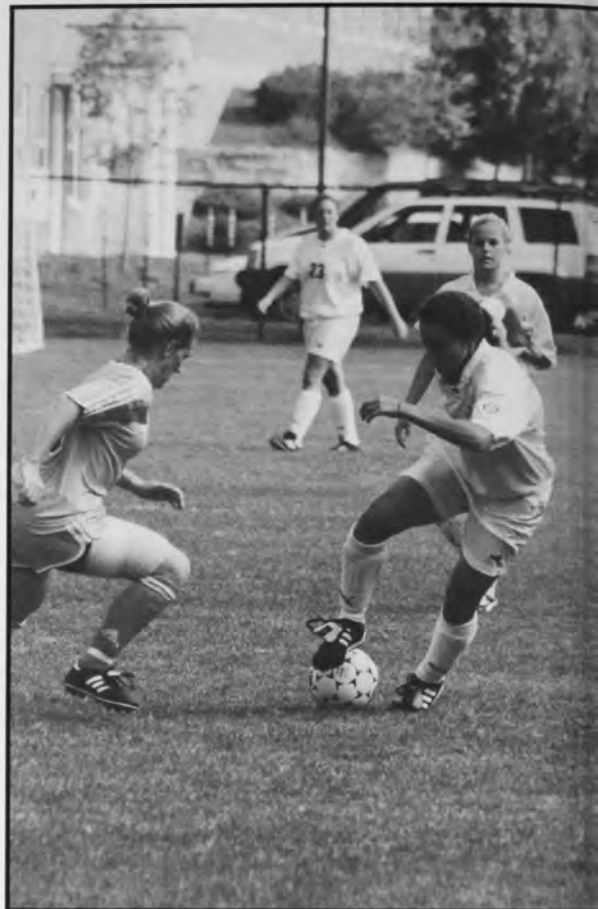




WOMEN'S SOCCER

The women's soccer team entered the final week of the season in the thick of the Northeast-10 Conference playoff hunt. Unfortunately, the Penmen closed out the year with four-straight losses and were denied a first-ever appearance in the Northeast-10 Conference Tournament. SNHU closed out the year with a 6-10-1 overall record and a 4-9-1 league record. A closer look at the results shows that six of the team's losses were by two goals or less, including a 2-1 OT loss to NCAA Tournament participant

Saint Rose and a 3-2 setback to NCAA Tournament quarterfinalist Adelphi. Junior midfielder Erica Flynn led the team in scoring for the second-straight year, as she totaled six goals and 16 points. Additional offense came from sophomores Lindsay Parks (6 goals, 14 points) and Liz Wheeler (3 goals, seven assists). Parks, Wheeler and junior midfielder Nicole Bradley all collected third-team Northeast-10 Conference all-star honors.

