

DANIEL BERRIGAN is a Jesuit priest, author, poet and teacher: most of all, he is a dedicated civil rights activist. Father Berrigan and his brother, Philip, were among the "Catonsville Nine", who, on one fateful May morning in 1968, withdrew 600 Selective Service files and burned them in protest of the Vietnam conflict. Writing of that experience Father Berrigan said that the small fire "seemed to light up the dark places of the heart where courage and risk and hope were awaiting a signal, a dawn." It was a signal that awakened the conscience of a nation. Father Berrigan has never stopped working and writing about his commitment to peace and justice. Among six books he has written is a just completed autobiography, **"To Dwell in Peace"**. The book chronicles his sojourn from his birthplace in Minnesota to a recent protest of nuclear weaponry in Philadelphia with a group called the "Plowshares Eight". There, Berrigan and seven other protesters poured blood on the nose cone of a missile in a Philadelphia assembly plant. The book will be released in late February. A former New England Circle Discussion Leader and "actorvist" Martin Sheen has called the book "a powerful and poetic account of Berrigan's life and work, . . . a prophetic call to go forth in the faith striving towards the long promised blessing reserved for the peacemakers." Father Berrigan is now serving at an AIDS hospice ministering to the terminally ill in New York City.

She has been featured in **VOGUE**, **GLAMOUR**, **MADMOISELLE** and **EBONY**. Photographer Francesco Scavullo named Janet one of the most beautiful women he has ever photographed. She writes occasional celebrity pieces for the **Boston Herald** and **U.S. News and World Report**. Janet has received the Israel Cultural Award and, in 1977, was named as one of the Ten Outstanding Young Leaders by the Boston Jaycees. Janet resides in Boston with her husband, Dr. Robert Kisner.
