The Catherine A. Dunfey Award is given annually to a person or organization that exemplifies the personal courage, commitment and compassion of Catherine Dunfey: mother, grandmother and great grandmother of the Dunfey family. The award designee will have demonstrated leadership, reflecting a significant and positive impact on a pressing human or social condition somewhere in the world. The recipient will also evidence the capacity to work closely with women and men of different races, ideologies and professions while striving to bring about constructive change in our world.



Harry and Ching Lee Wu

Harry Wu

Mr. Wu is the Executive Director of the Laogai Research Foundation and a Resident Scholar at Stanford University's Hoover Institution. He has dedicated his life to protecting human rights and expanding civil liberty.

As a young student in Beijing, Harry Wu was arrested for expressing counter-revolutionary opinions during the anti-rightist campaign of 1957. In 1960, Wu, as a political prisoner, was inducted into China's clandestine system of forced labor camps, the *laogai*. For nineteen years he was placed in more than twelve different camps in northern China, manufacturing chemicals, mining coal, constructing prison buildings, and working in rice fields and fruit orchards. During these years he was beaten, tortured, and starved. Several times, close to death himself, Wu witnessed the death of many fellow inmates from brutality and starvation and by suicide. he was released from the *Laogai* in 1979.

In 1985, Harry Wu came to the United States as a visiting professor at the University of California at Berkeley. After his arrival, he began writing about his experiences in the *laogai*. Confronted with the inability of policymakers to believe the stories of the camps, he devoted himself to proving their existence. He scraped together funds to by satellite photos on which he could locate the *laogai*. He returned to China three times posing as a business man to obtain visual evidence of the brutality of the camps. Hidden cameras from "60 minutes" brought the American audience pictures of the gulag for the first time and motivated the American public to cry out against them. On his fourth such visit, Wu was arrested and charged with stealing state secrets. He was sentenced to fifteen years in prison. Under pressure form the United States, the Chinese government expelled him on August 24, 1995. Harry Wu has dedicated his life to alerting the world to the atrocities committed at Chinese forced labor camps and has written an autobiography entitled *Laogai: The Chinese Gulag Bitter Winds*.

Ching Lee Wu

Ching Lee Wu is assisting her husband in his work, she is the secretary/treasurer of the Laogai Research Foundation. Mrs. Wu was born in Sichuan, China, and raised in Taiwan. Between 1982 and 1991, she worked in the Office of the Vice Minister of Economic Affairs in the government of the republic of China. After marrying Harry Wu in February 1991, they moved to the United States in Milpitas, California.

Mrs. Wu has accompanied her husband on two trips to China to film and document human rights abuses in the Laogai Camps. Recently, she spearheaded efforts to gain the release of Harry Wu from his captors in China.

Loretta McLaughlin

Loretta McLaughlin's career in journalism has spanned several decades during which she has contributed to the understanding of health care and public policy. She writes as a regular op-ed page columnist for the Boston Globe with an emphasis on AIDS and on

the continuing need for health care reform. From 1992 until 1994, she served as editorial page editor of the Boston Globe, and for six years prior to that as the associate editorial page editor.

She is a graduate of Boston University, holding a

bachelor of science degree in journalism. In 1989, BU named her a Distinguished Alumna. In 1993, she was awarded an honorary doctoral degree, Doctor of Humane Letters, by Curry College.

In 1994, she was appointed a fellow at the Harvard AIDS Institute and at the

Radcliffe Public Policy
Institute. Also in 1994, she
was named a member of
the Board of Overseers of
the Lahey Clinic Foundation,
the board of directors of
the Boston Globe
Foundation, and a trustee
of Massachusetts Eye and
Ear Infirmary.
