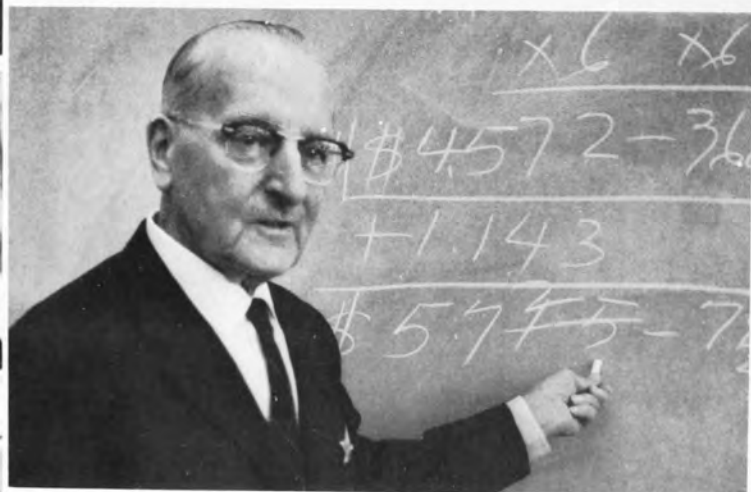


IN APPRECIATION

The further expansion of our building facilities to include 404 Chestnut Street and 99 Hanover Street was a direct result of the degree-granting program, which was initiated in 1963.

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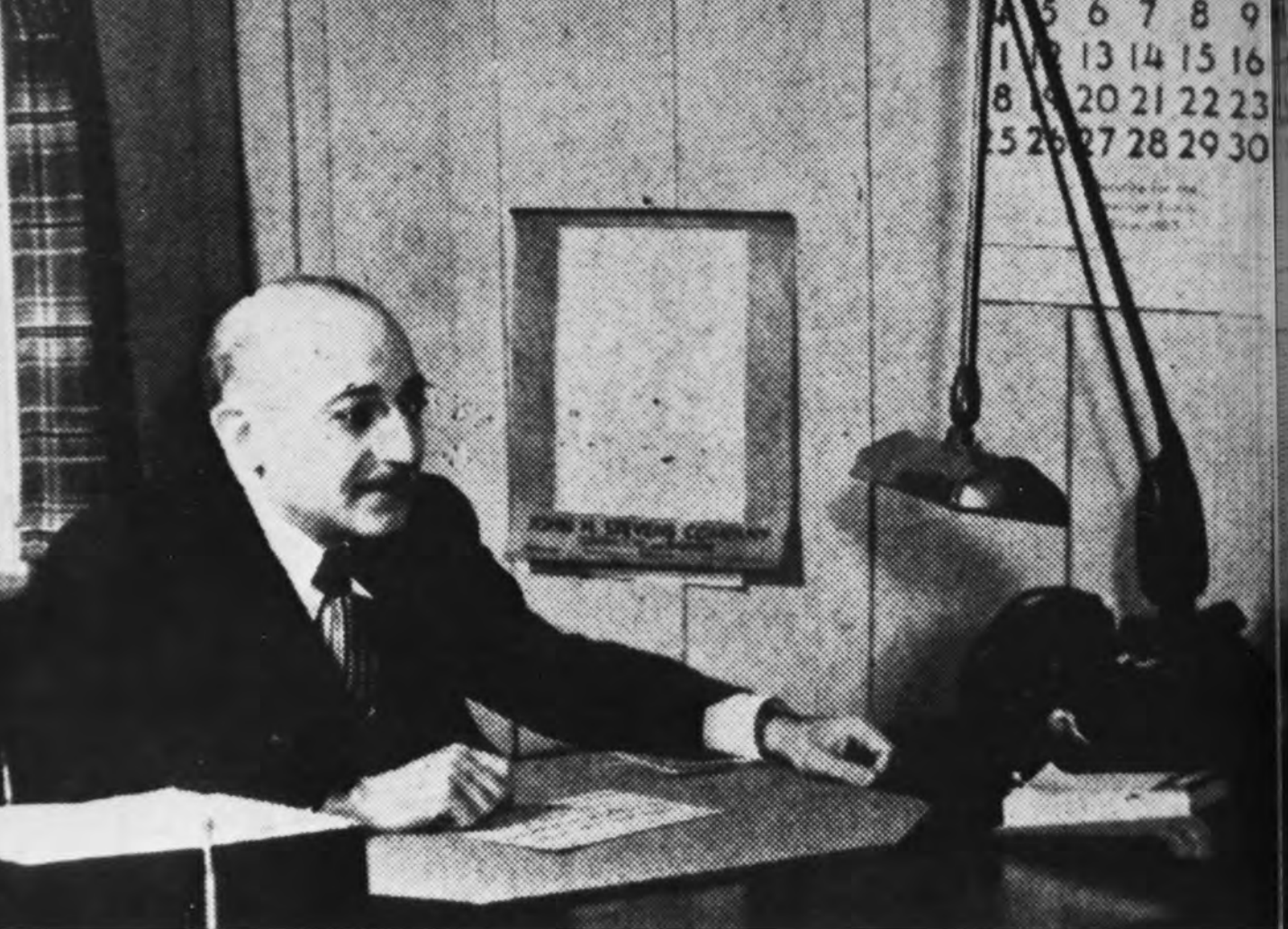

