JOHN KENNETH GALBRAITH is the Paul M. Warburg Professor of Economics Emeritus at Harvard University. He was President Kennedy's Ambassador to India and developed a wartime system of price controls for President Roosevelt, Professor Galbraith has received the American Medal of Freedom and the rank of "Commandeur" in the French Legion of Honor. One of the world's most renowned economists, his books have been instructive to generations of economics students. Co-author Menshikov served in the Secretariat of the United Nations for six years. Now he is on the editorial staff of the World Marxist Review, the journal of the international Communist movement. For several years, Menshikov has been interested in the comparisons between Western and Soviet economic systems. He has reported on the important social, political and economic issues of our times with incisive clarity. A former Presidential Assistant and newspaper publisher, he was the senior news analyst for "The CBS Evening News" and Executive Editor of PBS's "Bill Moyers' Journal". Now the head of his own public affairs company, Moyers is still contributing to the "continuing education of the American public."