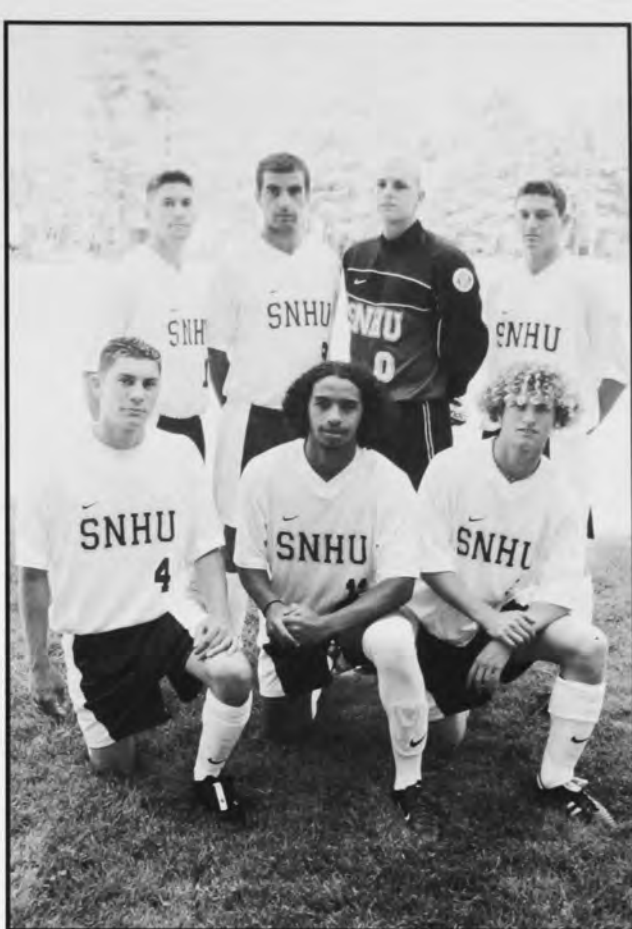

MEN'S SOCCER

The success of the men's soccer team was the highlight of the 2002 fall sports season, as the Penmen claimed the Northeast-10 Conference Tournament championship for the second time in the past three years and advanced all the way to the national championship game of the NCAA Division II Tournament. The team finished with an impressive 20-3-2 record, marking the first time since the 1992 season the program has posted 20 wins in a season. After claiming the NE-10 Tournament title with a 1-0 OT win over UMass Lowell, the Penmen defeated archrival Southern Connecticut State in the New England region championship game of the NCAA Tournament, and then knocked off East Stroudsburg in the national quarterfinals.

A 2-1 win over Mercyhurst in the national semifinals earned SNHU its first appearance in the national championship game since 1989. A second national title was not to be though, as the team suffered a heart-breaking 4-3 loss to Sonoma State of California. Forward Mounir Tajjou led the team and ranked third among all Division II players in goals (24) and points (59). His efforts earned him first-team All-America honors. Senior forward Cassio Ribeiro and junior midfielder Anthony Augustine collected All-New England honors, while freshman goalkeeper Adam Spinelli was named the Northeast-10 Freshman of the Year. Head coach Tom Poitras was named the New England Division II Coach of the Year.

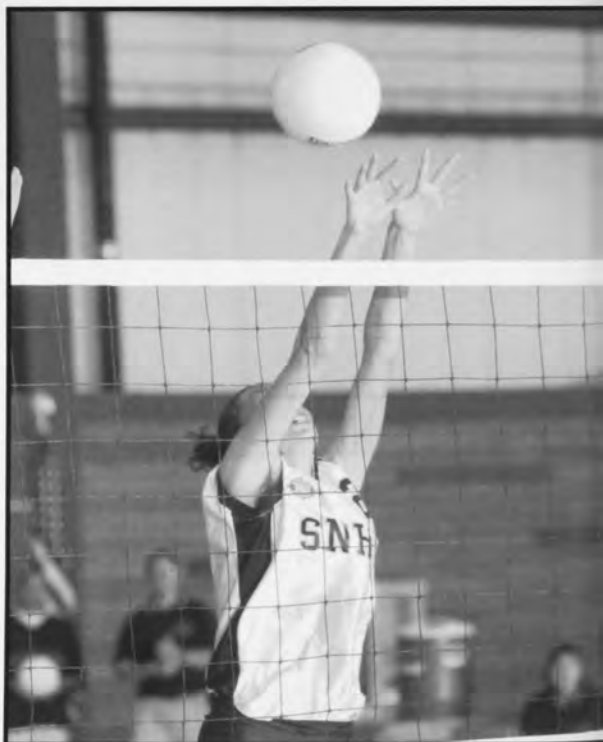
VOLLEYBALL

The women's volleyball team won seven of its final 10 matches and closed out the year with an 11-11 overall record and a 5-9 mark in the Northeast-10 Conference. It marked the first time since the 1986 season that the volleyball team has a final record of .500 or better.

The team was contending for a berth in the NE-10 playoffs up until the final week of the season, but back-to-back losses to American International College and Saint Anselm College denied the Penmen their first-ever NE-10 Tournament berth. Highlights of the season included two wins over cross-state rival Franklin Pierce College and a 3-2 win over NE-10 Tournament participant Le Moyne College.

Freshman Brittany Porter was named to the NE-10 honor roll five times during the year and became the first player in program history to record 300 kills and 100 blocks in the same season. She closed out the year ranked fifth in kills and third in blocks among the NE-10 leaders. Fellow rookie Kristin Cowles led the team in assists, while sophomores Lauren Enny and Lise Laczek led the team in service aces (70) and digs (322) respectively.

Continued improvement can be expected for next year, as the team's 12-player roster contained no seniors.

GOLF

After winning the league tournament title in the program's second year of existence in 2001, the golf team repeated the feat in 2002 in record-setting fashion.