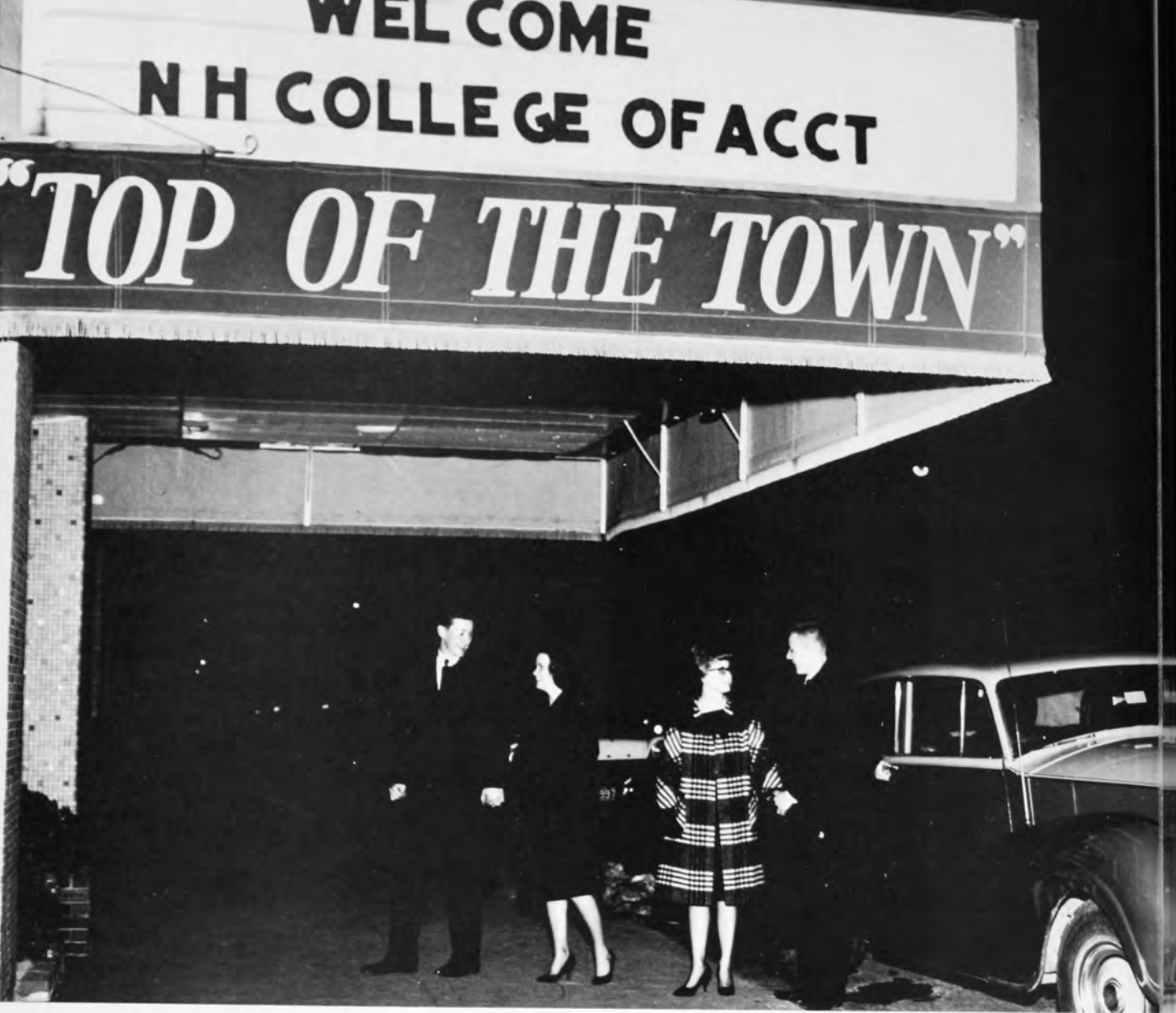
SOCIAL

