#### Obama and Clinton Battle for the Democratic Nomination

The Presidential race for the White House has been heating up on the Democratic side with Barack Obama and Hillary Clinton battling to win the Democratic nomination.

At the March 11 Mississippi primary, Obama received 60.8 percent of the votes and was awarded 19 delegates, while Clinton received 37 percent of the votes and was awarded 14 delegates, according to Foxnews. com.

As of March 12, Obama's delegate count stood at 1602, which is 106 higher than Clinton's 1496 and 423 short of the 2,025 delegates needed to win

the Democratic nomination. Most of Clinton's delegates have come from wins in Texas, Ohio, Massachusetts, New York, New Jersey and California. Obama has done well in Kansas, Idaho, Delaware, Connecticut, and Illinois, where he is a Senator.

Key upcoming Democratic primaries include Pennsylvania with 156 delegates to be held on April 22 and North Carolina with 115 delegates to be held on May 6. According to a March 12 Foxnews.com article contributed by writer Bonney Kapp and the Associated Press, early polls show Clinton with a lead in





Becky McNeal, 54, of Camden, Maine, has been accepted into the Peace Corps. McNeal will be departing for Ukraine in March to begin preservice training as a community development Peace Corps Volunteer. Upon graduation from Volunteer training in June, McNeal will be assisting businesses, government institutions, and non-governmental organizations (NGOs) in transforming Ukraine from state-controlled economy to a free market economy.

"The opportunity to be a community member, rather than an 'American tourist' has always been a desire," said McNeal.

McNeal is currently working on a master's degree at Southern New Hampshire Uni-

criticisms can be heard about the snow removal process around the SNHU campus.

Following the past snow removal, Ashley Lacroix, a junior and resident student, was asked how she felt about the snow removal process. "I wouldn't be able to drive my car around campus if they didn't plow but the massive amounts of tickets [Public Safety] gives out if your car isn't moved right away is ridiculous," she said.

Assistant Director of Public Safety Norman St. Onge commented about Public Safety's ticketing and towing by stating that, "I do think it has improved since last year." He went on to note that last year there were anywhere between 30-40 tows a night whereas there are only approximately 10-12 a night this year.

St. Ogne stated that he was unsure of the increase in ticketing on snow removal days versus non-snow removal days, but did state that the majority of complaints during snow removal are by commuters who cannot find parking spots.

All the snow this year has been keeping facilities quite busy. Bob Vachon, Director of Facilities Management, stated, "This winter has been incredibly challenging. We're very close to breaking the state record of 122.1 inches of snow set in 1873-74... we have had to relearn what an old-fashioned New England winter means in terms of snow removal."

Based on what Public Safety, students, and the Director of Facilities reported, this has been a challenging winter for everyone. At this point, it is hard to determine if snow removal is a friend or foe, at this point it is simply a matter of a opinion.

Pennsylvania, and Obama with a lead in North Carolina.

Things have been a lot quieter on the Republican side. Republican candidate John McCain has collected more than the 1,191 delegates necessary to win the Republican nomination. Competing Republican candidates Mitt Romney and Mike Huckabee have only been able to collect around 250 delegates respectively. On the Democratic side, John Edwards was able to collect 26 delegates before dropping out of the race.

Campaign tactics from Clinton's team have included television ads depicting Clinton as being better than Obama at handling a 3 am phone call about a national crisis. Obama's team has been promoting the fact that Obama has opposed the war in Iraq since its start.

According to CNNPolitics.com, Clinton and Obama both support a phased redeployment of troops from Iraq. Among other issues that are being considered in the upcoming election, both Clinton and Obama support continued funding for stem-cell research, are both are against privatizing social security.

However, Obama and Clinton are in disagreement over the issue of education. Clinton believes the No Child Left Behind act should be removed, while Obama favors reforming it. Also, Obama has stated he would meet with leaders of Iran, Syria, and Cuba within the first year of his Presidency to discuss issues, while Clinton says she would not.

On April 16, there will be a debate between Clinton and Obama in Philadelphia before the Pennsylvania primary on the 22nd.



"I am most excited about hanging out with all my friends for one last big party," said senior Anthony Poole.

