



















memoriam























New Hampshire College played its first home soccer game against St. Francis College of Biddeford, Maine at 2500 North River Road the site of the new campus. After 39 years on the road, New Hampshire College welcomed the opportunity to play its first home athletic event.

The soccer program was fairly successful. The soccer team finished the season strongly with two wins over Hawthorne College and Franklin Pierce College. A number of lettermen will be returning and 1971 could be a good year for the Penmen. With the construction of our new facility, our soccer program should be enhanced.

Lockerroom facilities will be adjacent to the athletic field and with the dormitories on campus, we expect better participation from the student body. Norton Phelps Jr. will continue coaching. Coach Phelps will be attending a soccer work shop in August conducted by the National Soccer Coach's Association.

Practice will begin the last week in August with our first game scheduled for the 18th of September against Eastern Nazarene College. The 1970 soccer program was a good one. The athletic department feels that the addition of the new field gives the program the needed impetus to continue.

Our winter sports program featured skiing, basketball, and club hockey. Lyman Gilmore directed the ski program and was extremely pleased with the turnout and the results. The group that comprised the ski team was very enthusiastic. Coach Gilmore sees great things in the future for his people.

The ski team conducted the ski meet for the Greater Manchester Winter Carnival. The college can be extremely proud of the fact that the Board of Directors informed me that that this was the finest ski meet in the carnival's history.

First year basketball coach, Keith Sternberg, did a fine job with the program. The basketball team led by co-captains Reggie Brooks and John Astarita compiled a 15-9 record. John and Reggie became the second and third players in the history of New Hampshire College to score 1000 points.

The basketball team gained national recognition playing three teams that were ranked in the top twenty college division in the nation. Our basketball team appeared on television and played before the largest crowd in the history of the college at Eastern Michigan University. Following the season, Reggie Brooks was drafted by the Boston Celtics of the National Basketball Association.

The hockey program did very well under the direction of coach Lenny Hammond. The hockey club in its second year of existence won the first annual Gordon College Invitational Hockey Tournament. Coach Hammond sees an expanded program for next year and hopes that the new campus will generate more enthusiasm for hockey. The program will continue on a club basis for next year supported by the college and student government.

Baseball, tennis, and golf got under way with contests versus Roger Williams College. In baseball, the Penmen won the New England Intercollegiate Baseball Association tournament with a 12 inning 3-1 victory over New England College. The team had finished second in tie for second place in regular league play.

Chris Rheaume was voted most valuable player in the tournament for his outstanding pitching performance against New England College.

New Hampshire College participated against St. Anselms and defeated the Hawks 6-1. Other additions to our baseball schedule include Keene State College and Franklin Pierce College.

Tennis which has had limited success in previous years blossomed this season under the watchful eye of coach Rothman. New Hampshire College won its first tennis match in three years versus Roger Williams College and continued in its winning wins by defeating Castleton State. The tennis program has showed continued improvement and we look at the future with great expectations.

Our golf program got under way with a match versus Keene State College. We continue to play our matches at the Charmingfare Country Club. The team is not as successful as teams in the past, but we have an enthusiastic group of youngsters and with many returning lettermen, it looks good for the future.

In summary, the college athletic program went very well for 1970-71. We had better participation than ever before. All of our programs completed their schedules where as last year, they were cut short by the student involvement in the world crisis.

The college received national recognition. The name of New Hampshire College was publicized throughout the country. Five of our athletes were selected as outstanding athletes of America. These boys will be listed in "Outstanding Athletes In America", a book that will be published in June.

The college looks to the future with great hope. We will be on our new campus. We will have our new gymnasium. The athletic department feels that with these new ingredients, bigger and better things are in store for the youngsters who participate in varsity athletes for the college.
