## SKI TEAM STANDINGS

The New Hampshire College Ski Team took THIRD place in the slalom at Middlebury College in Vermont on February 3 and 4. Bettered only by Dartmouth in top place and New England College in number 2 position, New Hampshire College led the rest of the field--Middlebury, Nasson, Hawthorne, Franklin Pierce, University of Maine--Portland-Gorham. Ski Team Coach Al Schettig says, "A win like this is a big morale builder for our ski team -- beating schools that are scholarship subsidized and provided with facilities conducive to a good racing program, which includes full-time race coaching."

The NHC Ski Team traveled to Pat's Peak in Henniker this past weekend, placing in the top five in spite of icy slopes and generally bad conditions. This was a N.E.I.S.C. meet sponsored by New England College.

Upcoming is a New Hampshire College sponsored event on February 24 and 25, when we host the N.E.I.S.C. Northern Division at Crotched Mountain. In Coach Schettig's words, 'We welcome the attendance of all of you who are interested in your progressing NHC Ski Team. They need your full support."