One big party is exactly what this year's trip will be as most participants will be rooming with whomever they chose, and the trips itinerary is open for students to choose how to spend their time.

Also excited for the trip is Scott Tierno, Director of Student Life. "We've never had a senior week like this before," said Tierno. "I expect it will be a great event and most [upcoming] seniors will want to do something like this in the future."

However, because this year's trip for senior week is quite different then the past, scheduling dates have left some seniors fearing they will have to move out of their dorms right before the trip and not have a place to stay.

"The trip is a great idea, but the school is making us go home for the weekend of May 9th and we have to be back real early on Monday May 12th for our flights," said Poole. "If you live far away like my roommates and I do, you have to get a hotel so you can make the flights on time. This is an inconvenience."

When asked about this situation, Tierno was very understanding and has directed those students living far away to the Director of Residence Life to make their case. "The idea [of the trip] isn't to inconvenience anyone," assured Tierno.

He mentioned students can approach Residence Life about temporary housing for that weekend and decisions are made on a case-by-case basis, implying that students living further away may get more consideration for temporary housing compared to students living in the immediate vicinity of the campus.

In the beginning stages of this year's senior week, Tierno admitted he and some of the other team members felt hesitant about going to Disney because of the uncertainty in student interest and turnout of seniors for the trip. However, based on previous senior weeks' average turnout of 120 seniors, this year's senior week is no exception. Out of 306 seniors, 100 seniors were

versity in Manchester, N.H., in Community Economic Development as part of the Master's International program. She previously worked for the Institute for Global Ethics.

Established in 1987, Master's International is a Peace Corps program in collaboration with over 40 academic institutions that offers Peace Corps Volunteers the opportunity to complement a master's degree with overseas service available in a variety of fields. Master's International students serve in over 70 different countries and participate in every aspect of life overseas.

"My three daughters are all in college and my home has become quiet and wanting," said McNeal. "The Peace Corps is a perfect fit for this window of opportunity, both health-wise and family-wise, as it ignites a desire to make a positive difference."

Today, 8,079 Americans serve in the Peace Corps. Of that total, 5% or 406 Volunteers currently serving are aged 50 or older. The Peace Corps regards older Volunteers as a great asset, bringing both their professional and life experiences to help countries around the world meet their development needs. Volunteers over age 50 are currently

serving in 66 of the 73 Peace Corps countries.

During the first three months of her service, McNeal will live with a host family in Ukraine to become fully immersed in the country's language and culture. After acquiring the language and cultural skills necessary to assist her community, McNeal will serve for two years in Ukraine, living in a manner similar to people in her host country.

McNeal joins the 73 Maine residents currently serving in the Peace Corps. More than 1,631 Maine residents have served in the Peace Corps since 1961.

Since achieving independence in 1991, Ukraine has taken significant steps toward democracy, political pluralism, entering the European Union, and a free-market economy. In an effort to address these multidimensional goals, the Peace Corps has sent over 1,746 Volunteers to Ukraine since 1992. Volunteers are actively engaged in the areas community development, English language education, and youth development. Ukraine is currently home to the largest Peace Corps program with over 374 Volunteers presently serving.

The Peace Corps is celebrating a 47-year legacy of service at home and abroad. Currently there are 8,000 Volunteers abroad, a 37-year high for Volunteers in the field. Since 1961, more than 190,000 Volunteers have helped promote a better understanding between Americans and the people of the 139 countries where Volunteers have served. Peace Corps Volunteers must be U.S. citizens and at least 18 years of age. Peace Corps service is a 27-month commitment. ## Feature: SNHU Family Hits Hard Times

Three years ago, two of Public Safety Officer Dick Lawrence's four children, Stephanie and Kevin, were diagnosed with cancer. Five months ago, they buried 16-year-old Stephanie. Just weeks later, doctors informed the Manchester family that cancer had resurfaced in Kevin, 19.

The Lawrences' rare circumstance -- two children battling cancer simultaneously -- is only part of what makes their story so compelling. Fifteen years ago, Dick and his wife Ann took in her brother's children, Stephanie and Kevin Hudon, after their mother died. Since then the Lawrences, including 23-year-old Melissa, and 18-year-old Philip, have functioned as one big happy family.