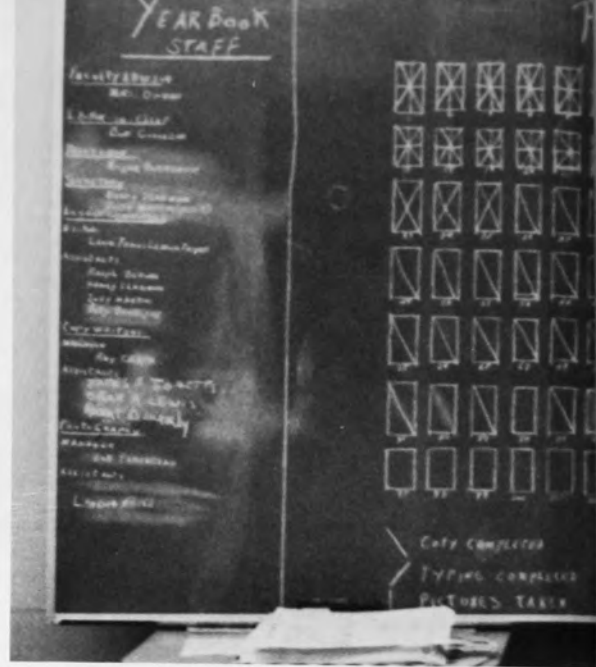

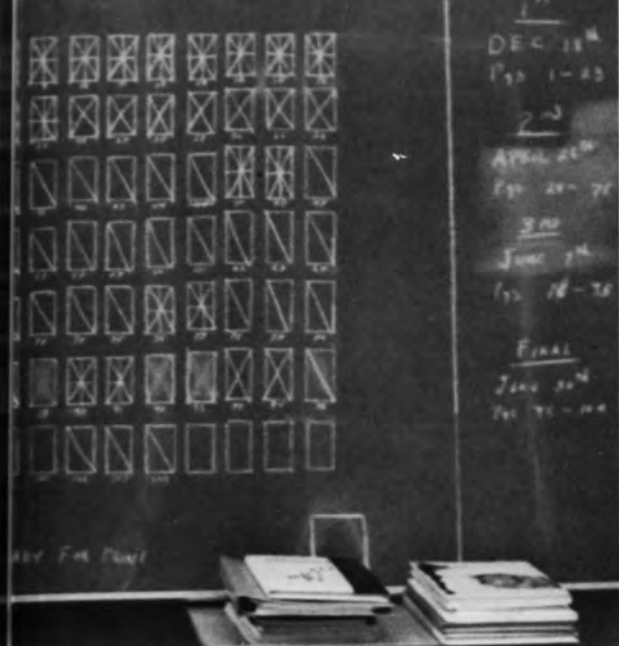
