
cated mentor and always goes above and beyond to help her fellow classmates succeed in college." Congratulations Lauren!


Learning Center Usage: Sept. 2009 vs. Sept. 2010


The Following charts represent a comparison of Learning Center usage in September 2009 and Learning Center usage in


September 2010. Walk-in tutoring, one-to-one tutoring, and peer mentoring were all tracked to determine where there were

Service Learning at

Southern New Hampshire University

As Business Tutoring Coordinator at Southern New Hampshire University, I coordinate academic support for the School of Business through a group of 15 to 20 student tutors employed by our Learning Center. I have seen numerous students over the years come through my door searching for help in accounting and finance. These subjects often provide students with a high level of difficulty. As I often teach these subjects as well, I see students struggle first hand with the concepts.

Often, students have a hard time seeing how the topics they learn in class are applicable to the real world. "Do people actually do these things" is a question I often hear! Therefore, I find myself searching for new ways to present the material to both students I tutor and students I teach. In order to retain the information and find its value, they have to make it relevant to their personal and work lives. I train my tutors with different methods to help themselves and the students they are tutoring.

I have discovered over the last year a method of teaching that I feel helps students learn the material and appreciate the importance of the subject matter. Over the last year I have become involved with service learning and have seen firsthand how it can impact a student's ability to apply what they have learned and gain a greater appreciation for their education. Service learning is a pedagogy that instructors can implement in their classrooms that helps students apply what they have learned in the classroom to their surrounding community. For example, I had a group of students in an accounting class that I taught assist a local nonprofit here in New Hampshire with their accounting and finance needs. The nonprofit was new and the treasurer of the organization did not have any background in accounting. Therefore, he was unsure as to how to enter in the accounting transactions. Keeping accounting records is extremely important for nonprofits so they can report on their financial results and condition. They need this information to share with other members of their organization and also for their annual report that must be filed with the state.

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The students helped the treasurer use QuickBooks and interpret their various accounts. They also worked with the organization on internal control and how best to protect the assets of the organization to prevent theft or error from occurring. During and after the experience, students reflect on what they have learned in writing. It is amazing to read what students write. Through this process they have indicated that they gain valuable practical real world experience while a local community organization benefits from the help the students provide. This not only fosters learning but also provides the community with much needed services. Just as a student you are tutoring may get that "aha!" moment, service learning provides that too and is able to reach a classroom of students. I have found that the discussions service learning brings to the classroom are rich and rewarding.

The contest will also feature questions from the "Are You Smarter Than a 5th Grader?" game show.