In September 2005, Stephanie was diagnosed with bone cancer. Fourteen months later, Kevin was diagnosed with Hodgkin's Lymphoma. While Dick worked as a second-shift Public Safety Officer, his wife devoted herself to the care of her children, making the weekly 150-mile round trips to Dartmouth Hitchcock Medical Center for

biopsies, surgeries, chemotherapies, scans and blood tests, all while trying to keep home life as normal as possible.

Kevin's treatment went well and his condition seemed to be in remission by last spring. But as he grew stronger, Stephanie started to fade. Despite a valiant and determined spirit, Stephanie died in August 2007.

On November 9, one year to the day of his first diagnosis, Kevin learned that his condition had returned. Kevin started another round of chemotherapy in November, and will receive a bone marrow transplant this month. Over the course of his treatments, doctors have detected an immune deficiency, which causes him to take about

twice as long to rebound from illness.

Once Kevin returns home from the transplant, the house has to be ready. While he's in the hospital, PSO Lawrence will be working to create a sterile environment at home. Thanks to a generous donation, most of the housing supplies will be donated. However, the Lawrences still have mounting bills due to travel expenses, labor, and the immeasurable emotional strain.

At this time the SNHU community, headed by a student initiative, is setting up fundraising to help the Lawrence family. If anyone is interested in helping out or donating you can contact Amanda Morrill at Amanda. morrill@snhu.edu.



#### SNHU Alerts Raise Varied Opinion

In an effort to explore different means of communication to its community, Southern New Hampshire University introduced SNHU Alerts this past academic year. Opinions about the text messaging service have since been on the rise.

"The Crisis Management team (which regularly meets and attends workshops, etc.) had learned about such emergency communication systems and was investigating which would be the best one for our campus," said Dr. Scott Kalicki, vice president for Student Affairs. "A recommendation was made to the Executive Council when we found what we thought was the right product/service," Kalicki said.

Kalicki stated that the system "allows us to get a message to nearly an unlimited number [of] students, faculty and staff in less than a minute."

Carla Carpenter, senior at SNHU Manchester, said, "I like it for the safety feature, but I don't when I get (alerts) for SNHU Maine."

Students can subscribe to receive alerts for different centers when they sign up for the alert service and have access to an account where settings can be changed. There is also a field for suggestions if anyone is receiving alerts that do not apply to them or simply need assistance.

Others enjoy the accessibility the system provides. "It's easy to get snow delays and it's good for safety reasons if something bad happens on campus," said Sara Bertagnolli, a junior at SNHU. Bertagnolli says she hasn't had a problem with professors allowing her cell phone to be on in class.

Hope Larson, a sophomore at SNHU, uses the texts mainly for cancellations and says it's easier for her to receive a text message than trying to find (cancellations) online. For those who are not able or do not wish to receive the SNHU alerts, they can be found on the SNHU website under student links.

Kalicki wishes to encourage students, faculty and staff to take advantage of this free service. "We are committed to only sending emergency messages (the lowest emergency being a weather-related school closing)," said Kalicki.

The alert system is used by SNHU to report crisis situations affecting the SNHU community as well as cancellations and delays. With record-breaking snowfall this year, cancellations have been frequent, putting the new system into use right away.

All personal information inputted into the SNHU Alerts system is safe, confidential and not released to anyone. To date, approximately 1,800 users have signed up for SNHU Alerts.

with "Race for the Cure". This is a foundation committed to finding a cure for cancer. They raised over \$2,000 for the cause.

### Inflationary Concerns Mount for U.S. Economy

While fears of a potential recession have dominated the headlines lately, recent price data has brought attention to the threat of inflation to the U.S. economy. The consumer price index, which aims to measure the general level of the prices of goods and services purchased by the typical U.S. consumer, increased 0.4% in January. This was above the 0.3% forecast.

The January price increase contributed to a 4.3% increase in prices over the past year. The core consumer price index, which excludes the typically unstable food and energy prices, was measured 0.1% above forecasts at 0.3%.

