**ROBERT B. REICH**, professor at the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University, is one of America's foremost political economists. He is a leading advisor to politicians, corporations, and government; and author of many books on business, government, and the international economy. His forthcoming book, *The Work of Nations: Capitalism in the 21st Century*, will examine the national purpose within the emerging global economy. His best seller, *The Next American Frontier*, launched a national debate about America's industrial strategy, and *Tales of a New America* called for discarding old economic myths to survive in a global economy.

Mr. Reich is chairman of the editorial board of *The American Prospect*, and a contributing editor to *The New Republic* and *World Policy*. His articles appear regularly in the *Harvard Business Review* and the *Atlantic*. He is a regular columnist for *Nihon Keizai Shimbun*, one of Japan's leading newspapers, and a regular commentator on public radio's

"Marketplace" and public television's "Nightly Business Report."

Prior to Harvard, Mr. Reich served as assistant to the solicitor general in the Ford Administration and was director of policy planning for the Federal Trade Commission in the Carter Administration. A graduate of Dartmouth College, Mr. Reich holds a law degree from Yale Law School and a degree in economics from Oxford University where he was a Rhodes Scholar.

**LAWRENCE INGRASSIA** is the Boston bureau chief of the *Wall Street Journal*. He oversees the coverage of economic, corporate, political, and social trends for the *Journal* in New England. A veteran editor and writer with the *Journal* for 12 years, Mr. Ingrassia has been in Boston since 1986. Previously, he was deputy bureau chief in London.

Prior to the *Wall Street Journal*, Mr. Ingrassia was a general assignment reporter for the *Chicago Sun-Times*. He holds a degree in journalism from the University of Illinois.