Led by senior Chris Rivard, SNHU fired a two-day total of 578, which shattered the previous tournament-record of 603 set by the Penmen last year and Bryant College in 1998. Rivard fired a five-under par 66 in second-day action and finished with a two-day total of 138 to earn low medalist and Northeast-10 *Player of the Year* honors. His 66 tied the tournament record for lowest one-day total and he finished one-stroke off the tournament two-day record of 137 set by teammate Matt Arvanitis in 2001. Arvanitis shot a one-under-par 70 in second-day action and tied for third overall with a two-day total of 143. He collected first-team all-league honors. Freshman Jeff Sullivan was named the league's *Freshman of the Year* after finishing tied for sixth with a two-day total of 147.

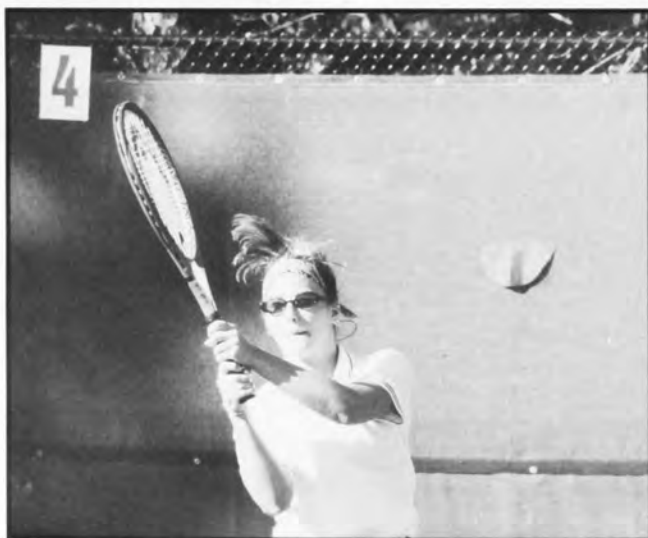


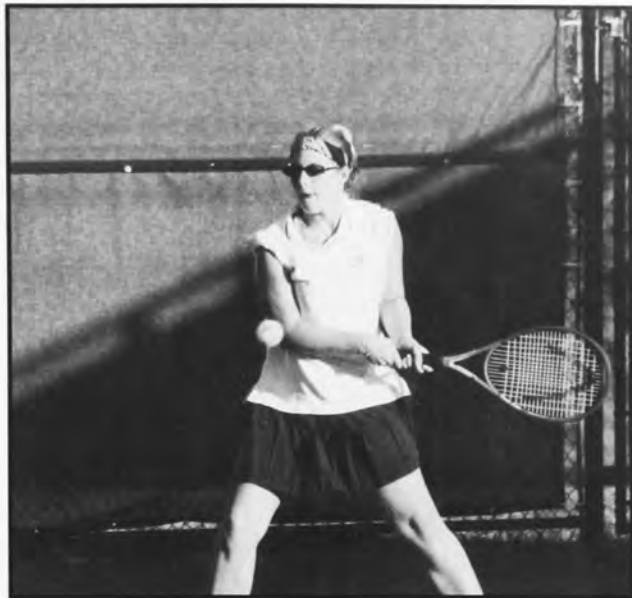

Women's Tennis

The women's tennis program, which was reinstated as a varsity sport just two seasons ago, continued to experience some growing pains and closed out the year with a record of 1-11. Senior captain Jessica Labrecque and junior Julie Hautanen provided the leadership on a team that featured four freshmen and two sophomores. Labrecque played No.1 singles in all 12 matches and recorded a 6-1, 6-0 victory during SNHU's 7-0 victory over American International.

Freshman Ashlee Melsky turned in a solid rookie season at No. 2 singles, while sophomore Julie Gordon posted an overall record of 2-8 while playing No. 3 and No. 5 singles during the year. Hautanen registered wins in her two singles matches during the year, while late addition Tara Beaulac recorded a win at No. 6 singles in a season-ending loss to Pace University.