Inflation is a concern because it alters the purchasing power of the dollar, which is the amount of goods and services that the dollar can purchase. When prices are stable and inflation is anticipated, market participants can anticipate the price increases and behave accordingly. This tends to impact the economy positively.

However, when inflation is unexpected and variable, it can distort the information of prices, reduce investment, and lead to the unproductive use of resources. These types of price fluctuations tend to have a negative impact on the economy.

The possibility of higher inflation is particularly concerning at a time when economic growth is slow. The Fed is currently attempting to stimulate the economy with interest rate cuts. Lower interest rates decrease the cost of borrowing, which tends to encourage spending and investment.

Additionally, the lower interest rates can lead to a rise in the overall level of prices as more money is available to purchase goods. However, the Fed currently believes that weak economic growth and the resulting decrease in the demand for resources make inflationary pressures unlikely in the near future.

The next Fed meeting is set for March 18 and the expectation is that the Fed will agree on another interest rate cut. While the Fed appears to have placed concerns for economic growth ahead of inflation at the moment, some Fed members caution that interest rate hikes may be necessary in the future to rein in inflation.

## Unemployment Rate Decreases Although Job Losses Continue

The unemployment rate decreased from 4.9% to 4.8% in February, although many industry sectors experienced heavy losses in employment for the second straight month.


Even though employment decreased, the unemployment rate also experienced a decrease due to decreases in the labor force from 66.1% to 65.9% as discouraged job seekers stopped seeking work and were no longer counted in the unemployment rate by the Bureau of Labor Statistics. During February, 450,000 people for various reasons were no longer being included in the unemployment figures.

Bernstein of the Economic Policy Institute stated to the International Herald, "Had the 450,000 people who left the labor force last month been counted among the unemployed, the jobless rate would have been 5.1% instead of 4.8%."

Keith Hall was reported by Reuters as stating that the Bureau of Labors Statistics' broadest measure of unemployment that includes unemployment by both full and part time employees as well as people not searching for a job showed that an increase from 8.1% a year ago to 8.9% today.

CNNMoney.com reported that Hall, the commissioner of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, said to the congressional committee,

## Opinion: Why Do We Pay Taxes?

Everybody that works has a dilemma. "I never get paid what I earn." "My paycheck states that I made \$480.00, and I only received \$385.44." "Who is taking my money?" "What are they doing with it?"

The way the system works is that the company you work for sends in form 941. This states the amounts that each of their employees have taken out of their paycheck. This amount is also totaled on the W-2 form that employees receive at the end of the year.

Form 941 allows the government, specifically the U.S. Treasury Department, to collect the money from the employer's tax depository bank or from the check they send with the 941. If they do not send in the money, you will still be able to

collect on your end. They have incurred a liability when they send in the 941, and the U.S. Treasury Department will hold the company responsible for the payment.

"OK! But what are they doing with my money?" The sixteenth amendment to the constitution, ratified on February 3, 1913, gave congress the power to lay and collect taxes. Tax law is known as the Internal Revenue Code; Congress enacts the laws and the IRS enforces them. It is expected that each inhabitant of the United States that receives income will be responsible and perform voluntary compliance, meaning file a tax return in a timely manner.

"job growth appears to have weakened across nearly every industry with the exception of health care and government."

The net loss in jobs during February was 63,000. Job losses were heavily felt in most industries lead by the losses in the construction and manufacturing industry. The declines were the worst since March 2003. The manufacturing industry shed 52,000 jobs. The construction industry shed 39,000 jobs. Retailers trimmed 34,000 jobs from their work force. Temporary staffing cut employees by 28,000. Hotels trimmed staffs by 4,000 as discretionary consumer spending declined. Overall job losses in the private sector topped 101,000. The only gain in employment was experienced in the government industry.

It was reported on CNNMoney.com that Hall mentioned that the 637,000 workers over the past 12 months that are working part-time but are seeking full-time work, suggested that the job market is a sign of the labor market becoming weaker.

