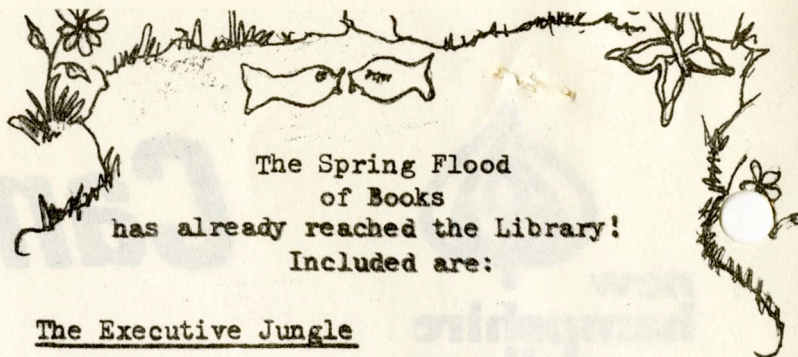

Attention dormitory residents--Winnisquam and Chocorus halls will close completely at noon Saturday, March 9 and will reopen Sat., afternoon, March 16.

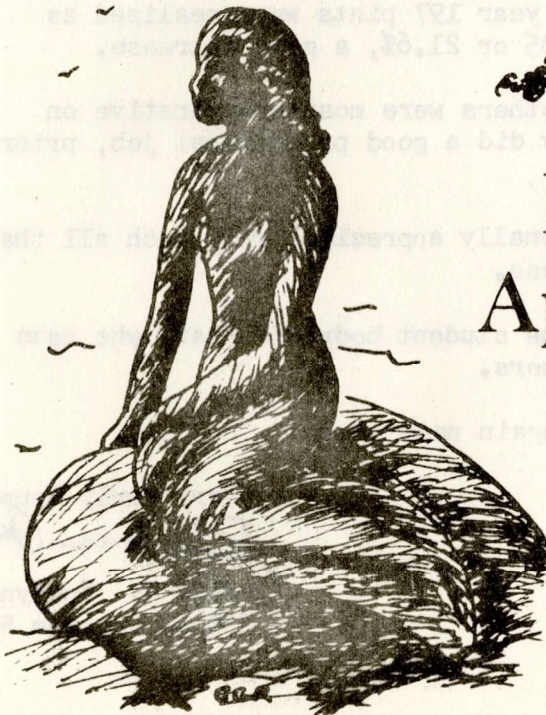
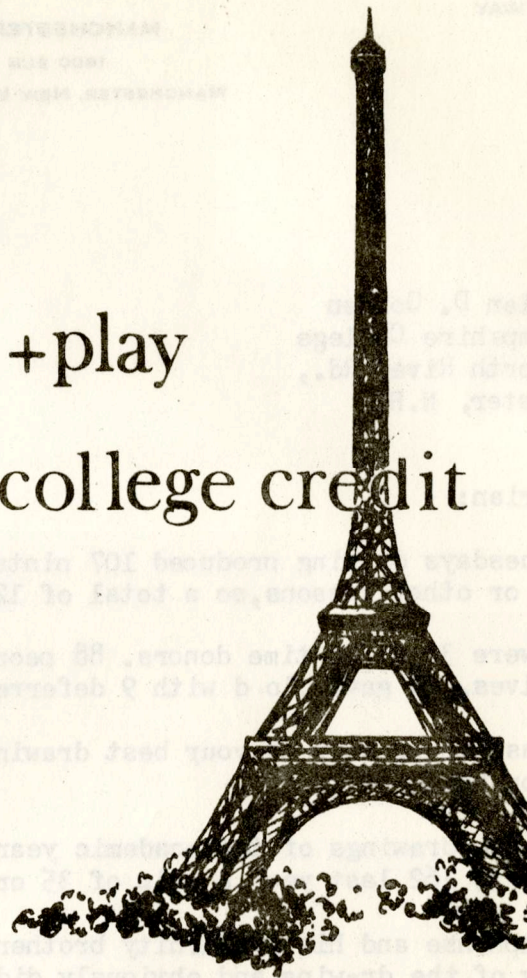
RESEARCH OPPORTUNITY

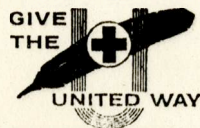

Dear Brian:

Last Tuesdays drawing produced 107 pints of blood with 13 deferred for health or other reasons, so a total of 120 prospective donors came.

There were 32 first time donors. 88 people from the college presented themselves. 79 gave blood with 9 deferred for health or other reasons.

This was second only to your best drawing, (since Jan. 1970) of 133 pints on March 1972.

In the two drawings of the academic year 197 pints were realized as opposed to 162 last year, a gain of 35 or 21.6%, a good increase.

Jack Alphonse and his fraternity brothers were most co-operative on the day of the drawing and obviously did a good promotional job, prior thereto.

Manchester Chapter and myself personally appreciate very much all that you and they did to assure its success.

Our thanks also to the members of the student body and staff who gave of themselves for the benefit of others.

I look forward to working with you again next year.