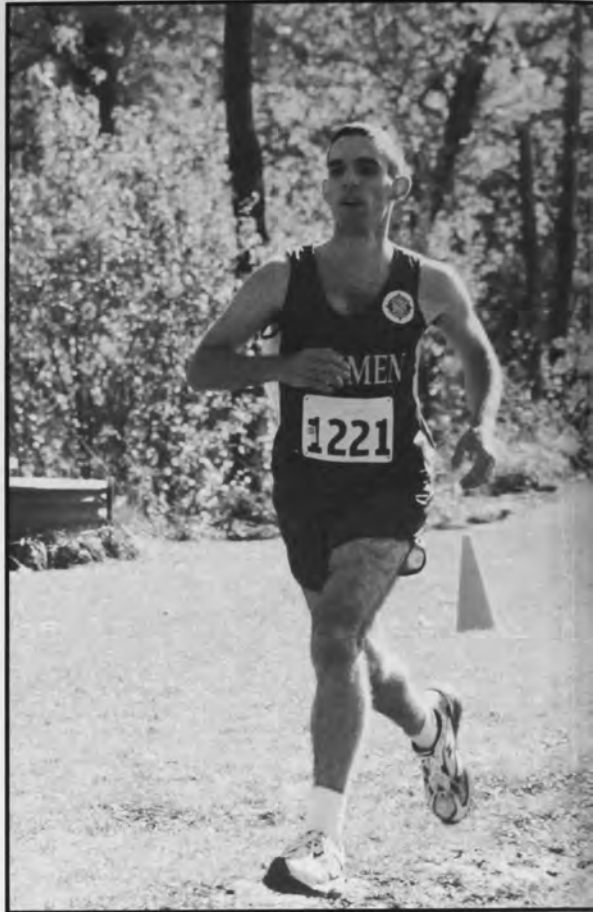

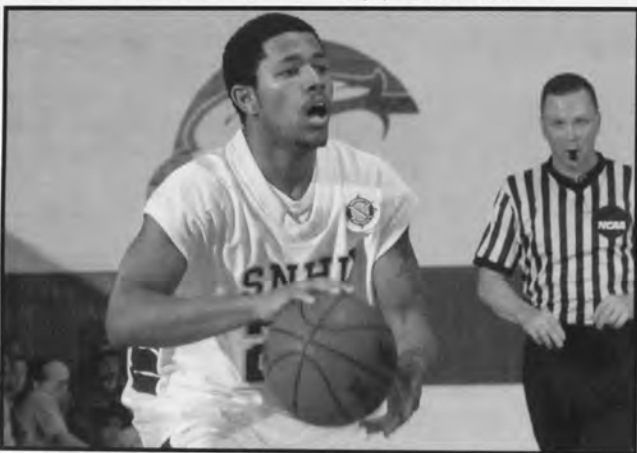

Men's Basketball

The men's basketball team won its first seven games and closed out the year with a 22-8 record. The 22 wins were the most in one season since 1996-97 and the team advanced to the NCAA Division II Tournament for the first time since the 1998-99 season. A 76-71 loss to New Haven in the opening round of the NCAA Tournament brought the season to an end. The Penmen placed second in the Northeast-10 Conference, and advanced to the championship game of the NE-10 Tournament. The program's first NE-10 Tournament championship was not to be though, as top-seeded UMass Lowell handed SNHU a 77-66 loss in the title game. Additional highlights of the year included a 92-81 win over rival Saint Anselm College, buzzer-beating wins over rival Franklin Pierce College,

Saint Michael's College, Bentley College and Bryant College and two regular-season wins over NCAA Regional champion UMass Lowell.

Seniors Brian Larrabee and Sotirios Karapostolou led the way all season. Karapostolou averaged 20.1 points per game, set a school-record for three-pointers in a season (113) and became the first player in program history to be named first-team All-America. Larrabee collected Northeast-10 Conference all-star honors for the second-straight year and became the first SNHU student-athlete to be named first-team Academic All-America. Juniors Mark Yeaton and Athanasios Souflis and freshmen John Baiano, Miguel Gonzalez and P.J. Young all enjoyed solid seasons.

Hockey

The hockey team posted a 5-1-2 record over its final eight games and closed out the year with an overall record of 12-11-3—marking the sixth-straight year the team has finished with a winning record. The Penmen advanced to the ECAC Division II Tournament for the fourth-straight year. SNHU advanced to the tournament semifinals following a 7-2 win over Franklin Pierce, but suffered a 3-1 loss to Saint Anselm College in the tournament semifinals.

Highlights of the season included a 1-1 OT tie with rival Saint Anselm in the opening round of the PAL Cup, a 4-2 win over host UMass Boston in the opening round of the Codfish Bowl and a 4-4 OT tie with ECAC Northeast champion Wentworth Institute of Technology.