Be sure to incorporate all three expense categories fixed expenses (e.g., mortgage, auto loans and rent), variable expenses (e.g., credit cards, groceries, entertainment, clothes and gasoline) and periodic expenses (e.g., property taxes, home repair, and car maintenance).
- DON'T start charging when there is no money. If you have no money left after paying your bills, you may be headed for trouble. It is not a good idea to routinely rely on your credit card to pay for living expenses when you don't have the cash available. As a general rule, you should not be spending more than 20 percent of your takehome income on credit card bills or loans, and this includes your car payment.
- DON'T apply for new credit cards simply because you've reached the credit limit on existing cards. When your cards are taken to the limit, it is time to pay off the balance and adjust your spending habits not apply for more cards.
- DO make more than the minimum credit card payment. The NFCC recommends paying at least double the minimum required payment.
- DO reduce expenses wherever possible. Look for no or low-cost entertainment and cut back on other day-to-day spending. Small reductions in daily spending quickly add up to big savings. Trimming \$5 from your daily expenses adds up to more than \$1,800 over the course of a year!
- DO work with your creditors. If you encounter any problems repaying your debts, contact the creditor immediately and explain the situation. Creditors often will work with you to come up with an alternate payment arrangement.

## Opinion: LEAP Extends Presence on Campus

On February 20th, the Debate Club hosted a debate in the Pub to discuss the benefits and negative repercussions of legalizing drugs that are, at this time, illegal and considered socially unacceptable.

The arguments included topics of violence, economy and the overall moral feeling of society. However, the question that I left the venue asking myself was NOT, "Why do we not legalize these drugs?" or, "Why should we keep them banned?" My question was actually, with an unbiased view, "Are these drugs unacceptable because they are illegal? Or are they unacceptable because people genuinely believe they shouldn't be tolerated for reasons separate from those aforementioned?"

John Tommasi, a representative for LEAP (Law Enforcement Against Prohibition), was invited to the event to speak on behalf of the organization. In his presentation to the audience, he described LEAP as an organization, LEAP's history, and ideals that they support and represent. Founded in 2002, LEAP is comprised of current and former law enforcement and criminal justice professionals. Their intent is to speak out about the failure of existing drug policies.

In Tommasi's presentation,

he started with a quote from Billy Sunday, a famous baseball player during the first two decades of the 20th century. In it, Sunday spoke about prohibition among other things, and supported his argument in opposition to the prohibition act. Sunday was quoted as follows: "The reign of tears is over. The slums will soon be only a memory. We will turn our prisons into factories and our jails into storehouses and comcribs. Men will walk upright now, women will smile, and the children will laugh. Hell will be forever for rent." Much of the debate and presentation was focused more around the violence and economic factors rather than any other, which is what lead me to question what I did. I was not expecting a different channel of argument, but, after witnessing firsthand the sides of debate, it led me to wonder about what was missing from it all.

Tommasi also spoke about the violence during the prohibition and compared the numbers to the numbers of drug related murders today and gave specific examples. As such, between the time in which the 18th Amendment was imposed in 1919 and until it was repealed through the 21st Amendment in 1933, the national murder rate increased by 67% and most had been blamed on illegal liquor trafficking. Tommasi used these numbers to say

#### Linkin Park Comes to the Verizon









people who drive their car. My friend had a car accident last month; he said it was a terrible blow for him because he couldn't control his steering wheel.





Doucette and Lane have been great not only because they help supervise this large group of active kids (we have about 40-50 each week) but the kids have fun playing with them and relate well to the college students.



a great online resource for students get an inside scoop of actual employees evaluating the company they work for, and what it's like to work there. "Make time to job search. Your first real job is finding a job," said Kuras. Some job search websites that were recommended in the workshop include:

"Sometimes it's who you know than what you know," said Kuras, explaining the importance of networking. By asking and following up with previous employers, attending informational interviews, asking professional associations, or anyone that you know that can help you point you in the right direction. These people can either offer advice or point you to the right people to talk to about landing a job or interview. "Getting to know and in touch with everyone you know about your job search is important. We can review your resume and pass it along to other people," Meena Roell advises from SELF Magazine.

