

coffee mug and Smarties candies. The study packs were designed to help the winners prepare and get organized for the new academic year.



Number of Students Utilizing Learning Center Services Continues to Grow



As the start of a new academic year is under way, it is clear that Southern New Hampshire University students and faculty are utilizing the services offered by The Learning Center now more than ever.



Looking at the usage data from the last academic year, in the Spring 2013 semester there were 700 more walk-in tutoring visits than the previous year. The number of students seeking assistance from tutors and mentors at The Learning Center, and the number of visits have been steadily increasing over the past 3 Spring semesters.

The pie chart above breaks down the usage of Learning Center services by discipline. We would like to highlight the fact that the special programs and liberal arts tutoring usage are increasing significantly, due to the development of initiatives like the Grade Renewal Kick start, NCAA Eligibility Program, and Re-take with Success programs, that are geared toward fitting the specific needs of a particular student group. The Learning Center predicts that the number of students using new programs will continue to increase for this year as a new program, Commit to Success, has been added to our services.

This year, in the month of September alone, The Learning Center has seen a significant increase in students coming to walk in visits compared to September 2012. Additionally, more professors are submitting requests for classroom assistants for English, Math and Business courses. Writing tutoring coordinator Selina Souza says that she has already had 19 requests for Classroom assistants for English courses compared to 4 at this time last year. She also notes that throughout the month of September, there have been 89 writing walk-in visits, a 48% increase from this time last year.

As always, we are excited to have the opportunity to help even more SNHU students with their academics and helping them to reach their academic goals this year.

Marek was of immeasurable help to Lori DeConinck in beginning the academic year with a key position vacant and took on the tasks of filling IT classroom assistant positions, assisting with tutor training, and keeping the 'Business ship' running smoothly. At this year's National College Learning Center Association (NCLCA) annual conference, SNHU's Learning Center staff Selina Souza, and Kathy Willis were selected to present a poster regarding new

poster regarding new Learning Center initiatives. The session was titled "Optimizing Success of Underserved Populations". Their research showcased two new Learning Center programs that have seen a significant representation in student

populations that had not previously utilized The Learning Center.

Stay organized, stress less with these 5 time management tips!

Whether you are a full time undergraduate student, a grad student with a full time job, or an adult learner, staying organized and managing time will help you to stress less. These five time management tips will help you to maximize your productivity and efficiency.

- 1. Utilize the 15 minute period in between classes. Try checking your e-mail, and responding to one or two during each break. This way, later when you check your e-mail, you won't open an inbox with 10 unread messages and feel overwhelmed.
- 2. Invest in a planner you can carry with you everywhere. Block out time for classes, work, club meetings, homework time and other weekly commitments. You'll have a better sense of what is on your to-do list and can let other people (classmates working on a group project, for example) know your availability.
- 3. A the beginning of the semester write down all of your assignment due dates from syllabi on a month view calendar. That way, you're less likely to forget about that 10 page research paper that is due the last week in October. Being aware of assignments will help you to create a timeline for completion, and you may find that you are finishing assignments before they are due. At the very least, you'll avoid pulling an all-nighter the night before the due date, because you remembered the assignment much earlier.
- 4. When studying, even for an hour or two, turn your cell phone off, or turn it over so you can't see the screen light up for a text message or call. If you are constantly looking at your phone every 5 minutes when it lights up with a text, it is harder to concentrate on assignments, and you'll end up spending more time in the library texting than working.

5. Take notes when you read for class. When it becomes time to review for the test, you may find that a large portion of the study guide material is already in your notes, and you will be more prepared for each class period. You can use your notes to more actively participate in class discussions, and boost your effort or participation grade.
