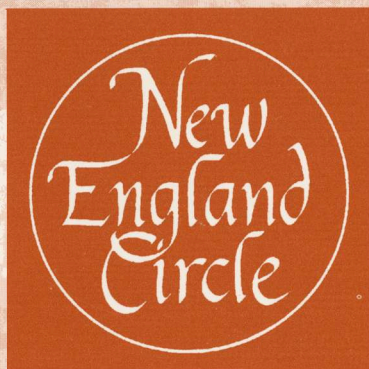

30 YEARS LATER — NEW REALITIES

message from the founders

It is hard to believe that thirty years have passed since Freedom Summer '64 and twenty years have past since we founded the New England Circle with our brothers, Bud and Walter. Much of what we intended to accomplish by establishing the Circle was informed by our family's experiences campaigning for Civil Rights and helping elect Civil Rights activists into public office.

During these two decades, Circles have chronicled unparalleled examples of human conviction and courage, as well as unprecedented changes in global politics and technology. It has been a privilege to come to know the many guests and discussion leaders over the years, and acknowledge in some small way the difference each of you continues to make in the lives of others.

The Circle's greatest strength is our members diversity of talent, background and leadership; the Circle's greatest accomplishment is the hope it generates by the simple act of coming together to share ideas and aspirations. Tonight is an inter-generational sharing of hope and idealism, committed lives, possibilities and renewal. For us it symbolizes all that our family has hoped to do by breaking bread together.

Many of us tonight remember or were among the hundreds of concerned young Americans who joined Freedom Summer to register voters in the South. Few of us knew three of them, James Chaney, Andrew Goodman and Michael Schwerner — who on June 21, 1964 were murdered in Philadelphia, Mississippi by the Neshoba County Sheriff and fellow members of the Ku Klux Klan. Their deaths epitomized the sacrifice made by those with a commitment to Civil Rights and the willingness of young people to put their

lives on the line to end legal segregation in America. Hundreds of young men and women responded, organizing voters and challenging the nation to enact the landmark Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Act of 1965.

Tonight we are honored that Dr. Carolyn Goodman, mother of activist, Andrew Goodman is here keeping commitment alive through the Andrew Goodman Foundation which is organizing Freedom Summer '94, a national youth-led civil rights campaign. Tonight we are witness to four extraordinary lives and how their experiences called them into a lifetime of service.

We are also enormously grateful to hear from a number of emerging Civil Rights activists from Boston Freedom Summer and Freedom Summer, national headquarters. Much has changed since 1964, and today young activists throughout the country are asking us to ask ourselves what the new realities of the Civil Rights agenda are and how those realities challenge activists and policymakers alike. It is our greatest hope that tonight be an evening of sharing, but that we come eager to listen and learn from today's young activists.

Being an anniversary year for both the New England Circle and Freedom Summer '64, we hope the evening evokes a historical moment, calls upon us to speak personally and reflectively and provokes us all into rethinking our own roles and responsibilities in resurrecting the promise of equality and social justice in this country.

Let us come together in celebration, in anticipation and with thanks.

Robert Coles, whose special interest is field work in social psychiatry, is a research psychiatrist for the Harvard University Health Services, as well as Professor of Psychiatry and Medical Humanities at the Harvard Medical School. He offers courses at Harvard College, Harvard Medical School, Harvard Business School, Harvard Law School, the Harvard School of Education and Harvard Extension School. Dr. Coles received his A.B. from Harvard and his M.D. from Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons.

Robert Coles was an active participant in the Mississippi Freedom Summer Project in 1964 and prior to that worked with Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) in Atlanta. He has studied and written extensively about school desegregation beginning with his work with Ruby Bridges, one of the first four black children to integrate the New Orleans Public School system which led him to his Pulitzer Prize winning work *Children in Crisis*. In the late 1960's he rode

the first school desegregation bus in Boston, writing extensively about the impact busing and schooling has had on children.

Since 1961, Dr. Coles has published more than 1100 articles, reviews, and essays in newspapers, magazines, journals, and anthologies. His 55 books include, *Children of Crisis* (in five volumes); Erik H. Erikson; *The Growth of His Work*; *The Middle Americans*; Walker Percy; *An American Search*; *The Old Ones of New Mexico*; Flannery O'Connor's *South*; *Women of Crisis* (with Jane Coles, in two volumes); *The Moral Life of Children*; *The Political Life of Children*; *Dorothy Day: A Radical Devotion*; *Simon Weil: A Modern Pilgrimage*; *Times of Surrender*; *Harvard Diary*; *The Call of Stories: Teaching and the Moral Imagination*.

His latest book, *A Call to Service: A Witness to Idealism* chronicles the moral and psychological struggles and triumphs of young people engaged in community service. He now serves as Honorary Co-Chair of Boston Freedom Summer.