Some tools of the trade that are needed are a resume and cover letter. At the CDC there are constantly resume and cover letter workshops where they help you write and evaluate your materials. Before sending out your resume and cover letter, the CDC approves of it, and tweaks it to it's utmost potential. The CDC also offers mock interviewing. "Being able to communicate effectively is what employers look for the most," said Jody NeJaime from UBS. The CDC has employers come into the office and sets up times where students come in and perform a mock interview. The interview is recorded, and later the CDC and the student go over the videotape and evaluate on the effectiveness and areas to improve upon.

Here are Kuras's top ten ways to jump-start your job search:

- 10 Start yesterday.
- Communicate Effectively.
- Try on the suit before you buy it (do your research)
- Go to the horse's mouth (talk to people)
- Keep your gun loaded and your powder dry (be prepared)
- Get your ducks in a row (plan)
- Look where the jobs are
- Do the work your first 'real' job is to find a job
- Keep track of and follow up on every lead
- NETWORK or don't work.

#### Security on Campus: How Do We Compare?

Due to unfortunate recent events at college campuses around the nation, is has become increasingly vital to acknowledge safety regulations and practices to ensure that the environment in which we live, work, and trust is fully protected and is providing the best security services possible. In comparing security provided by different college campuses, we are able to evaluate those provided, and judge based upon crime statistics and security satisfaction, how protected some campuses really are.

With every college and university in the United States operating under different conditions, in different locations, and with extremely different budgets, sometimes security services on these campuses are not uniform, fitting or even sufficient for that matter. However, there are programs, services and online forums out there that help colleges externally adapt to changing times and changing feelings, about security on campuses. Southern New Hampshire University and more than 1,800 other college campuses in the United Sates are all a part of an online forum in which they consistently converse about issues their college may be dealing with at that time. This tool is used by SNHU to ensure that even if we aren't dealing with an issue at a given time, we would be ready

did arise.

Colleges and universities in any given area need most of the same services, and instate most of the same precautions when it comes to things such as parking, towing and theft, not to mention anything else they would need to do to comply with individual state regulations and policies.

As mentioned, the location of a campus can also place an additional need on providing different services to fit the location properly. Services such as parking accommodations and towing are provided by Keene and SNHU, as well as a safe winter driving workshop held usually during December with dates announced on an individual basis.

Keene State College, (Keene, NH) has almost twice as many students as Southern New Hampshire University, but in terms of security, it offers most of the same services as SNHU and comparatively to those in the area, is quite similar. With SNHU's day student population hovering around 1,500, the average number of public safety officers on duty, at any given point varies depending on day, time, and other miscellaneous factors that have bearing on campus security. Officers patrol campus ground strategically, with most of the officers on duty during times in which the most calls are usually logged. With 15 full-time

for it, if and when the problem Public Safety officers employed by SNHU, as well as a handful of volunteer and work study students, there is quite a bit of overlap when it comes to patrols and shifts.

> The Keene campus, whose daily student traffic averages around 2,800, is patrolled by roughly the same amount of full time safety officers, as well as a group of more work study students that put their time into their campus safety program. Both Keene and SNHU's safety officers go through extensive training before they are hired. These training parameters include areas such as crime prevention, fire prevention, investigations, security patrolling and first aid. Additional training is normally unlimited and encouraged.

> Keene provides a program 2-3 times a semester called the Rape Aggression Defense program (RAD), in which it teaches female students how to avoid rape using a padded dummy suit that is similar to those used to train police dogs. Although this program is very expensive with the price of the suit being so high, Director of Public Safety James Winn and the public safety office plans to send two of SNHU's public safety officers to a training session in New Hampshire in the upcoming months, so that they will be able to come back and teach female students on SNHU's campus. SNHU has

not offered a RAD program in the past but plans to start one promptly after returning from the training. RAD classes would be free of charge and available to any female student or faculty member that wishes to partici-

Both campuses provide a number of other programs and services that facilitate safe and easy living to students on campus. Police involvement on campus is not obvious, and is not always necessary at SNHU. Winn believes that most of the problems can and should be resolved internally. "They come when they are needed," Winn added, referring to the police. Being that SNHU is a private university, most of the smaller issues can be dealt with on a case-to-case basis without police involvement. However, Winn says that SNHU tries to stay "ahead of the curve" by having Hooksett and Manchester fire and police on campus to assess services provided, as well as provide suggestions to improve security on campus.

