JONATHAN MANN, M.D., M.PH. is professor of epidemiology and international health at the Harvard School of Public Health, and director of the International AIDS Center of the Harvard AIDS Institute. Formerly, Dr. Mann was the director of the World Health Organization's Global Program on AIDS, based in Geneva, Switzerland. Dr. Mann directed the Projet SIDA, a collaborative AIDS research projects involving the Centers for Disease Control, the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, the Institute of Tropical Medicine (Antwerp, Belgium) and the Ministry of Health, Republic of Zaire. Prior to working in Zaire, Dr. Mann was a state epidemiologist and assistant director of the health department in New Mexico.

Dr. Mann holds a B.A. from Harvard College, an M.D. from Washington University in St. Louis, and an M.PH. from the Harvard School of Public Health.

JEANNE BLAKE is medical reporter for WBZ-TV and author of Risky Times: How to be AIDS Smart and Stay Healthy, a guide for teenagers. Blake's coverage of the AIDS epidemic has twice earned her national recognition by the Associated Press. She was the recipient of the Governor's Recognition Award for "outstanding contributions to AIDS education in Massachusetts," and has been honored by The Massachusetts Teachers Association, the Massachusetts Human Rights Campaign, and the Massachusetts Chapter of Americans for Democratic Action. Blake was also the recipient of the Robert F. Kennedy Memorial Journalism Award for the documentary Living with AIDS: The Paul Cronan Story. Prior to coming to Boston, Blake covered the police beat for WAGA-TV, the CBS Atlanta affiliate where she covered the Child Murders case earning several awards for investigative reporting.