Dr. Carolyn Goodman, Founder, *Andrew Goodman Foundation/Freedom Summer '94* Carolyn Goodman and her late husband, Robert Goodman, graduates of Cornell University, were actively involved in organizing Farmer Cooperatives. After college graduation, Dr Goodman became Women's Division Chair of the Joint Antifascist Refugee Committee that care for Spanish Republicans who fled or were exiled by Francisco Franco. During the 1960's while raising her three sons, Jonathan, Andrew and David, she continued to work in social change activities. In 1964 tragedy struck the Goodman family when her son Andrew and two co-workers, James Chaney and Michael Schwerner, were murdered by the Ku Klux Klan in Philadelphia, Mississippi during Freedom Summer 1964.

In the early 1970's Dr. Goodman was President and Chair of Pacifica Foundation, which owns and operates five, non-commercial, listener-sponsored

radio stations in New York, Washington, D.C., California and Texas. She also chaired the North American Advisory Committee of Interns for Peace whose purpose is to build and strengthen bonds of friendship between Israeli, Arabs and Jews.

Twenty five years after Freedom Summer, the families of the three young men came together to form the Chaney-Goodman-Schwerner Coalition to commemorate and perpetuate the legacy to Freedom Summer 1964.

Dr. Goodman is Assistant Clinical Professor, Psychiatry, at the Albert Einstein College of Medicine in New York City. She designed PACE (Parent and Child Education), a pioneering and award-winning treatment program for emotionally disturbed women and their high-risk, pre-school children. She is a board member of Symphony Space, a performing arts center on the Upper West Side of Manhattan.

Marian Wright Edelman, founder and president of the Children's Defense Fund (CDF), has been an advocate for disadvantaged Americans for her entire professional career.

Under her leadership, the Washington-based CDF has become a strong national voice for children and families, particularly those who are poor. CDF's mission is to educate the nation about the needs of children and encourage preventative investment in children before they get sick, drop out of school, suffer too-early pregnancy or family breakdown, or get into trouble.

Mrs. Edelman began her campaign for children in the mid-1960's when, as the first black woman admitted to the Mississippi bar, she directed the NAACP Legal Defense and Education Fund in Jackson Mississippi. Most notably, she has successfully led a national campaign aimed at getting every child in America immunized.

In 1968, Mrs. Edelman founded the Washington Research Project, which became CDF in 1973. CDF addresses such issues as adolescent pregnancy prevention, child, health, education, child care, youth employment child welfare and mental health, and family support systems.

Mrs. Edelman was born in Bennettsville, South Carolina, and graduated from Spelman College in 1960. She earned her L.I.B. from Yale Law School in 1963.

In 1974 Time Magazine named her one of America's 200 young leaders. Mrs. Edelman was the first black woman elected to the Yale University Corporation. Currently she serves on the boards of the NAACP Legal Defense Fund and Education Fund, the Aetna Life and Casualty Foundation, the March of Dimes, and the Robin Hood Foundation. She was a 1985 MacArthur Foundation Prize Fellow, and in 1990 Ladies Home Journal named her one of America's 50 most powerful women.

In addition to numerous essays, reports and articles, Mrs. Edelman has written two books: *Families in Peril: An Agenda for Social Change* and *The Measure of Our Success: A Legacy to My Children and Yours*. She is currently developing a parenting guide for African-American families.

Mrs. Edelman is married to Peter Edelman, who serves as counselor to the Secretary of Health and Human Services. They have three sons: Joshua, Jonah, and Ezra. The Edelmans live in Washington, D.C.

Dr. Alvin Poussaint, is a Clinical Professor of Psychiatry and Faculty Associate Dean for Student Affairs at Harvard Medical School. He is also Director of the Media Center for Children at the Judge Baker Children's Center in Boston. He is author of *Why Blacks Kill Blacks*, 1972, co-author of *Black Child Care*, 1975, and co-author of the revised edition of *Black Child Care*, entitled *Raising Black Children*, published in November 1992. He has written dozens of articles for lay and professional publications.

Dr. Poussaint, is an expert on race relations in America, the dynamics of prejudice, and issues of diversity in our increasingly multicultural society. He is active in consulting to the media on a wide range of social issues. He is very concerned with media images and issues regarding the needs of children and the changing family; he is a strong proponent of non-violent parenting and parenting education.

Born in East Harlem, he attended Columbia and received his MD from Cornell in 1960. He took postgraduate training at UCLA Neuropsychiatric Institute,

where he served as Chief Resident in Psychiatry in 1964-65. At UCLA he pursued research in psychopharmacology.

