
Up Close and Personal with Third Eye Blind's Brad Hargreaves


Saturday 4-5-08 12:30 AM



Art Meets Technology

Beginning on April 18 through May 22, 2008 the McIninch Art Gallery will be hosting "Typography 2," a curated exhibit of visual works by SNHU students and faculty in the Graphic Design Program. An opening reception will be held on April 25 from 7 to 8 p.m.

"The intent of the exhibit is to let the public see what's going on in the graphic design and digital media programs and see the results of the academic work of the students," said Graphic Design coordinator and Professor, Harry Umen. "With 60 graphic design majors, 16 digital media majors, and about 30 minors in graphic design, we've had nearly 100 students working on graphic design projects throughout the year."

Works in the exhibit will include samples of magazine layouts, logos, photography, illustrations, posters, brochures, websites, and typography.

"Typography is a component of design that's arranged in the composition to complement everything in the piece, including color and imagery," explained Umen.

Short animations and videos will also be shown from students in the After Effects Animation (COM-345) class on a 30" Apple cinema screen with sensor sound.

Among the 80 diverse pieces of art shown in the gallery is that of seniors Justin Martin, Alison Sica, and Courtney Tosches.

The best thing with graphic design is that it opens up so many doors to different types of art including animation, print, and web design, and that each of them have endless possibilities," said Tosches

"This year, the graphic design program has had the most talented group of students," said Tosches. "I'm really impressed with what some of my peers have done." Umen is also excited about the variety of pieces and the talent of his students.

"Graphic design and digital media artists are visual communicators. They use their creativity to make compelling messages that are used to brand products and ideas," said Umen.

Some of the most unique pieces are typography works done by senior Justin Martin. Martin's typography pieces were printed on large sheets of brushed aluminum- a unique form of display and print expression.

Students and faculty interested in seeing the compelling messages and creative works of art made by this year's graphic design and digital media students can stop by the McIninch Art Gallery. The exhibition lasts from April 18-May 22, and the opening reception will be held on April 25 from 7-8pm. Gallery hours are Monday-Saturday from 10am-3pm and Thursday evenings from 5-8pm. Mayor throws transit under the bus! Hidden cost of Mayor Guinta's transit service cuts exceeds \$750K

Without the Manchester Transit Authority's bus service, Cecile LaPerre would have to stay home.

The elderly woman who walks with a cane takes the bus from her Amory Street home to downtown Manchester almost daily to visit people, she said.

"Without the bus I would have to stay home; nobody else comes to give us a ride," LaPerre said outside City Hall this week. "We need the bus. Every day."

"I hope the bus fare doesn't go up," she added.

If Mayor Frank Guinta's proposal to cut the transit authority's current budget by \$276,000 goes through, not only could standard bus fares go up from \$1 to \$1.50, but Saturday bus service and five of 13 bus routes could be severely cut or canceled, according to a plan put together by David Smith, executive director of the authority

"Mayor Guinta has proposed a significant reduction of local support for transit," Smith said in a memo to transit authority commissioners. "It will require we consider all options for budget reduction, including line item expense reductions, increase in rate of fare, personnel layoffs and service cuts."

Because of increased fuel and health care expenses, the authority asked city hall for \$1.28 million to keep service levels the same next year, he said. The mayor's proposal of \$900,000 for the authority is \$378,000 less than requested.

What isn't apparent from those numbers, however, is the matching dollars that Manchester receives from the Federal Transit Administration because of the Surface Transportation Act of 1982. In cities like Manchester, with populations less than 200,000, there is a 50:50 federal-city match for most transit authority expenses, but a 80:20 federal-city match for vehicle maintenance and services required as part of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990.

Because of the mayor's proposal, the authority will actually come up \$756,000 short of its \$4.36 million budget next year.

"I understand the concern that some have about this issue," Guinta said in a statement prepared by his spokesman, Mark Laliberte. "This was a difficult decision to make and I am hoping the transit authority will find efficiencies that do not adversely affect ridership."