Freshman James Crank led the team in scoring (19 gls, 19 asts) and was named the ECAC Division II Rookie of the Year. He was also named to the ECAC Division II all-star team, along with junior defenseman Dan Brown and freshman goaltender Rory Parnell. Freshman Chris White ranked second on the team in scoring (29 pts), while junior Michael Flynn totaled 28 points. The team's 27-player roster featured only one senior, Vin Forgione. Parnell, along with fellow freshmen Tim Fewster and Martin Stehl shared the goaltending duties and posted a combined goals against average of 3.35.

Women's Basketball

The women's basketball team owned a 7-11 record late in the season, but a season-ending eight-game losing streak denied the team its first-ever Northeast-10 Conference Tournament bid. The team opened the year with non-league wins over Green Mountain College and Felician College during the SNHU Ramada Inn Shootout. Additional highlights of the season included a 59-57 win over rival Franklin Pierce and NE-10 Conference wins over Saint Rose and Pace. Freshmen Chrisondria Griffith and Glhansy Bonhomme came on strong towards the end of the year and will provide head coach Dennis Masi with a solid foundation to build around over the next three years.

Griffith scored in double figures in seven of her final 13 games and closed out the year ranked among the NE-10 leaders in rebounding (7.5 rpg). Bonhomme ranked third on the team in scoring and second in rebounding. Junior Sara Scott closed out the year as the team's leading scorer (8.4 ppg). Junior Ana Lavilla made a successful return to the court after missing her sophomore year with a knee injury and led the team in assists and steals. Junior Colleen Quinn led the team in three-point field goals for the second-straight year.

Softball

The softball team recorded its most successful season in years and narrowly missed qualifying for the six-team Northeast-10 Conference. The Penmen opened the year by winning five of seven games during their one-week stay in Florida, and capped the year by winning nine of their final 12 games. SNHU finished with a 17-18 overall record and a 12-16 mark in the NE-10. The 17 wins were the most in one season since the 1986 team posted an 18-16 record. Highlights of the season included a 5-4 win over perennial power Merrimack (SNHU's first win over Merrimack since the 1986 season), a doubleheader sweep of cross-state rival Franklin Pierce, a doubleheader sweep of Assumption and a season-ending double-header sweep of cross-town rival Saint Anselm.

It marked the first sweep of Saint Anselm since the 1989 season. Senior Mel Keeler led the team at the plate and on the mound. She started 23 games on the mound and established new school-records for wins (15), earned run average (0.86), strikeouts (135) and shutouts (7) in a season. She recorded her first career no-hitter during a 6-0 win over Stonehill and also led the team in batting average (.301), hits (34) and RBI (15). Senior Lacy Veilleux closed out her career ranked seventh in career hits (85), while classmate Trisha Robinson finishes 10th in career hits with 83.

Keeler and Veilleux both collected third-team Northeast-10 all-star honors, marking the first time since the 1995 season that a SNHU softball player has collected all-conference honors.

Baseball

The baseball team won seven of its final 15 games and closed out the year with an 11-25 record. Additional wins were within reach during the year, as 16 of the team's 36 games were decided by three runs or less—but the Penmen were just 6-11 in those games. All Northeast-10 Conference games were played with wood bats, making it the only conference nationwide to mandate the use of wooden bats. Highlights of the year included an 8-6 win over NCAA Northeast Region champion Franklin Pierce, a 4-3 win over Northeast-10 tournament participant Stonehill and a doubleheader sweep of crosstown rival, and ECAC Division II champion, Saint Anselm.

Senior pitcher Eric Harvey turned in a solid season, as he led the team in earned run average (3.79) and strikeouts (50), and posted a 3-5 record. The team MVP, he recorded his 100th career strikeout during the season and closed out his career ranked second in career strikeouts with 123. Junior Jason Paul also recorded his 100th career strikeout during the year, while newcomer Ron Demers posted a 3-4 record and a 4.35 ERA. Sophomores Ray Powers, Chris Hart and Mike Bernard paced the offense. Powers led the team in batting average (.309) and RBI (24) and recorded a team-record 14 doubles. Hart and Bernard both batted .298 and tied for the team-lead in hits (39).

Lacrosse

The lacrosse team managed to win just one of its first eight games, but closed out the year with a four-game winning streak and a 5-7 record. Six of the team's first seven opponents were ranked in the Top-10 nationally at one point during the year. Scheduling conflicts forced the team to play the first-ever day/night "doubleheader" in program history on April 22 at Penmen Field. The team responded to the challenge by posting a 13-7 win over Franklin Pierce in the afternoon and a come-from-behind 10-9 OT win over Assumption that night. A 14-7 win over Merrimack, the Penmen's first win over the Warriors since the 1995 season, and an 18-9 win over American International capped off the season.

