HEALTH CAPSULE

VALUE OF HEALTH AND HUMAN LIFE

Human life exceeds in economic value all other material resources of a nation. A healthy population, in its broadest sense, is the best measure of a people's prosperity. Its value in terms of human happiness is immeasurable. The quality of health is that margin of mental and physical vigor that allows a person to work most effectively and to reach his highest potential level of satisfaction in life.

Health essentials in the environment are many, amongst these, cleanliness plays an important role.

Psychological Effect of Cleanliness and Order

A disorderly room creates a sense of confusion, and suggests that the owner has an untidy way of living; on the other hand, a room that has a set scheme and is meticulously kept suggests a tenant who overemphasizes the importance of order and makes those who live with him uncomfortable. There is a nice feeling about a room that is free from dirt and dust, has balance, color and harmony, but at the same time has a look of being lived in. Houses have personality and affect us in much the same way as human personalities.

Habits of personal cleanliness are among the first requisites of hygienic living. Good grooming contributes to a sense of well-being. Theodore Rosenthal, discussing personal cleanliness in relation to public health says; "No single article can compare with soap in respect to the amount of sickness and death prevented by its use."

Cleanliness is essential to a normal physical and mental state as this is interpreted in our society, although, "normal" persons vary greatly in their standards. A person whose hygienic care has been neglected might seem very ill when he is only hungry and uncomfortable. In many cases the restless and sleepless need food or a good bath rather than a narcotic.