From 1965-67, he was a Southern Field Director of Medical Committee for Human Rights in Jackson, Mississippi, providing medical care to civil rights workers and aiding in the desegregation of health facilities throughout the South. He worked alongside such civil rights leaders as Martin Luther King, Jr., Andrew Young, and Jesse Jackson. He is the former chair of the board of directors of PUSH for Excellence.

In 1967, after leaving Mississippi, Dr. Poussaint joined the Tufts Medical School faculty as director of the psychiatry program in a low-income housing project. In 1969, he joined Harvard. From 1975-1978 he was Director of Student Affairs at Harvard Medical School. He was a script consultant to NBC's *The Cosby Show* from 1984 through 1992 and *A Different World* from 1986-1993.

He has received numerous awards and is the recipient of many honorary degrees.

Jeana Brown, is a native of Four Corners Dorchester, active in community organizing and the Azusa Christian Community. Jeana is a sophomore at Yale University, majoring in Political Sciences.

She is the co-Founder of the Black Women Network at Yale.

Kath Delaney, has been organizing and producing political and cultural events since her youth. She was the National Coordinator for Earth Day 1990 and the Executive Producer of the 1.4 million person Earth Day event in New York City in 1990. As Lead, Site and Press Advance for both the Clinton/Gore Presidential Campaign in 1992 and the Dukakis/Bentson Presidential Campaign in 1988, she organized and planned campaign events in many key swing states. She is currently the Executive Director of Freedom Summer, based in New York City.

Most recently, Kath Delaney ran her own public affairs consult-

ing agency, Delaney & Associates, based in New York City. Her clients included Children of War, Planned Parenthood Federation of America, the Green Media Group and the Society of American for Recovery. In Washington, D.C. in the late 1980's, Kath Delaney organized a wide range of media events for Fenton Communications, Public Media Center and others. A client list includes the following: the African National Congress, Farm AID, MTV, Natural Resources Defense Council, Neighbor to Neighbor, Council on Economic Priorities, TransAfrica, the Children's Defense Fund and the Washington International Film Festival.

Eugene Rivers, was born in Boston, Massachusetts, and grew up in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. He is the pastor and co-founder of Azusa Christian Community, an intentional community comprised of young African-Americans committed to combatting the desolation and poverty in the Four Corners neighborhood of Dorchester. With other pastors in Boston, he has developed and is promoting the Ten Point Plan for Combatting Black on Black Violence, a plan for inner-city churches to work with youth, in particular young black men, who are involved with drugs and violence.

Boston Freedom Summer '94 is a demonstration of the Ten

Point Plan and he is serving as Executive Director of Boston Freedom Summer and Director of Field Operations for the Ten Point Coalition.

Reverend Rivers is also the Director of the Seymour Institute for Advanced Christian Studies, a research and educational organization focusing upon the relationship between Christian faith and social policy. He has written and spoken in a number of different fora on the role of intellectuals in the age of crack.

He lives with his wife, Jacqueline, and children Malcom and Sojourner, in the Four Corners neighborhood in Dorchester.

Roland Robinson, is an ordained minister in the African Methodist Episcopal Church, and is affiliated with Bethel African Methodist Episcopal church in Jamaica Plain, Massachusetts. He is a native of Brooklyn, New York, and graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology from Fisk University in 1985. He also received a Master of Arts in clinical Psychology from Fisk University/Meharry Medical College in 1988. He will be awarded the Master of Divinity with a focus in medical ethics and theology from Harvard Divinity School in 1995.

Mr. Robinson has served as a teaching fellow for Dr. Robert

Coles, in a course entitled "General Education 105: The Literature of Social Reflection." He is also a former mental Health Specialist/Drug Counselor at Meharry Medical College.

Mr. Robinson has worked as a youth counselor at the Geigar-Gibson Health Center, coordinating a youth fathers support group, and a peer group for young black men. He also served as a Pastoral Counselor at Shattuck Respite Center, where he initiated a support group for AIDS patients and a literacy program at the Center. He will be a site coordinator for Boston Freedom Summer '94.

New England Circle was established by the Dunfee family after discovering a legacy they had inherited when they first acquired the historic Parker House Hotel in Boston. In 1857 Oliver Wendell Holmes, John Greenleaf Whittier and James Russell Lowell gathered regularly at the Parker House, inviting other great thinkers of their time to discuss important social and philosophical issues. They called themselves the Saturday Club. Inspired by the concept the Dunfee family broadened its mandate and expanded its participation. Since inception, 8,000 people have attended. Women and men of all races, nationalities and political beliefs, young and old, rich and poor; leaders from business, labor, civic and community organizations, academia, the arts, government, media, clergy make up the diverse fabric of the Circles. Circles are designed to be timely and highly participatory discussions of important topics facing our communities, cities, nations and world. All Circles are free of cost to participants so accessibility is guaranteed.
