Professor Corsack, we thank you.




Students, faculty, and the College administration who knew him felt the tragedy of his premature death. His contribution to New Hampshire College was significant and his presence on its faculty all too brief.







About N.H.C. Basketball

The history of basketball at New Hampshire College actually begins when Lou D'Allesandro was appointed head basketball coach in 1963. Prior to that time the basketball team travelled anywhere and played most anybody, most times not too successfully. In 1962, one year before Mr. D'Allesandro arrived, the team entered the Greater Boston Small College Conference and finished the season with a 1-24 record.

In 1963-64, with Coach D'Allesandro at the helm, the team produced a respectable 14-14 record. That was the last year the team did not have a winning record. For the next three years the New Hampshire College "Penmen" dominated the GBSCC, winning the conference playoff in 1964-65 and conference titles in 1965-66 and 1966-67.

In 1967 the Penmen left the GBSCC and became a member of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) and entered the New England Intercollegiate Basketball Association.

Last year the Penmen had a 26-6 record, and had a berth in the NAIA District 32 playoffs. In the playoff they lost their hopes for a trip to Kansas City when they were defeated by Rhode Island College.


When the final statistics were released by the NAIA, New Hamp-



shire College found itself among the nations leaders.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE NEW HAMPSHIRE COLLEGE ATHLETIC DEPARTMENT

The 1969-70 athletic season was a good one for New Hampshire College. We had winning seasons in soccer, basketball, and baseball. Our ski team developed under new coach Lyman Gilmore. The golf and tennis seasons were cut short due to the student strike. With the support of the Student Senate, the hockey club prospered under the direction of Wayne Osborn.

Our soccer season came out 7-6-1. Freshman coach, Norton Phelps, Jr., did an outstanding job working under very difficult circumstances. We still have a problem with our facilities. We found Derryfield Park to be inadequate. On one occasion the coach of Lyndon State College played our soccer game under protest because the field was not of adequate length and width. Our dressing facilities continue to be a problem. Our visiting teams must change at Gill Stadium, then move to Derryfield Park to play the game, and return to Gill Stadium to shower before eating at Merrimack Hall. We have found that dealing with Bishop Bradley High School has been good, but it gets very expensive. Our soccer schedule is completed for the 1970-71 season. It should be one of the finest soccer schedules ever. The highlight of the season will be an overnight trip to Maine where we will play Unity and Husson. First year coach, Norton Phelps, worked very diligently. He took a group of youngsters who hadn't played before, and gave us our first winning season in three years. It is my opinion that the program will improve with the addition of our new field. With the possibility of us moving to a new location, we should be able

to overcome some of our facility problems. In summary, the soccer program has been revived and I feel that it will continue to grow in the next few years. We must acquire better facilities.

Our basketball program was successful for the seventh consecutive year. The final record was 17-7. Add to the 17 wins two exhibition victories, one over Nasson College and the other over Hawthorne College at the Boston Garden. The 1969-70 season was highlighted by victories in double overtime over Roger Williams College and a hard fought two point victory over number six rated Husson College. Husson with a winning streak of 16 in a row, ranking number six in New England proved to have one of the finer teams in small college circles. Once again our team received regional exposure through the news media and a little bit of national exposure through the AP and UPI news services. The college made its first move into the Midwest by participating in the Muskingum Tournament at Muskingum College in Ohio. Although we did not win the tournament, we made a fine impression on the people of Ohio and I feel that the name of the college was favorably introduced into this area. Robert Williams will be taking over as head basketball coach next year. He will have eight returning lettermen, a fine schedule, and we hope a new place to play. Once again facilities were a problem for the basketball team. Our practice time was 5:30 to 7:30 causing a problem with the kitchen. It also created havoc with the boy's study hours. We used Bishop Bradley High School for \$3,500 plus our game expenses. Our costs were extremely high. Improvements were to be made at Bishop Bradley, in the gym and in the locker room. These were not made and we are hoping to move to another facility for the next season. Two boys from the basketball team made Who's Who Among American College Athletes, Mike Gemei and Reggie Brooks. John Astarita won acknowledgement in Who's Who Among American College and University Students and I feel the overall program was quite suc-

cessful. Our team finished second in the New Hampshire Classic Invitational Basketball Tournament. We lost to Western New England College in the finals. Our basketball program is one of the better ones in small college circles. The publicity from the program has helped the college in its recruiting.

Lyman Gilmore took over our ski team. Although our meet record was not outstanding, things look good for the future. Costs are getting extremely high, therefore, we will have to look for a new place to train. We have hopes that the Derryfield Park Project will be completed in time for next season. Our ski program is quite competitive. We received regional exposure from skiing and we ski against some of the finest colleges in the East, Harvard, Princeton, Boston University, and Boston College to name a few. It is our hope to get the students more involved in the ski program through the Student Senate. Mr. Gilmore intends to speak with Albert Jacobbe, the Director of Student Activities in order to promote skiing among the entire student body for next year.

The spring athletic program met with a few very serious problems, one of them being the student strike. The baseball team under Coach Norton Phelps was the only spring sport to finish its season. The New England Intercollegiate Baseball Association crown returned to New Hampshire College after a year's absence and three boys were placed on the All Star Team. Our league record was 7-2. Our overall record was 10-10. Facilities again are a problem. We used Prout's Park for practice and Gill Stadium for our games. We did receive a tremendous amount of cooperation from the Parks and Recreation Department. We are grateful because without it our program could not exist. Mr. Phelps in his first year as baseball coach did a very commendable job of continuing the baseball tradition at New Hampshire College. A spring trip was financed entirely by the students. Weather was a problem. Coach Phelps feels that a trip of this nature would not be advisable in the future. There are plans to

expand the New England Intercollegiate Baseball League. If this comes about, New Hampshire will have a ready-made schedule.

Golf was handled by Frank Barnes, tennis by Irving Rothman. Both seasons were cut short because of the strike. Almost everyone of the golfers left school and a number of the tennis people left. Our golf team was not as successful as in previous years. The tennis team has yet to win a match but participation was better than in previous years. In summary, the spring athletic picture is quite distorted because of the strike. I feel the program went as well as could be expected. Our future looks bright, if the problem of facilities can be overcome. We participated against St. Anselm's in tennis. This is the first time we have ever participated intercollegiately against St. Anselm's. We hope to continue this association in the future. The facilities for golf are good. Charmingfare has been gracious with us. Our people enjoy it, its excellent course, and the pro, Joe Kendrigan, is quite helpful. In tennis, facilities are a problem but the Recreation Department in Manchester has been helpful. We use Derryfield Park, Livingston Park, and the girl's courts at Immaculata High School. Our plan is to run the same type of program next year, with the possible introduction of fall golf.

The athletic picture for 1969-70 was a good one. We had better participation than in the previous years. We had only one athlete who participated in more than one sport as a regular. Our overall athletic picture is improving. We have applied for associate membership in the NCAA. With the coming of the new campus we should be able to give an excellent account of ourselves in the future.
