In some cases last term seniors can go on internship. Here is an opportunity - Fellowships in World Community. See Norman Lister, F50, for an internship application. Then, Ms. Antunes, Director of Placement, will coordinate our internship program with the fellowship opportunity explained below:

Ms. Antunes, Director of Placement, has received information on a new program -- Fellowships in World Community. Sponsored by Action for World Community, it is a national youth network seeking global solutions to global problems.

Each Fellowship, lasting from 9 - 12 months, will incorporate research, investigation, policy objectives, preparation of programming and informational materials, and organization of community educational and action endeavors. Some Fellows may engage in legislative lobbying or participate in international conferences. A stipend of \$4,250 is given.

ATTENTION VETERANS

Bits and Pieces from Washington - Congress is considering bills to broaden the **G.I. Bill**: S2789 offers a 13% benefit increase, raising a single vet's education allowance from \$220 to \$250 per month. This is opposed by the V.A., which backs an 8% (\$238) increase. Other elements of S2789 would extend eligibility from 8 to 10 years, open a central V.A. Communication Center, offer tuition aid up to \$600 each year when tuition exceeds \$400.