In addition to the RAD program, Keene provides programs in which the students are then able to familiarize themselves with the people protecting them, and in doing this, the students are able to know the safety officers on a personal level. Even though SNHU does not provide these same types of programs, they team up with Residence Life

and the Wellness center several times a year to offer safety workshops in several areas including safety awareness and provide an incentive to attend by bringing their Segways to the event and permit students to take a little test drive.

Weapons and self defense mechanisms have also become an extreme concern among college campuses. Although both Keene and SNHU's public safety offices would like to make it known that their officers cannot be every place at once, MACE is not allowed on these campuses as it is on others such as UMASS Dartmouth. The Public Safety officers have done and continue to do what they can to ensure that the students and employees on campus are as safe as they can be.

Both Keene and SNHU receive hundreds of public safety calls a week. In the case of SNHU, these logs are available to any students wishing to view them. They are free to view during Public Safety hours in the PS office in Belknap Hall. (No appointment needed)

The second year event, which has a title sponsorship with local rock radio station Rock 101, is also frequently aided by the schools own Sport Management Department and other local companies that have attained partnerships with the Granite Bowl.

Granite Bowl rosters have a minimum of 7 players, and a maximum of 15 players. All players must be at least 16 years of age to play in the tournament. The fee for teams with 7 – 10 players is \$120, with an additional fee of \$10 per additional player. However, if a team registers before April 14th, 2008, the fee is only \$100 per team, with the \$10 additional player fee remaining the same. The Granite Bowl also offers a Free Agency program. If you don't have a team, a player can register as a Free Agent and will be placed on a team based on the number of players particular

teams have. The registration fee for Free Agents is \$15.

The Granite Bowl is also looking for volunteers to help make this year's event a success. Granite Bowl 2008 is looking to recruit between 60-80 volunteers for the event day. Volunteers are expected to work shifts during the day of the event, April 27 and also attend the volunteer training, which will take place on April 15. Not only will volunteers receive first hand experience in the areas of tournament operations, marketing, and registration, but also all volunteers will receive a t-shirt. Food will also be provided during training and on the day of the event.

There are many aspects of the Granite Bowl that are created with the intent to appeal to the SNHU community, as well as the surrounding areas community. 

#### Farewell to Favre

Brett Favre retired from the National Football League on March 4th, 2008 after 17 seasons in the league. The only player to win three MVP's is regarded as one of the top three quarterbacks of all time.

After coming into the league with the Atlanta Falcons in 1991 via the draft, he was traded to the Green Bay Packers the following year. In Green Bay, he started 253 (275 if you include the playoffs) games which is an NFL record. He also holds the record for most touchdown passes, most career NFL passing yards, most career pass completions, most career attempts, most career NFL interceptions thrown, and most career victories as a quarterback.

Favre and the Packers reached Superbowl XXXI in 1996 beating the New England Patriots 35-21. Favre threw two touchdowns in the win. The Packers reached the Superbowl the following year losing to the Denver Broncos 31-24. Favre threw one pick while connecting with three touchdowns in his last Superbowl.

On Sunday December 21, 2003, Brett Favre's father, Irvin, had died when he had a heart attack while driving. The following day, the Packers had a game and Favre performed one of his best games ever. He collected nearly 400 passing yards and four touchdowns against the Oakland Raiders. For his performance on Monday Night Football, he was named the NFC Offensive Player of the week.

As each off season began, it was speculated that Favre would retire but ended up that he never did. In the 2007 campaign, the Packers went 13-3 winning the NFC North. The Packers defeated

the Seattle Seahawks 42-20 in the Divisional Playoffs, but lost to the New York Giants in the NFC Championship game 23-20 in overtime. In Favre's last game, he threw an interception to R.W. McQuarters on first down. The Giants proceeded to charge down the field and Lawrence Tynes, kicking the longest field goal in playoff history, kicked the Giants into the Superbowl.

Brett Favre will be eligible for the Hall of Fame in 2013.




After graduating from Colgate University in 2003, Hubbard became an assistant coach at the University of New Hampshire which he held for five years.


