businessa Telethon