Senior Kyle Hintlian led the team in scoring with 48 points and recorded his 100th career goal during the win over Merrimack. He totaled 107 goals and 157 points over his three-year career. Additional offense came from sophomores Brian Flaherty (37 pts) and Dan Bierbower (24 pts). Sophomore Davis Shields and newcomer Bryan Romanow shared the goaltending duties all season. Romanow collected NEILA All-New England honors, while freshman defender Mike Hutnick was a honorable mention All-New England pick.

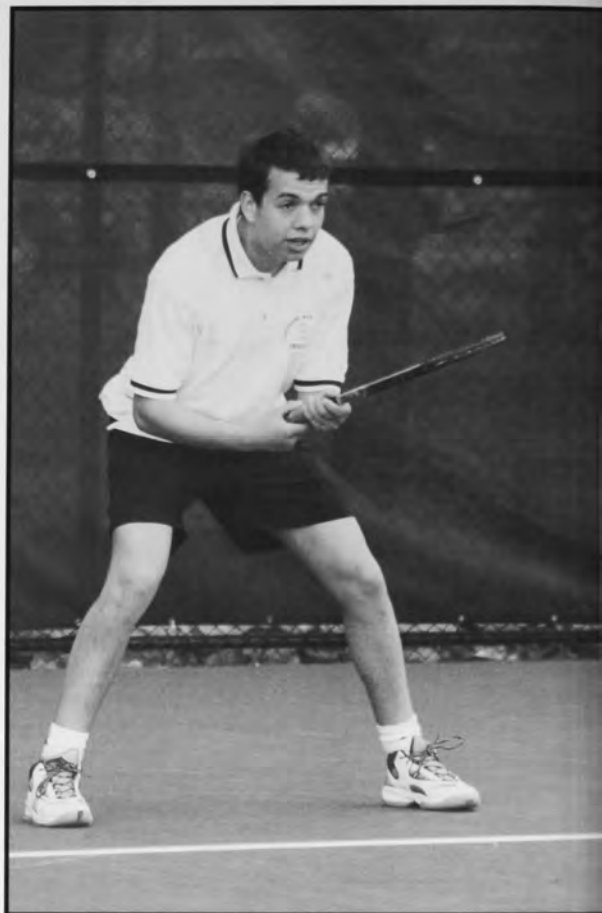
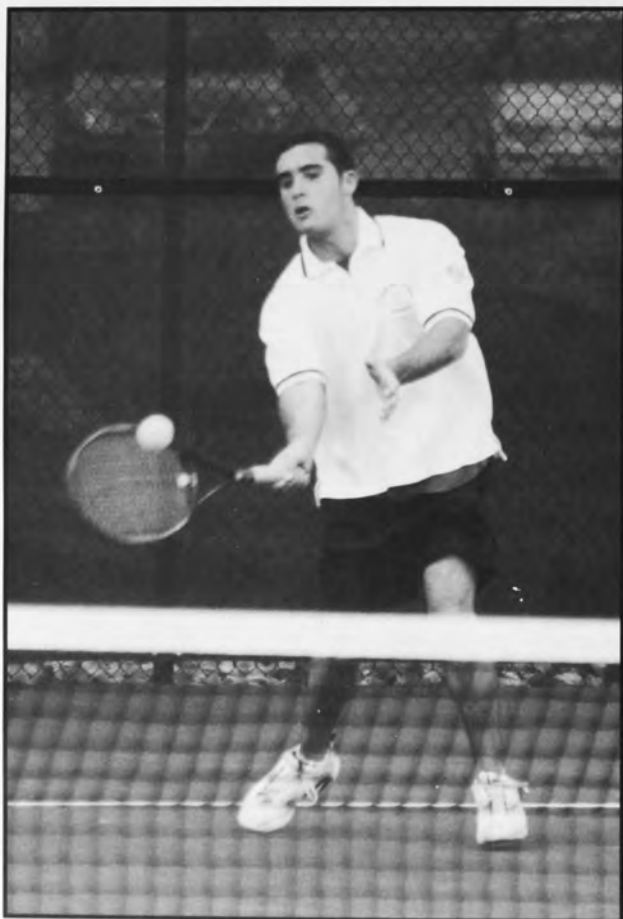
