KRIS KRISTOFFERSON

On Friday, February 1, NHC will present KRIS KRISTOFFERSON in concert. There will be two concerts--one at 7 p.m. and one at 10 p.m.--to be held in the Practical Arts Auditorium, Manchester. Kristofferson, an 8-year army veteran, former floor sweeper, former helicopter pilot for an oil company, and an ex-Rhodes Scholar, is well known both for the songs he has written and for those he has sung. Two of his most famous compositions are, "Me & Bobby McGee" (recorded by Janis Joplin) and "Help Me Make It Through The Night" (recorded by Sammi Smith). Among other songs he has written and recorded are: "Josie", "Loving Her Was Easier", "The Silver Tongued Devil and I", "Song I'd Like to Sing" (recorded with his wife Rita Coolidge), and his biggest hit, "Why Me". PIANO CONCERT

On Thursday, January 31, Mr. Donald Steele will give a classical piano concert in the Student Center. The program begins at 3 p.m. and will feature compositions by Mozart, Schubert, Debussy and Chopin.

Professor Steele, a native of New Hampshire, attended the New England Conservatory of Music and Colorado College. A member of the UNH faculty since 1946, he has presented annually many solo recitals as well as concerts with orchestras and chamber music ensembles. Steele has appeared with the Boston Pops Orchestra several times and two summers ago performed at the New Hampshire Music Festival in Meredith. Professor Steele is now on a sabbatical leave from UNH involving studies in Vienna. He will be returning to Vienna in mid-March for further performances there.

MANCHESTER CHORALE

The Manchester Chorale is giving a concert on Sunday, Jan. 27 at 8 p.m. at the Manchester Memorial High School Auditorium and will be singing selections from Bach, Mozart, Bernstein and others. Two of the main attractions will be the American Jazz Mass by Frank Tirro with a jazz ensemble, and the Cantata #140 by J. S. Bach with an 18-piece chamber orchestra.