The transit authority,s final budget allocation from the city will be determined by the full Board of Mayor and Aldermen, which is weighing the mayor's \$276.2 million city budget proposal and all

the cuts that it requires against a property tax hike for residents. The school department, for instance, is facing a \$140 million allocation under the mayor's proposal, \$13.1 million less than requested.

"We'll hear from the people first," said Mike Lopez, chairman of the board, about the transit authority budget. "I don't have an opinion right now. I have to wait for the [authority] to come and present the true facts. I don't have those facts yet."

In a meeting on Tuesday, April 15, transit authority commissioners supported transit authority director Smith's plan to make the mayor's budget allocation work, but said they would lobby the public to build support against budget cuts.

"Public transportation in Manchester has never been valued, and it should be, it has to be," Commissioner Maureen Nagle said at the meeting. "We talk about Manchester becoming a world-class city. What about the public transportation?" Nagle asserted that the mayor's transit budget cuts would make the city's

In Smith's plan, the transit chief saves about \$14,000 in expense reductions, such as a \$4,675 insurance cost to cover liability for garage keepers. What the cut means is the transit authority would no longer maintain and inspect 34 city vehicles.

problems worse.

Other expenses include a \$75 subscription to a weekly trade magazine published by the American Public Transit Association and \$750 for employee flu shots.

Secondly, the authority would raise its \$1 base fare to \$1.50, its reduced fare for elderly and disabled riders from 50 cents to 75 cents and its other fares as well. The changes could increase fare revenue by \$89,449, but reduce ridership by about 61,573 trips, Smith estimates. But the revenue increase is based on current service levels, Smith said.

The ridership reduction would be a trend reversal, according to a transit ridership report from Mike Whitten, operations planning manager for the authority. From July 1, 2006 to March 30, 2007, there were 313,510 trips on Manchester Transit Authority buses. The number increased 9.35 percent to 342,835 trips for the period between July 1, 2007 and March 30, 2008, the report shows.

Finally, the authority would need to eliminate 15,294 of its 52,830 service hours, about 29 percent of a service that Smith called "basic or below basic" for a city the size of Manchester.

Saturday service would account for 5,096 of the hours, he said. The rest could be achieved by eliminating the Bridge/Dartmouth, River Road/SNHU, Prospect Street/VA Hospital, DW Highway/Northside and Front Street/Hackett Hill routes, which have fewer passengers than the other eight, he said.

A closer study of the routes could give the authority's commissioners reason to cut some service times on all the routes rather than cut whole routes, he said.

"For instance, while only 7 percent of total ridership, the Route 3 Airport has two very heavy trips in the morning and two heavy trips in the afternoon consistent with shift schedules at businesses along Perimeter and Harvey Roads and the airport," Smith said in his memo. "The Route 11 Front Street/Hackett Hill [route] has few employment or shopping generators, but serves several dense neighborhoods of high density housing providing the passengers for those work trips." He said cuts could be made to bus trips on routes during times that fewer people ride.

Consistent with the service-hour cuts, Smith said about eight bus drivers would be laid off under the plan. The authority's commissioners decided to engage the busriding public by informing them on buses about the pending cuts

"The working man, woman, student and handicapped person is going to suffer," said Peter Escalera, vice chairman of the commission. "None of the aldermen are going to do anything until they hear from the people."

D.J. Murphy of Manchester said he rides the bus to work every day and to shopping centers around the city. "One of the reasons I use the bus is because of the cost of fuel," Murphy said. "Any time I can stay out of a car, I ride the bus."

"This is the largest city in the three northern New England states and it should have a mass transit system for the public use," he added. "It has to have a mass transit system to show that it's a vibrant living city."

Jay Minkarah, the city's economic development director, said a mass transit system is imperative for people who are dependent on public transport, but also for the city to build its local economy.

"It's important for individual citizens who rely on transit and the employers that rely on the employees and the businesses that rely on patrons," Minkarah said. "It's important for people who do have cars as a backup, because cars break down."

Interruption in Travel

In recent weeks, there has been a substantial amount of turmoil in the airline industry. When a few whistleblowers came forward and announced that the FAA ignored safety violations for Southwest Airlines, the federal government flexed its strong arm and forced airlines to ground many of their airplanes.

American Airlines was one of the airlines hit the hardest, by canceling over 1,000 scheduled flights and affecting almost 300,000 traveling passengers. The FAA insisted that the wiring in the wheel wells of certain planes was "unsafe". A couple of years ago, the FAA required airlines to tie these wires together in 1" intervals. The airlines did complete the orders, but in some cases, they were tied at ³/₄" or 1 ¹/₄" intervals, not the specified 1" intervals that the FAA specified.

Did this infraction warrant the severe repercussions that the airlines faced? Many industry specialists do not think so. Rather, this was an effort by the FAA to illustrate their commitment to safety after the Southwest Airlines embarrassment, indicating that the FAA could have carried out these inspections and fixed the wiring infractions in a timely matter – and not interrupt the travel plans of so many travelers. However,

it's unlikely that a convenient solution by the FAA would have made front-page news.

If the inspections by the FAA didn't interrupt your travel, perhaps many of the airlines that are filing for bankruptcy did. Within three weeks, Frontier Airlines, Skybus, ATA, and Aloha have filed for bankruptcy, stranding many passengers in the middle of their trip or having to buy new tickets on another airline (that hopefully won't go outof-business). In fact, this story hits home to several SNHU culinary students who were stranded in Ohio with tickets to fly back to Portsmouth on an airline that went out-of-business overnight.

Bear Stearns Downfall from the Subprime Mortgage Crisis

Bear Stearns shares slumped over Friday, March 14, to lose 47% of their value ending at \$30. Wall Street reeled as the stock plummeted 88% on the following Monday to \$3.72 per share on news that the liquidity of

the company was failing. The two days of drops are the largest the company has seen in two decades. The closing prices were a hug drop from the stock value a year ago of about \$150 per share.

The Fed intervened along with J.P. Morgan to assist the company before it when bankrupt. J.P. Morgan, a clearing agent for Bear Stearns, was

Visa's \$18 Billion Dollar IPO Gains 28% in First Day

The Initial Public Offering (IPO) of Visa, listed under stock symbol "V" on the New York Stock Exchange, was a success as the stock closed the first day of trading with a gain of 28% over the opening price. The gain topped off a triumphant IPO for Visa one of the biggest brand in credit cards, which priced the night March 18th for a record-breaking \$18 billion.

Joseph W. Saunders, the CEO of Visa, said during the IPO, "This is an exciting and historic day for Visa. It marks the culmination of a more than two-year process that led to our global reorganization and our becoming a public company."

Visa's 406 million shares sold about \$2 above the anticipated price of \$39 - \$41 per share. The shares within the first day closed at \$56.50, which is a gain of 28% above the original public offering price of \$44 per share. During the intraday trading, the shares spiked as high as \$69.

Saunders reaction to the day was, "This milestone could not have been achieved without the support of our employees and our client financial institutions. They see the potential in Visa Inc. as a public company. We believe Visa's new structure positions us to meet the changing needs of our merchant and financial institution clients around the world as we seek to enhance and grow the products and services we provide to our customers," stated Saunders in a press release.

Visa's IPO is the largest since the AT&T IPO in 2000 and is the second largest IPO in the world according to the International Herald Tribune. The IPO could become larger since Visa can exercise an option that could make the total be about \$19.7 Billion by selling another 40.6 million shares within 30 days.

The \$3.17 Billion for US banks raised from the Visa IPO will help its under writers, like J.P. Morgan, Chase & Co, and Citigroup, will help to replenish find lost by many of the banks already suffering from the subprime mortgage crisis.

"That is a good infusion of capital," said the founder of IPOScoop.com John E. Fitzgibbon Jr. according to The New York Times. "And it's no secret that Wall Street is capital starved right now."

Foreclosures in the U.S.

Amidst concern of a possible U.S. recession and financial troubles, U.S. home foreclosure rates have received a great deal of attention. While U.S. home foreclosures fell 4% from January to February of 2008, home foreclosures stood at 60% above the rates from the previous February.

A home foreclosure occurs when a borrower loses their rights to a mortgaged home because they cannot afford the payments on their mortgage. After notifying the borrower and allowing for some time to catch up on mortgage payments (these details vary by state), the lender may then sell the home at a public auction.

Speculation, historically low interest rates, and lax lending among other issues have fueled the recent housing bubble. While foreclosures have always been a part of the mortgage industry, two recent developments have driven the spike in current foreclosure rates.

First, many borrowers with variable rate mortgages are facing higher interest rates. These loans typically include a low initial interest rate for a period of time, followed by a rate that adjusts according to an index.

Second, real estate prices have been declining. In the past few years, borrowers have typically been able to unload any property in the hot real estate market. However, homeowners are now finding

Opinion: Portfolio Diversification

Diversification is an investment strategy or idea among many in the investment and finance arena which insists that holding a little of everything in a portfolio is a less risky practice than concentrating your investments in a select few securities (sound familiar from FIN or ECO?). Many think this is the only course of action; I happen to disagree. While some diversification certainly is necessary and useful, diversification simply for diversifications sake is foolish

The thought behind diversification is this; by spreading out a portfolio into many, non-related securities there will be some that move up while others go down, but on average the winners will more than compensate for the losers. In effect the portfolio will balance out and the investor will be rewarded with an average return. In the mind of someone behind this type of portfolio risk is diminished because of the sheer number of holdings.

There is another, and I believe better strategy which was pioneered by the late Phillip Fisher. Fisher who

authored "Common Stocks and Uncommon Profits" in 1958, believed in buying good companies, but more importantly ones he understood well. He limited his portfolio to a few well run companies; often three to four companies represented 75 percent of his portfolio. Some would

argue that this is like putting too many eggs in one basket. Fisher countered that argument by noting that buying a company without a thorough understanding of the business simply to diversify a portfolio may be more risky than having limited diversification.

Warren Buffett in his 1993 letter to shareholders echoed Fisher's beliefs wonderfully, "The strategy we've adopted precludes our fol-

lowing standard diversification dogma. Many pundits would therefore say the strategy must be riskier than that employed by more conventional investors. We disagree. We believe that a policy of portfolio concentration may well decrease risk if it raises, as it should, both the intensity with which an investor thinks about a business and the comfort-level he must feel with its economic characteristics before buying into it." Buffett once invested 40 percent of his partnership's portfolio in American Express stock and saw his investment triple

I have no doubt that my beliefs on portfolio diversification will be regarded as controversial and against the grain. I have solace in the fact that Buffett and Fisher have used a strategy of portfolio concentration to outperform their peers in the investment community for many decades. Their guiding principles have been largely forgotten and only their monstrous achievements remembered. And principles Buffett points out "do not change, that's why they call them principles". Happy compounding!

that they owe more than their house is worth, if in fact they are able to sell at all.

While the national statistics certainly warrant concern, many of the high foreclosure rates are concentrated in specific areas. Nevada, California, and Florida lead U.S. states in foreclosure rates. Additionally, foreclosures are often clustered in specific metropolitan areas within states.

Currently, the federal government is debating the possibility of some type of mortgage bailout for struggling homeowners. Critics of any mortgage bailout plan argue that assistance would lead to moral hazard and that market-based solutions will be necessary to end the situation.

As inconvenient as travel may have been with American Airlines over the weekend, the airline announced on its website that it will be reimbursing travelers for expenses related to their overnight stays. Unfortunately, this is not the case for the SNHU students, when an airline goes out-of-business, they won't have to pay back creditors or travelers until their assets have been liquidated through a bankruptcy court. And it's likely that prepaid flights will be at the bottom of a long list of debts.



aware of the type of assets held by the company to back its loans. Knowing what was backing the loans made it easier for J.P. Morgan to react and help Bear Stearns get emergency funding from the Fed.

Three days after the drop in stock price, J.P. Morgan made a takeover bid at \$2 per share for the ailing Bear Stearns investment firm. The stock price slumped to about \$3 as many investors complained the offer

was too low, because the company was worth more. According to Dallas News JP Morgan increased its offer to \$10 a share, following criticism that its initial bid was too low.

"Our liquidity position in the last 24 hours had significantly deteriorated," said Alan Schwartz, chief executive at Bear according to Market Watch. "We took this important step to restore confidence in us in the marketplace, strengthen our

Delta and Northwest Airlines Agree to Merge

On Monday April 14, the world's third largest airline, Atlanta Georgia based Delta Airlines, announced it will acquire the world's fifth largest airline, Northwest Airlines, for \$3.1 bil-

The merger will create the world's largest airline, surpassing the current largest airline in the world, American Airlines. The new airline will operate under the Delta name and be based out of Atlanta Georgia. Once the merger is complete, the new Delta Airlines will have over 75,000 employees, 800 airplanes, and expected annual revenue of \$35 billion. The company will be headed by the current Delta CEO Richard Anderson,

and current Delta president and CFO Edward Bastian. Anderson was formally the CEO of Northwest.

Not all parties were initially satisfied with the merger. According to Reuters, the current pilots of Northwest Airlines opposed the deal which will give current Delta pilots a 3.5 percent equity stake in the new airline. Also, according to Forbes.com, even though the merger has been agreed upon by both parties, the merger still needs to be reviewed and approved by anti-trust regulators from the US Department of Justice.

Many believe that this deal could pave the way for other mergers among airline carriers. According to CNNMoney.com senior writer Chris Isidore, there have been rumors that Continental Airlines, the fourth largest airline, and US airways, the seventh largest airline, are hoping for a merger of there own.

The airline industry as a whole has become known in recent years for its huge financial losses, and several bankruptcy filings. In the years between 2001 and 2005, the airline industry collectively lost over \$20 billion. Major US airlines, US Airways, United Airlines, Delta Airlines and Northwest Airlines, all filed for bankruptcy protection during those years. The poor financials are mostly due to the slow air traffic that occurred in the months following September 11 2001, and the soaring price of jet fuel in most recent years.

On Friday April 18, Delta Airlines stock closed 2.34 percent higher at \$8.75. Northwest Airlines stock closed 2.11 percent higher at \$9.69

Bear built a business focused on originating mortgages and repackaging them into mortgagebacked securities and collateralized debt obligations, reaping profits from the full spectrum of the real-estate financing process according to Market Watch.

"Bear did not get out of the way fast enough," as the subprime crisis became worse was stated Dick Bove, an analyst at Punk Ziegel & Co according to Market Watch.


Arsenic and Old Lace at SNHU







Buckner Ends His Curse, While the Nation Strikes Back

April 8, 2008 is a day that forever put to bed one of the worst errors in Red Sox history; Bill Buckner threw out the first pitch at Fenway Park.

Buckner will always be remembered for his error in Game 6 of the 1986 World Series against the New York Mets, when he let a soft ground ball through his legs, allowing the Mets to score and eventually come back to win the series. Buckner's error was always viewed as another chapter in what was known as "The Curse of the Bambino". On a cold opening day in April, that error was forgiven.

Buckner walked from left field, crying and smiling the whole way. He continued to the mound and threw a perfect strike, as the capacity crowd shook the Green Monster with applause.

"I had to forgive," said Buckner as his tears started again during a post-pitch press conference according to Redsox.com. "Not the fans, they've always been great to me," he said after pulling himself together. "I had to forgive the media — for what they put me, and especially my family, through ... I didn't feel I deserved it."

During the same week that one curse may has been put to rest for good; a rare member of Red Sox nation may have started a new curse. The jersey has since been dug up and removed by the Yankees.

When Ortiz was asked about this excavation project, he couldn't help but be disappointed that he was not going to be a part of the new stadium. "I'd better talk to my witches in there," Ortiz said according to MLB.com. "You know what, I'm going to have to call my people in New York and take care of it when everybody is sleeping. Cabrera (1 HR each). However, we have learned season after season that patience is crucial in baseball and there is a long season ahead. "Everyone needs to do a little soul-searching," said ace Justin Verlander according to Sports Illustrated.

The Yankees and Red Sox both started the season 5-5 heading into the first Yankees-Red Sox series at Fenway. The Red Sox took the series 2-1, but it was typical Yankees-Red Sox action as the excitement lasted through every game. The Yankees have started the season a little sluggish as usual, losing multiple games to Kansas City and Tampa Bay. However, Joe Girardi and the Bombers have nothing to worry about as the powerful offense is starting to come alive and Chien-Ming Wang has been the ace he needs to be while the rest of the rotation develops. He pitched a 2 hit, complete game shutout versus the Red Sox at Fenway.

On another front, a Red Sox fan construction worker at the new Yankee Stadium snuck an Ortiz jersey into the concrete foundation of the visitor's dugout to jinx the field. The Yankees denied it at first, but then learned of the location of the jersey and dug it up, at a large expense. The club is taking legal action against the worker.

Clay Buchholz has had a promising start for the Red Sox, but the offense started slow, and the main reason for that is the struggles of David Ortiz (see below). In their home opener, the Red Sox finally honored the infamous Bill Buckner in what was an emotional day for Buckner. Buckner was viciously harassed and ridiculed by the Boston media and fans after losing the 1986 World Series to the Mets, forcing him to move his family to Idaho.

The Toronto Blue Jays have started the season strong, sweeping the Red Sox and showcasing that starting rotation of theirs that has people giving them a shot at the division (R. Halladay, A.J. Burnett, S. Marcum, D. McGowan). The Orioles have also started hot, leading the division through Sunday, but unlike the Jays they will have a hard time sustaining that success. Elsewhere in baseball, a few teams have had hot starts, including Oakland, Kansas City, and Florida. The Diamondbacks are the hottest team in the National League thanks to solid starting pitching and a surprisingly potent offense. The theme so far this season is injuries, especially to closers (K-Rod, J.J. Putz). Pitchers have been hit the hardest, including Pedro Martinez, and a few superstars have just been banged up (Derek Jeter, Jose Reyes).

Early Season Leaders - Who's Hot

Mark Reynolds, 3B, ARI- Reynolds has surprised many by starting the season as the #1 hitter in baseball (5 HR, 15 RBI, 1 SB, .302 AVG), but with his poor plate discipline and strikeout rate, this streak hitter will have a hard time batting .270 (2007 AVG). 20-25 HR is realistic though.

Lance Berkman, 1B, HOU- Berkman is off to his usual campaign (4 HR, 9 RBI, 3 SB, .310 AVG) and barring injury should knock 35+ HR for the third straight season.

Hanley Ramírez, SS, FLA- His rare combination of speed and power has helped him hit 3 HR, with 8 RBI, 2 SB and a .409 AVG. The super talented Ramirez is already one of the greatest players in baseball and can only improve at age 25.

Chien-Ming Wang, SP, NYY- In 22 innings pitched, Wang has 3 wins, 11 K and a 1.23 ERA. In 3 starts he hasn't allowed more than 2 ER, and approached a no hitter at Fenway, ending with a complete game, 2 hit shutout. He's giving the Yankees exactly what they need.

Cole Hamels, SP, PHI- "Hollywood" Hamels has had a mighty impressive start (22 IP, 2 W, 15 K, 0.82 ERA). This highly prized prospect arrived in the Majors just two seasons ago, and is already considered one of the top 5 pitchers in baseball, and barring injuries should keep improving.


